LAW REFORM. We have in these columns already suggested reforms in the Superior Courts, and proposed to moderate and enable these courts to do much of the work in the administering of estates and in regard to lunatics and infants, which now presses on the High Court. It goes without saying that only persons of legal skill and capacity should be appointed to judicial offices, except in the case of clerkships. Politics and nepotism have played altogether too prominent a part in the appointment of individuals to quasi-judicial positions in this province. No greater mistake can be made than to appoint unskilled men to do special work. If the Government is in earnest in its proposed law reform, let it cease filling judicial and semi-judicial offices with decayed politicians. Our judicial system is burdened with political and family pensioners.

The administration of the law would be less expensive and much more satisfactory if it were freed from the red tape that meets one at every turn. A great deal of the red tape might be dispensed with. In old days all writs ran in the King's name, and were invalid without seals and stamps. Now many important processes may be begun by notice or petition, signed by the party or his solicitor. Why not extend this practice to all writs of summons, as is done in most of the States of the Union? Solicitors are sworn officers of the courts, and are as competent to prepare, sign and issue such primary processes as any of the many gentlemen who sit behind their desks at the County Court. The adoption of this idea could effect a great saving in time and cash, which would ensue to the benefit of the debtor and creditor, who have now a considerable sum to pay in stamps and fees in all proceedings.

There are some courts unnecessary, and they should be reformed or of existence. They are a vestige of the old regime, and they stand in the way of progressive law reform. In the present arrangement the Probate and Exchange divisions have disappeared, with the chief justice. Here the number of clerks is on the increase rather than decrease. There should be two chief justices, one the head of the High Court, who should also be the head of a second division of the Court of Appeal, when that is required to take work off the court proper. The law now provides for such an arrangement, but it being possible to appeal to Division One, or to the two judges, such appeals displace the two judges and are too often inconclusive. Freed from such situations, the ten judges of the High Court could be called in for a quorum to form an Appeal Court, and their number, on the least important appeals from the County and Division Courts three judges should form a quorum. Cases could be cited which have gone through the whole gamut of first trial and three appeals, ending in the Supreme Court of the province. If the appeal were in the first instance to a competent court no further appeal would generally be allowable, except in the most important matters, involving new and weighty principles.

As to Osgoode Hall itself there is room for great improvement in the arrangement of offices and the concentration of business. The building was erected under the old regime, when each court was a separate entity in itself, and, also, was not built for the use of the court, yet we find the officers scattered, each in his own nook. One would naturally think the accountant's office was the proper place to purchase stamps. Not so, however. The stamp office is a separate institution in itself, with an expensive official at its head. A clerk in the accountant's office could easily handle the stamps and save the people the salary of a highly paid and unnecessary official. And so with other officials. Concentration would reduce the expense of the clerical work at Osgoode Hall by 50 per cent., and the public would be better served. The various offices are scattered all over. The Attorney-General's scheme of law reform will not be complete until the various offices are brought to Osgoode Hall by removing unnecessary walls and bringing the offices together and having the business of the court conducted as in banks and other business establishments.

In the face of the severe foreign competition that is ahead of them there is only one course for the British iron manufacturer, and that is to erect a tariff barrier against foreign nations, and encourage the development of the iron and steel resources of the Mother Land and colonies conjointly. Great Britain and the colonies together can beat the competition of any country in the world. If we unite the capital and manufacturing facilities of Great Britain with the raw materials of this country, we will have a combination that cannot be surpassed by any other nation. STATE ENTRY INTO AMSTERDAM.

Queen Wilhelmina and Her Consort
Were Acclaimed by Thousands of the Citizens.

Amsterdam, March 5.—Queen Wilhelmina and the Prince Consort entered this city in state this morning.

The royal party arrived by train at half past eleven. They were received by the principal authorities, and conducted to the royal pavilion, where had gathered a brilliant array of officers and officials, including the Governor of the province of North-Holland and high military, naval, judicial and civil dignitaries.

The inauguration of Amsterdam delivered an address of welcome.

The procession in state carriage and escorted by troops then traversed the streets of the capital, which, in spite of the rain, and the fact that the route to the palace was lined by the elite guards and troops of the garrison. Salutes were fired as they advanced and the progress of the royal party was signalled by the ringing of church bells.

The royal equipage, drawn by eight horses, was preceded by a mounted band of honor composed of the Queen's aide-de-camp, who, brilliant in gold and colors, was the centre of attraction. On either side of the royal carriage rode the military officers. The procession was closed by a fine band of cavalry.

COULD NOT LIVE WITHOUT HER

And So Antonio Trillo, a Young Italian, Shot the Object of His Love to Death.

New York, March 5.—A 16-year-old actress, whose stage name was Mamie O'Neil, was shot and killed early today by her jealous lover, Antonio Trillo, 20 years old. The murder was committed at the corner of Mulberry and Bayard-streets. Trillo was arrested.

The girl and her mother, Santina Mazzavero, also an actress, had been traveling about the country giving performances in small concert halls and other resorts frequented by Italians. About a week ago they began an engagement at the Villa Umberto in Mulberry-street. They had appeared at this place on several other occasions, and it was here that Trillo met the girl.

While the girl and her mother and a friend were on the way home at 1 o'clock Trillo suddenly appeared, and, pointing a revolver at the girl, emptied the five chambers in quick succession. Two of the bullets took effect, each being sufficient to cause death. Trillo ran away, but he was captured by a policeman. He said the girl had preferred other men to him, and that he could not live without her.

New York, March 5.—The directors of the Commercial Cable Company, held here today, the usual quarterly dividend of 1 1/2 per cent, was declared, payable on April 1. The transfer books will be closed on March 20 and reopened on April 2.

RUSSIAN KILLED AMERICAN

Duel With Pistols Took Place at Ostend Monday, Growing Out of a Letter Written to a Lady.

COMBATANTS HIGH IN SOCIETY.

J. McW. Durant of New York Was the American—Russian's Name is Not Known.

Paris, March 5.—John WacWilson Durant of New York, who has been living for the past two years in Paris with his mother, at the Hotel Lafontaine Tremolle, was killed at Ostend, in a duel probably fought yesterday with a Russian count. According to the best information obtainable, Mr. Durant had written letters to the wife of the Russian count. The latter's nephew came to Paris to settle the matter and met Mr. Durant at the Hotel Lafontaine. Mr. Durant lost his front teeth. He struck the Russian with a heavy glass water bottle and the latter died, but the doctor's certificate gave congestion of the brain as the cause of death. The duel occurred during the night of March 4.

Later the count took the matter up, sending his seconds to Mr. Durant. The latter went to Ostend with his mother, who afterwards departed for and is in the city. A duel was arranged and was probably fought yesterday with pistols. Durant was killed, and the count was seriously wounded. Durant registered as Charles Neville Carter. His mother has been notified.

Durant was well known in the American colony here. He was a frequent attendant at official receptions given by the American officials. His engagement to a young French lady was recently announced. They were to be married soon. The names of the Russians in the case have not yet been ascertained.

Was an Albany Man.

Albany, N. Y., March 5.—The American reported killed in France is evidently John Wilson Durant of this city, who has been living in France for several years with his mother. Durant was in Albany on a short visit in December and returned in January to Paris. He came of a well-known and wealthy family. His father, who died several years ago, was an Albany merchant. Durant was about 28 years old and had studied law.

BOILERMAKERS JOIN THE STRIKE

Workmen on Corvigan's Steamer Italia, South Chicago, Have Gone Out in Sympathy.

Chicago, March 5.—The Tribune says: The boilermakers employed on the steamer Italia, owned by James Corvigan, a member of the Executive Board of the Lake Carriers' Association, have gone out on strike at South Chicago, in sympathy with the Marine Engineers. The action followed the receipt of a telegram from the Boilermakers' Union at Buffalo, which stated that the members of the union there had struck on all jobs of members of the Lake Carriers' Association. It is claimed the machinists, if it becomes necessary, will act with the engineers, and refuse to work on any of the vessels of the Lake Carriers' Association, until an agreement shall be reached with the engineers.

THE TURK IS SHORT OF CASH,

But Expects to Be Able to Pay the Installment to the Cramps on That Cruiser Soon.

Constantinople, March 4.—Via Sofia, Bulgaria, March 5.—It is now believed that the delay in payment of the first installment on the cruiser ordered by the Turkish government from the Cramps of Philadelphia is caused solely by the present poverty of the treasury. It is expected, however, that the first payment will be made shortly, thus keeping the contract in force.

STATE OWNERSHIP OF TELEGRAPH LINES

Continued From Page 1.

good service. What can the telegraph lines do in the way of supplementing the service of the postoffice?

Trade will be largely increased, and men will be able to do business in a country like Canada by telegraph, instead of three or four mails. If you can transmit 22 words for one cent, look what an impetus will be given to trade, when a man can do all his correspondence, for instance, between Montreal and Vancouver, by telegraph. You cannot imagine how that will help business in this country.

Take out-of-the-way places, where there are only two or three mails in the week, and if you have a national telegraph system, bringing every little hamlet in the country into touch with the business centres, see what a convenience every business man in that hamlet will have. They will be in touch with everything outside, and at a nominal cost. The telegraph service of this country is the saddest thing of all to nationalize. We have heard a great deal about nationalizing the railways. That is a very expensive proposition. I have been told, but it is not such an expensive proposition to nationalize the telegraph lines.

The Minister of Public Works (Mr. Tupper) How much would it cost? Mr. Macdonald: There are two ways in which you could do it. You could do it by duplicating the lines we have in Canada, at probably less than \$5,000,000, or you could take over the lines that are in existence to-day, and there is a special provision in the Telegraph Act for that purpose.

The Imperial Public Idea. There is another thing which I wish to urge as one of the great benefits that a national land and sea telegraph service would confer on the public. We in this country, and all over the British Empire, are trying to build up an Imperial telegraph system. We wish, in Canada, to think on all great public questions the same as they think in England, or in America. There is only one way to create that great Imperial public opinion from one end of the Empire to the other, and that is to have a national telegraph and cable system, which will enable the people to have the freest public opinion from one end of the British dominions to the other.

The Newspaper Service. The news that we get in Canada from England comes today thru American channels. The Canadian public, which is not able to pay the present toll rates, and to give that quality of news to the Canadian public which they desire, and which the Canadian public ought to get. But if we had a national cable system, with a nominal rate for press messages at night, when the cable is not busy, our people would know in the morning exactly what they think in Australia and South Africa, and that news would be transmitted daily at a most nominal cost. At all events, it is the news that we get in the United States, and I have watched this thing very closely. I have seen the class of news that the Canadian newspapers get by way of New York. It is not British opinion; it is not Imperial opinion, but it is British opinion, and it is the opinion of the people of the United States.

Proposes an Atlantic Cable. The Postmaster-General proposes to do what the other colonies have done; he proposes to supplement what they have done, but he fails to do what they have done, in nationalizing our land telegraph service in connection with this cable system. The hon. gentleman must afford to take us into his confidence to-day, and to at least tell us whether he is considering the proposition or not. Like everything else, when a national proposition comes before this country, we unfortunately take the worst end to begin with. I am in favor of this Pacific cable scheme, but I cannot help thinking that if we wanted to write a franchise business proposition it would be for Canada and Great Britain to lay down that Atlantic cable. There is any amount of business to be done in the five cables, owned by Great Britain and Canada; a cable that would pay a big dividend and probably one of the present rates down to one-quarter. That is the cable I would like to see first laid and operated by the Mother Country and Canada.

The Intercolonial an Instance. But, unfortunately, as I have said, when anything national is to be done, the hardest end and the most expensive end is first experimented on. In the case of the I.C.R., we commenced to build it at the eastern end and then the western portion of New Brunswick, and in the Province of Quebec, where there were very little traffic, and when we got it just to the point where the traffic originated, we stopped there. That was an extraordinary railway proposition for Canada. Sir, I want to see State ownership applied to railways and to telegraphs at that point, where there is lots of traffic for the line, whether it be a cable, telegraph or a railway. In the present we are asserting the principle of Government ownership, just where the conditions are least favorable. I am satisfied to take this measure where it is to-day placed before us, but I hope the Minister and the Government, in the light of the experience of the Mackay-Bennett cable, where they found their whole expense amounted to nothing until they established at great expense a system of land lines in the States, and then they were obliged to tell us now whether they are going to have a really national system, which can only be achieved by their ownership of the land telegraph lines in Canada.

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sta, and a cable across the Atlantic. Let us have a State-owned cable from Great Britain to Canada; a State telegraph system across the continent to the Pacific Ocean, and a State-owned cable across the Pacific to Australia, also forming a great system. We would then have an Imperial telegraph system that will give to the public, wherever it is, the best of Fleming, a service costing about one-tenth of what it does at present.

Fast is the standard Fleming. I believe the statement of Sir Stafford Fleming is correct in the respect that it is correct, and if he does believe it, I hope he will move on these lines. I want to tell the hon. gentleman that in this proposition he is up against the "great monopoly, almost in the world to-day, and that is the Eastern Telegraph Company. This monopoly will cut the throat of this scheme, if it can possibly do it. It may be a competitor with the Postmaster-General in getting hold of the land telegraph lines in Canada. If that great company in London thought they could block this scheme, that is one of the first things they would try to accomplish. I do not say they can do so, but all events, at every point, the Postmaster-General will be met by that great corporation trying to block the proposition. In this proposal the Postmaster-General (Hon. Mr. Mulock) has my entire sympathy. I believe he has the sympathy of the whole of Canada. The Government here are moving on the same lines as the Imperial authorities, and as the Australian authorities, but in one sense they are lacking, and that is that they are not making provision for the nationalization of the land telegraph lines in Canada, and are not making provision for a State-owned cable between the Motherland and Canada, where there is the most money to be made.
