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THE PRIZE SONGS.

In April, 1898, the Montreal 'Witness' offered four prizes of \$50, \$25, \$15 and \$10 respectively for the four best national songs sent in before Aug. 1, 1898. In response to this offer over seven hundred songs were received, some coming from England, South Africa, Australia and even the United States. These were sent to the three Canadian judges selected from among them the ten best. These ten were then sent to the Marquis of Dufferin and Ava, whose final decision is given in the accompanying letter:
