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


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


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
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COST OF ASPHALT IN WINNIPEG.

Dear Sir, -- In your issue of August 6th Dear Sir,—In your issue of August 6th you have a paragraph with reference to City of Winnipeg asphalt plant, in which you say that the average cost of asphalt per square yard is \$2.78. This appears to be taken from table on page 64, which includes expenditure on curbing, street railway tracks, etc. The actual cost of the asphalt per square yard was \$2.03, in addition to which we charge 20 cents per square yard to cover maintenance. This makes the cost \$2.23 per square yard on makes the cost \$2.23 per square yard on the basis of specifications on which con-tructors tender.

On page 63 of the report referred to you will find table of comparative costs compiled by Mr. F. V. E. Bardol, City Engineer of Buffalo, in which, on the basis of

neer of Butato, in which, on the basis of Bestalo prices, the cost of Winnipeg asphalt is placed at \$1.76 per square yard.

Freight on cement and asphalt are large items in the cost of our work in Winnipeg.

CONVENTION OF MUNICIPAL OFFICERS.

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attend to the very interesting business beattend to the very interesting business before it, only two entertainments will be included on the programme. These will be a luncheon on the mountain top to be tendered by the city of Montreal and a lawn party on Westmount Park, under the auspices of the Westmount Town Council.

The president of the association is Mr. O. A. Howland, Mayor of Toronto.

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
