It is a pity in some respects, for the measure was well conceived, though, as presented to the Legislature it was defective in two important respects, firstly in not proimportant respects, aristly in not pro-viding for the payment of aldermen, and secondly in the re-actionary provision lengthening the aldermanic term to two years, which alone was sufficient to offset any beneficial features the measure might possess. 
