One of the shrewdest detectives in the business is George S. Dougherty of New York. Who is attending the convention of the chiefs of police in Teyonto. Mr. Dougherty is second deputy police commissioner and is the executive head of the detectives for the New York Police Department. He, with Commissioner Rhinelander Waldo, came to Toronto for the gathering of the police chiefs.

Mr. Dougherty was 23 years with the Pinkertons at New York. From 1835 to 1967, he was assistant superintendent, during which period he handled all the criminal operations for the American Bankers. Association, the Jewelers' Protective Union and the Jewelers' Security Alliance, and was chief of all criminal business for them thruout the United States and Canada From 1907 to 1911 he was superintendent for Pinkerton's in charge of the New York office.

In the spring of 1911, the detective bureau of the New York Police Department was in a chaotic state and was widely criticized by the newspapers of that city, when on April 27, Mayor William J. Gaynor offered Mr. Dougherty the second deputy commissionership, to which he was appointed on May 1, 1911. His appointment was on merit only and not in any way influenced by politics.

Commissioner Dougherty took personal charge of this case and in thirteen days had eight men under arrest for the robbery and one month after the holdup all of the eight men were convicted and sent to prison.

He knows thousands of people all over America in straignt and crooked life and is best known in Canada for his remarkable work in the Dominion Bank burglary at Napanee, Ont., in 1899, and in the David Russell matter recently aired in the Montreal courts. He is 47 years of age, is an all-around athlete, and rarely misses a Sunday during the winter months to indulge in an ocean bath.





SETTLERS IN FIRE DISTRICTS HAVE LAW IN THEIR OWN HANDS

When Careless or Reckless People Start Forest Fires They Can Be Arrested and Fined Heavily or Sent to Jail.

Deputy Minister Gibson told The World yesterday that the settlers in Clute Township and all other districts proclaimed as fire districts in the province have the remedy in their own hands when careless or reckless people start forest fires.

It is evident that the hazards of frontier life are always great, said Mr. Gibson, and such risks cannot entirely be eliminated, but there is ample legislation to cover carelessness.

He believed the government might be inclined to extend consideration to settlers who were burned out in such fires, in extending time for the fulfilment of their settlement duties, but they must make some statement of their case.

Facts Are Correct.

Facts Are Correct.

The facts, as stated in The World yesterday, were correct. Mr. Saunders is a different man from the member of the road gang. Both men started fires on the same day. These were equally destructive and dangerous.

As there appears to be a misapprehension among some of the settlers as to their rights and privileges, we quote the sections of the act, chapter 267, R.S.O., 1897, which applies to all fire districts, of which Clute Township is one:

1. The lieutenant-governor may, by proclamation to be made by him from time to time, issues by and with the advice and consent of the executive conscil, declare any part of the Province of Ontarlo to be a fire district,—R.S.O. 1887, c. 213.

4. No person shall set out, or cause to be set out or started, any fire in or

5. 




