Time for Going Through the Falls.

The Ealls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a hair on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

Time Ball.

The Time Ball on Northern Tower of the Custom House building will be hoisted half its elevation each day (Surdays excepted at fifteen minutes before one o'clock. At one minute before one o'clock it will be holsted its veroreane o clock. At one minute perore one o clock it will be holsted its full height; and at one o'clock, mean time, the Ball will be dropped. A Chronometer, keeping correct Greenwich t me, should then show 5h 24m. 15s., and the difference between this and the time shown by a Chronometer, is its true error on Greenwich time at the moment. As the above hour of one o'clock, when the Ball drops, represents 5h. 24m. 15s. at Greenwich, the error of a chronometer may be ascertained no matter where the ship is lying. MERCHANTS' BOXES.

Rent of small box \$4, and of large box \$6 a year.

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Though every effort will be made in sorting letters, to place them in the boxes, when the party addressed is known to have a box, the Postmaster does not hold himself responsible for this always being done; the primary rules being that all letters bearing the number of the house and name of street go there by letter carrier.

An order to place in a box letters belonging to another person than the owner of the box cannot be recognized, unless such letters are addressed to the care of the box or its owner.

RATES OF POSTAGE.

FIRST CLASS MATTER.

Post Cards-Dominion and United States, 1c. Great Britain and other Postal Union Countries, 2c. Reply Post Cards for use within the Dominion will be issued at two cents each.

Drop Letters.—City, Carleton and Portland, 1c. per half ounce, Mail Letters.—From one place in Canada to another, and between Canada and the United States, 3c. per half oz.; between Canada and Newfoundland, and between Canada and Great Britain, 5c. per half oz.

Insufficiently paid letters, from one place in Canada to another, on which the first half ounce rate of postage is fully prepaid, are forwarded charged with double the deficient postage.

Insufficiently paid letters for or from the United States, on which a single rate of postage or more has been paid, are charged with the deficient postage on delivery.

Letters addressed to places in Canada and the United States must be prepaid one full rate (3 cents), otherwise they will be sent to the Dead Letter Office.

SECOND CLASS MATTER.

Canadian Newspapers, &c.—Newspapers and Periodicals, printed and published in Canada, and posted from the office of publication, or News Agency, to actual Subscribers or News Agents in Canada, the United States and Newfoundland, resident elsewhere than at the place of publication, are FREE. Such newspapers and periodicals must be issued not less frequently than once per month. Newspapers posted for City Delivery will not be delivered by Lottor United States and Newfoundland, the lottor function of the second second

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THIRD CLASS MATTER.

Transient Newspapers, dc.—On all Transient Newspapers, Periodicals, addressed to places in Canada, Newfoundland and United States, the postage rate is one cent per 4 ounces in weight, which must be prepaid by postege stamp.

Newspapers and Periodicals published not less frequently than once a month, and weighing less than one ounce, may be posted singly, if prepaid by postage stamp one-half cent each. Newspapers for the United Kingdom must be prepaid 1c, for each 2 oz.

Newspapers and Periodica's, published in the United Kingdom, and brought by mail to Canadian booksellers or News Agent, may be re-mailed by such Booksellers or News Agents, free of postage.

Book Packets, dc.-Books, Pamphlets, Occasional Publications, Printed Circulars, Prices Current, Hand Bills, Advertising Sheets, Book and Newspaper Manuscript, Printers' Proof Sheets, whether corrected or not, Maps, Prints, Drawings, Engravings, Lithographs, Photographe, Sheet Music, whether printed or written, Documents, wholly or partly printed or written, such as Deeds, Insurance Policies or other documents of a like nature, when posted in the Dominion of Canada for destinations in the United States, are charged one cent for 2 oz., or fraction of 2 oz.-to be prepaid by postage stamp; and when sent from one place in Canada to another, and from Canada to Newfoundland, one cent per packet of 4 oz. or less; from Canada to Great Britain, one cent per 2 oz. None of the foregoing articles can be registered to places in Canada unless prepaid by letter or parcel post rates. Limit of weight for Canada, Newfoundland, Great Britain or United States is 5 lbs.; for other Postal Union countries, 4 lbs.

Seeds. Cuttings, Bulbs, Roots and Scions or Grafts can only be sent to the United States at Fifth Class matter; when posted for delivery in Canada, the postage is 1 cent per 4 oz., and the limit of weight 4 lbs.

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Postage rates on Legal and Commercial papers, addressed to the United Kingdom, British Colonies and Foreign Postal countries, are as follows: To countries where the letter rate is five cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz, the rate of legal and commercial papers is 5 cents for the first 10 oz., and one cent for each additional 2 oz or fraction; or to countries where the letter rate is 10 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz, the rate is 5 cents for the first 4 oz., and 2 cents for each additional 2 oz. Eligible for registry in Canada only when prepaid at letter or parcel post rates.

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The limit of weight to Great Britain, France, Germany. and all other countries in Europe, is eight ounces—postage 2 cencs for the first 4 oz., and 1 cent for every additional 2 oz.

No article liable to Customs duty can be sent as a sample or pattern to a postal Union country.

FOURTH CLASS MATTER.

Parcels.—Closed parcels from one place in Canada to another 6c per oz., and from the Maritime Provinces and Quebec to Great Britain 30c per lb. or fraction of a lb. Fee when registered, 5 cents. There is no parcel post with Newfoundland.

Closed parcels cannot pass between the United States and Canada.

A closed parcel for Great Britain must not exceed 4 lbs. weight nor be more than 2 feet long by 1 foot wide or deep. A customs declaration form, noting contents and value, must be securely affixed to the parcel with mucilage or paste.

By inland Canadian parcel post the weight of closed parcels is limited to 5 lbs., and the size to 2 ft. by 1 ft. The rate is 5 cents per 4 oz., or fraction of 4 oz. Closed parcels must be plainly marked "By Parcel Post."

FIFTH CLASS MATTER.

Postage rate 1 cent per oz. or fraction of an oz., to be prepaid by postage stamp.

Miscellaneous articles of merchandize, and generally all matter permitted to pass by mail in Canada which is not of the nature of a letter, and therefore subject to letter rate of postage, and not entitled to be posted at a lower rate than Fifth Class under one of the other classes, may pass as Fifth Class when addressed to any destination within the Dominion or United States.

Fifth Class matter may be so packed or put up as to be open to examination of contents, and must not exceed 4 lbs. in weight nor 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth.

When passing between Canada and the United States it will be sebject to Customs regulations if liable to duty.

The registration charge on f ifth Class matter is 5 cents in addition to postage.

RE-DIRECTED LETTERS.

Re-directed letters to places within the Dominion or U. S. will be forwarded without any additional charge if returned promptly to the office.

Letters sent to or received from a country of the Postal Union, and afterwards re-directed to any place in Canada, or to a country in the Postal Union, will be forwarded even if taken out of the office and re-addressed; but if re-addressed to a place where there is a higher rate of postage, the difference of postage will be chargeable.

REGISTERED MATTER.

Letters intended to be Registered, when addressed to places in Canada, must be prepaid by stamp, 2 cents each. For Newfoundland, Registered Letters, 2 cents, other articles 5 cents in addition to the

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MUTILATED STAMPS.

Letters havi g mutilated stamps, or stamps so soiled and defaced as to make it impossible for the sorting clerks to decide whether they have been used before or not, will be sent to the Postmaster-General for his adjudication.

MONEY ORDER SERVICE.

In sending money by mail it is always best to transmit by Money Order, if possible; if sent by letter it should always be registered.

Money orders issued and paid from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m.

Commission on Money Orders.—On M r.ey Orders drawn by any Money Order Office in Canada on any other Money Order Office in the Dominion is as follows: If not exceeding \$4, 2c.; over \$4 and not e::ceeding \$10, 5c.; over \$10 and not exceed ing \$20, 10c.; over \$20 and not exceeding \$30, 20c.; over \$40 and not exceeding \$60, 30c.; over \$60 and not exceeding \$80, 40c.; over \$80 and not exceeding \$100, 50c.

No single Money Order, payable in the Dominion of Canada, can be issued for more than \$100; but as many of \$100 each may be given as the remitter requires.

The other councrises and British Colonies upon which Money Orders are granted are distinguished by an *Asterisk* (*) in the Foreign Postal Table; the rates of commission in all cases being as follows: If not exceeding \$10, 10c.; over \$10 and not exceeding \$20, 20c.; over \$20 and not exceeding \$30, 30c.; over \$30 and not exceeding \$40, 40c; over \$40 and not exceeding \$50, 50c.

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TABLE FOR FORETELLING THE WEATHER.

This table, and the accompanying remarks, are the result of many years actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the Sun and Moon in their several positions respecting the Earth, and will, by simple inspection, show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the Moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom found to fail.

OBSERVATIONS.—The nearer the time of the Moon's change to noon or midnight, the more nearly will the result accord with the prediction.

The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

The Moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, *i. e.*, from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table,



WEIGHTS AND MEASURES INSPECTION.

The Weight and Measures Act provides that two gallons shall be a peck and eight gallons a bushel, and that after January 1st, 1886, in contracts for the sale and delivery of any of the under-mentioned articles, the bushel shall e determined by weight, unless conveniences for weighing are not available, cr unless a bushel by measure is specially agreed on in writing. the weight equivalent to a bushel being as follows: Wheat, 60 pounds; Indian corn. 50 pounds; rye, 56 pounds; peas, beans, and clover seed, 60 pounds; barley, timothy seed and buckwheat, 48 pounds; mait, 36 pounds; oats, 34 pounds; flaxseed, 50 pounds; heapseed, 44 pounds; blue grass seed. 14 pounds; cast r beans, 40 pounds; potatoes, turnips, cartots, parsnips, beets and onions, 60 pounds; bituminous coal, 70 pounds. Power is also given to the Governor-in Council to specify the weight of other articles equivalent to a bushel. Violations of the foregoing provisions subject the offender to a penalty not exceeding \$25 for the first offence and not exceeding \$50 for each subsequent offence.

ADDITIONAL REGULATIONS.


1. All apples packed in Canada for sale by the barrel shall be packed in good and strong barrels of seasoned wood made as nearly cylindrical as may be: the staves of such barrels shall be twenty-seven inches in length from Croe to Croe, with heads from sixteen and one-half to seventeen inches in diameter; and such barrels shall be sufficiently hooped with a lining hoop within the chimes, the whole well secured by nails.

2. Every person who offers or exposes apples for sale by the barrel, oth rwise than in accordance with the foregoing provisions of this section, shall be liable to a penalty of twenty-five cents for each barrel of apples so offered or exposed for sale.
