



If it was only resorted to as an absolute necessity, a good credit would be a great blessing, and in many cases it is an absolute necessity, but its use too frequently

eads a man to purchases that are far beyond his resources, and when the day of settlement comes around, the man of good credit finds himself confronted with more obligations than he has resources to meet. It is far easier to contract a debt than it is to pay it. A man can get into debt almost une sciously and without realizing the fact, but when pay-day comes round and he finds himself face to face with more creditors than he can satisfy, he then realizes his mistake when it is too late to avoid it. And thus it is that thousands of men become hopelessly involved in debt without any intention of wronging anyone or of beating their creditors out of their just dues. It was because they had a good credit and abused it. Another bad feature of a good credit is that the possessor of it usually pays an exorbitant price for it. As a rule people who buy on credit pay more for their goods than the man who pays cash. In other words the man who has a sound and good credit pays for the privilege of using it every time.
