

BOILED CORN FOR POULTRY.

In the breeding of poultry, as in all other pursuits, a little care and forthought invariably return an apparently disproportionate result. In the reading of poultry, where the expenditure on each towl is small and the material provided comparatively inexpénsive, we are apt to overlock the small vastes which occur into transformation of the different grains into poultry, but which aggregate quite a respectable sum.

The opinion that corn is very nousishing food for fowls is so universal that no further thought is given to the matter. If any one should suggest corn would be easier of digestion if soaked or boiled, he would very likely receive the answer that corn was nothing hard to digest for brids, which swallow stones and other hard substance without detriment. A moment's thought, however will convince that the mill-stones and the grist are very different things, and feeding the millistone with pebbles bears a certain likeness to it.
