





The Clergy wanting, for their own private Libraries, standard Theological works, or Parochial or Sunday School Lending Libraries, will find some facilities rendered them, on visiting the Depository.

It ought to be mentioned, in connection with the Depository, that in a private letter received from the Secretary of the Church Missionary Society, addressed to our Assistant Secretary, he states—'Any arrangement that you may wish to make, for obtaining a regular supply of our publications, the Secretaries here will be most ready to carry out.'

During the past year, an alteration has been made in the Distribution of the Diocese into Districts. Much inconvenience was found in the working of some of the District Branches, owing to their territorial extent, and the consequent distance at which some of the Clergy resided from the places of the meetings of the District Committees. To remedy this, three of the Districts have each been divided into two parts, thus making in all 11 Districts, which are as follows:—

It is hoped that this subdivision of some of the more extended Districts will facilitate them in governing the Associations strictly in conformity with the provisions of the General By-Laws of the Society. When the systematic course therein described shall be uniformly adopted in all the districts, it is believed that it will be found more convenient, and conducive to the advancement and glory of the Society and its Branches. That this may be soon attained, the subject is again commended to the early and kind attention of the officers of the District Associations.

During the past year, St. Peter's Chapel, which had been destroyed by the first great fire in 1845, has been rebuilt on a larger scale. And contracts are under consideration for the rebuilding of St. Matthew's or the Free Chapel, at the Burying Ground, which was destroyed by the second great fire.

The chief part of the expense of restoring to the parish these chapels will fall upon the members of the Church in the city.

The Treasurer at Quebec received, in March last, the sum of £100 currency, from the hands of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, being an amount of a donation to the Society, from the Rev. J. Leeds (since deceased), formerly Missionary of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, at the Côteau du Lac.

It will be seen by the foregoing statement, that the congregation of Trinity Chapel have taken upon themselves the maintenance of a Travelling Missionary, in addition to Annual Subscriptions for the general purposes of the Society. In thus devoting liberal things, we may trust they will stand, and be prospered on High.

The Minister, in officially communicating this information, says—'I have lodged in the Savings Bank ready to be paid, when required, into the hands of the Treasurer, £135, being £125 for one year's stipend for the Missionary, and £10 given as a donation towards the purchase of a horse for his use. I must add that one kind friend has given a sleigh, and another a new saddle and bridle.'

He adds, 'The sum of £12 has been placed in my hands by some friends of Israel's descendants, to be paid to the London Society for promoting Christianity among the Jews, for the benefit of the Institution at Liverpool. Also, £10 for the Church Missions Society, and £2 for the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts.'

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The Lord Lieutenant has placed at his disposal and energy the means of preventing the repetition of offences. Her Majesty looks with confidence to the maintenance of the general peace of Europe.

Her Majesty has concluded a treaty for the free trade of Her Majesty's Colonies with the Republic of the Equator, and she has given directions that that treaty should be duly carried into effect.

Her Majesty has given directions that the estimates for the next year should be prepared for the purpose of being laid before you. They will be framed with a careful regard to the exigencies of the public service.

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It has been circulated that a large majority of Mr. Mackenzie's friends had been mesmerized by a certain Professor of that name, and kept in the Magnetic sleep until the election of 18th terminated. The Candidates for the Upper Canada College Scholarships, to be required to produce certificates of attendance at that institution during the year previous to the Examination, and of good conduct, signed by the Principal. The above certificates to be lodged with the Registrar at least one fortnight before the day of examination.

2. No Candidate to be elected Scholar, unless he shall have been placed in the first class in one department, (either Classics or Mathematics), and not lower than the fourth class in the other, (either Mathematics or Classics).
