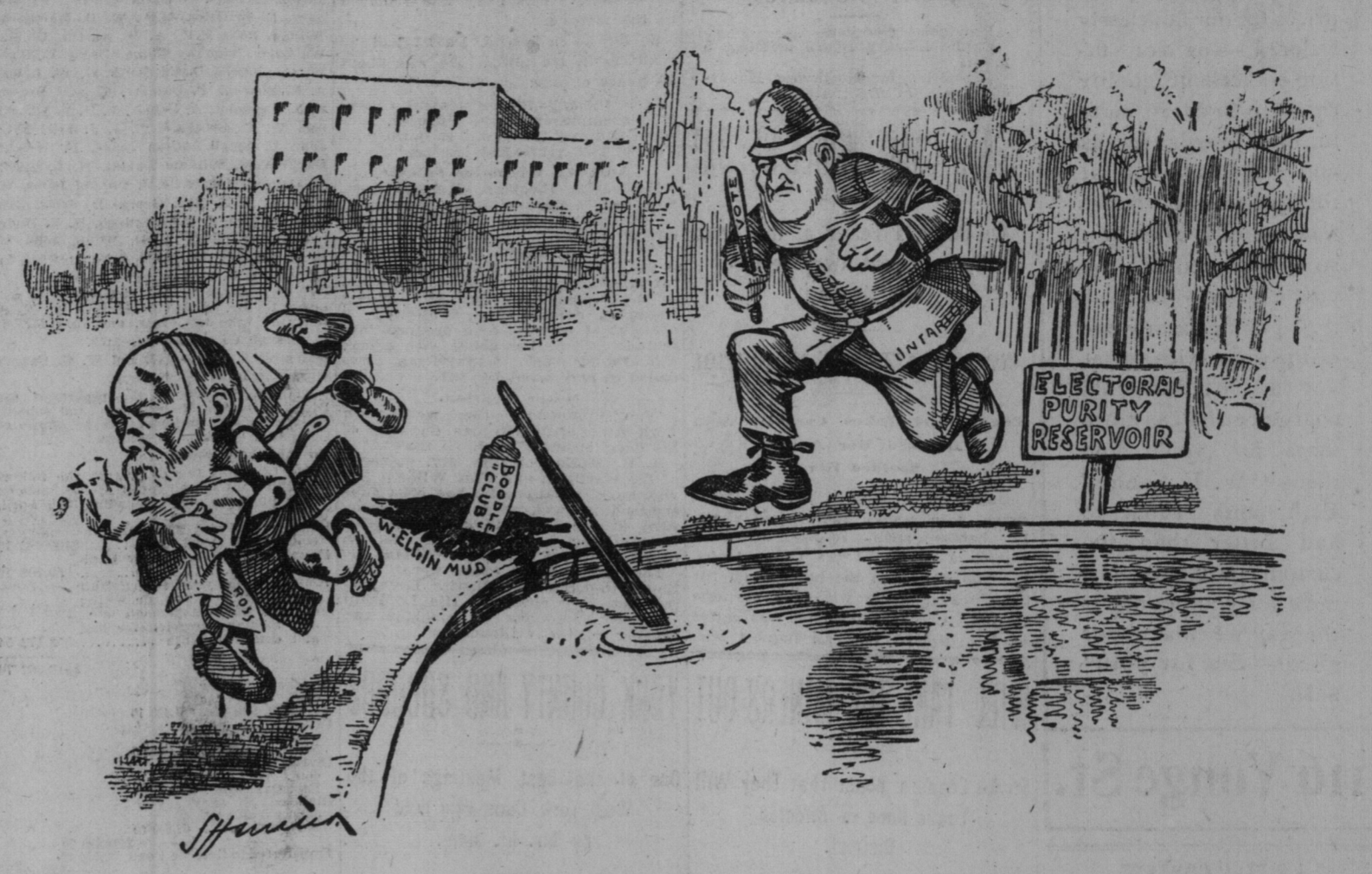

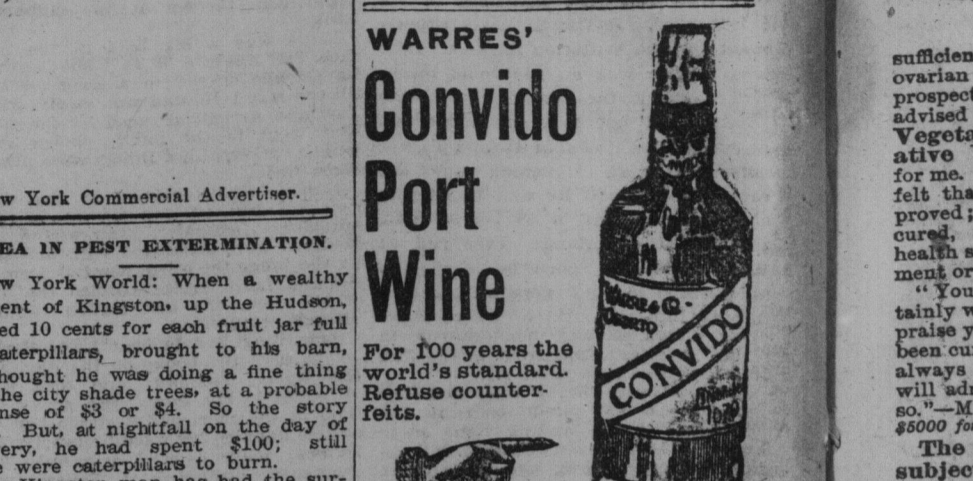

BANK CLERKS' SALARIES. For some time past there has existed in Canada a scarcity of bank clerks. The property of the country has opened up such lucrative avenues of work for young men that a good many, attracted by larger salaries, have left the banks for other positions.

The recent increase in the number of banks and bank branches has emphasized the difficulty of the situation, and at last a movement seems to be on foot looking to an improvement in the standard of remuneration paid to bank clerks.

It is stated that the Bank of Montreal has added 17 per cent. all round to the salaries of its employees, with special allowances for those stationed in the big cities, and that the Bank of Commerce and other financial institutions are following suit.

The movement is a good one, and deserves every encouragement. Bank employees have seldom been adequately paid, and the recent increase in the cost of living has made their salaries in cases look very paltry. THE BERNIER EXPEDITION

Royal Society of Canada Approves of the Chase After the North Pole.

TIDAL SURVEYS SATISFACTORY

Scientific Value of the Marine Biological Station Also Commended—Many Sections at Work.

The Royal Society reaffirmed their approval of Capt. Bernier's project to discover the North Pole yesterday.

Resolutions were also passed, expressing appreciation of the work done by the Dominion government for the benefit of navigation, thru the Tidal Survey Department, and of the great scientific and economic value of the work at present conducted at the Marine Biological Station of Canada.

President Landon Sir Sandford Fleming, Prof. McLeod, T. C. Keefer, Capt. Deville and Dr. H. T. Bovey were assigned to ascertain from the government what steps were taken to extend the triangulation system of the United States coast, and the geodetic survey in this country.

Fellows Elected. On recommendation of section No. 3, Prof. Barnes and Dr. J. C. Gieshan were elected fellows. On recommendation of section No. 1 (Literature, Francaise, etc.), Abbe G. Bourassa, Laval University, Montreal; Hon. Thomas Chapais, M. L. C., Quebec; E. M. Ernest Gagnon, Secretary of the Department of Public Works, Quebec, and M. E. Bellenave, Inspector Inland Revenue, Montreal, were elected members of that section.

Section No. 1, that devoted to French literature, met this morning and elected officers as follows: President, Senator Potier; vice-president, A. Poisson; secretary, Dr. Drome, Librarian Quebec legislature; delegates to Congress of Americanists, J. E. Roy, F. R. S. C. Lewis; E. Gerin, F.R.S.C., Ottawa.

Senator Potier read a paper on "Louisbourg in 1902," in which he described the present condition of the old fortress and urged the acquisition of a site by the government, and the putting of the place in a suitable state of repair. Mr. J. Edmond Roy read a paper on "The Dues in Canada." N. E. Dionne gave a sketch of the history of the Library of the Quebec legislature from 1792 to 1902.

Physical Science. In section No. 3, that devoted to mathematical, physical and chemical sciences, Prof. B. J. Harrington read an exceedingly interesting paper on "A Modification of Victor Meyer's Vapor Density Apparatus." Some new apparatus was shown. Dr. J. C. McLennan read a paper on "The Dues in Canada." The Potential Difference, required to Produce Discharge in Air and Other Gases." This lecture was illustrated by lantern slides. Three papers were read on radio activity: one, "Radio activity induced in salts by cathode rays and by the discharge rays from an electric spark," written by W. R. Carr; another on "Radio activity induced in substances exposed to the action of atmospheric air," by R. M. Stewart; and "Excited radio activity from the atmosphere," by S. J. Allan.

Geological Nomenclature. In section No. 4, devoted to geological and biological sciences, Dr. Adams presided. Dr. Bell reported with regard to the movement of the Royal Society for the attainment of a uniform system of geological nomenclature over the continent. The work will be continued. A committee, consisting of Sir James Grant, Dr. Burgess and Prof. D. P. Penhallow, was appointed to act with section No. 2 in regard to ethnological work in Canada. Prof. Prince of the Marine Biological Laboratory was recommended for election as a fellow.

Prof. G. T. Hays read a paper on "Botanical Work in New Brunswick." Dr. Wesley Mills read an exceedingly interesting paper on "The Behavior of Blind Animals." A paper by the same author on "Certain Methods for the Investigation of the Nervous System," was taken as read. A series of bibliographies for 1901 was presented. On "Canadian Entomology," by Rev. Dr. C. J. S. Bethune; on "Canadian Zoology," by Prof. Whitlavest; on "Canadian Botany," by Dr. Ami; on "Canadian Botany," by Dr. Mackay.

In the English Literature Section, Rev. Dr. Bryce delivered a lecture on "Metaphysical Poet Garry," illustrated by limelight views.

CITY ACCOUNTS CRITICIZED

Board of Control Wants to Know Why Tenders Are Not Being Asked

FOR CATTLE MARKET LUMBER

Two Meetings of the Board Yesterday—Matters at the City Hall.

The Board of Control held two sessions yesterday. In the morning, the Mayor criticized the recommendation of the Works Committee that application be made to the Railway Committee of the Privy Council at Ottawa, to apportion what share of the cost of the Yonge-street bridge should be borne by the city and the railway companies.

He thought the railways should pay the whole cost of the bridge, and the board upon His Worship's suggestion, recommended that the Railway Committee be asked to apportion the cost of the bridge.

Negotiations will be entered into with the railway companies for consent to use York-street Bridge for a loop line of street cars along the water front, between Yonge and York-streets.

Local Improvements. The following contracts for local improvements were endorsed by the board:

Concrete sidewalks—Sullivan-street, N. Beverley to Huron, Harbord & Leach Paving Co., \$110; King-street, N. Wilson-avenue to Queen, W. R. Payne, 74; Elm Grove, W. King to Melbourne, W. F. Grant & Co., \$109; Huron-street, a College to Russell, R. A. Rogers & Co., \$10; Cookman-street, W. Dundas-street to St. Anne's-road, W. R. Payne, 62; Spadina-street, a College to York-street, Crescent Constructing and Paving Co., \$10; Huron-street, a, Berard to Dupont, Crescent Constructing and Paving Co., \$10; Front-street, a, Lorne-street to point 311 feet west, W. Chamberlain, 124; Devon-street, W. McKenzie-crescent to Dundas-street, W. R. Payne, \$114.

Devon-street, Devon-street, Dominion Paving and Constructing Co., \$10; Macadam roadway—York-street, Front to 518 feet south, Dominion Paving and Constructing Co., \$2203; 518 feet turned down.

The board turned down the application of Alexander Gilles for salary during the time he was serving in South Africa. He was allowed half-pay, and asked for the other half.

Cyclorama Lease. "It is too much of two men looking after one thing," remarked Ald. McMurich at the afternoon session, when the lease of the Cyclorama property was under discussion. The Property Committee, in obedience to the instructions of the Council, reported that it had considered the question of an alternative proposition, looking toward an exchange of property, in the case of the Cyclorama property, an overhead bridge at the foot of Yonge-street, and favored the recommendation of the Property Committee, that the Cyclorama property be leased for manufacturing purposes. Ald. McMurich and the Mayor agreed with the Property Committee. Ald. Crane did not express himself on the matter, but he favors the idea of exchanging the property, fought strenuously in support of the idea. The board, at the suggestion of Ald. McMurich, decided to await a joint report from the Assessor and the Mayor, before the arrangement for the leasing of the property provides for a rental of \$2000 per annum, which will amount to a similar sum.

More Money for Cattle Market. There are few meetings of the board which do not include a request for more money for the Cattle Market improvements. Another item of \$11,500 was asked, for latrines incurred.

S. T. S. Wicks, who bought the chateaux of the Britannia Life-Saving Station, has been granted permission to remove the station and its contents.

The City Commissioner will dispose of the buildings on the lands required for the Cattle Market extension, by private sale. The present weigh scales will not be removed to a more suitable location, at a cost of \$1150, until the board gets more information.

Commissioner on the Carpet. City Commissioner Coatsworth was questioned at some length in regard to the purchase of the carpet for the lumber for Cattle Market improvements. The Commissioner had made the purchase of the carpet, without the sanction of the Property Committee or the Board of Control. The Mayor, however, stated that he would be asked by tender. 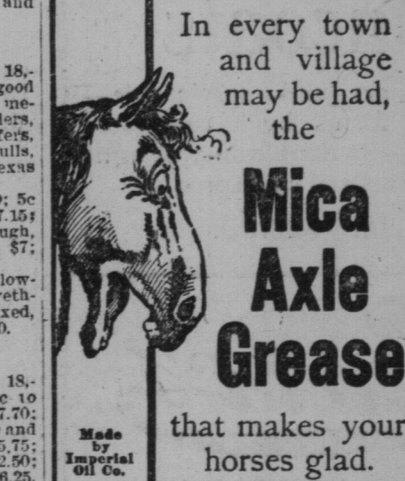
