TREATING WAS PROVEN  
Only One Witness Required to Induce  
Judges to Unseat Hugh  
Clark.  
RESPONDENT ADMITTED AGENCY.

Walking Court, Jan. 28.—Fifteen minutes after the court opened this morning Mr. Centre Bruce election trial the seat was declared vacant. The evidence of Donald Galbraith was alone necessary to unseat Mr. Clark, it being to the effect that Donald McClure had treated several men, the witness among them, at his hotel in Paisley on the day of the election. The agency of McClure was established on Tuesday by the reading of the examination for discovery of the respondent. The respondent's solicitor, Edmund Bristol, then admitted that as agency and treating had been proven there was no use in proceeding any further. Permission was obtained for the respondent to put the witness in the box. He said the treating had been done without his consent and he had been on several occasions that he desired a clean election. "I think I should tell you," said Mr. Justice Macleannan, "that your examination reads very satisfactorily and that, notwithstanding that you refused to answer some questions, I think your evidence fairly given."

Chancellor Boyd said that at the examination Mr. Clark's counsel, Mr. Macpherson, had taken the responsibility for the refusal to answer certain questions. The seat was then declared vacant and Mr. Riddell announced that in view of the great saving in costs, the cross-petition against Dr. Stewart was also dropped.

**IGNORING THE SAW-OFF.**  
Edmund Bristol and W. R. Riddell returned to Toronto last night and were asked by The World what arrangement, if any, had been entered into between the Conservative and Liberal lawyers at the time the pro-secution was arranged to include Centre Bruce in the deal, but each declined to have anything to say at all on that question. It is known, however, that when Mr. Clark was placed on his examination for discovery at Walkerton some weeks ago he refused to answer the question as to whether he had an agreement with Hon. Richard Harcourt to saw off Centre Bruce against the Government of Ontario. On this point, it is alleged, the Conservatives dropped the fight against Mr. Harcourt's seat, but Hon. Mr. Dryden refused to sanction such an arrangement and when Premier Ross returned from England he, too, refused to consent to it being announced that some of the ministers had been careful to make their own seats secure without seeing to it that the Minister of Crown Lands (Mr. Davis) was pulled out of the very deep hole he found himself slipping into in North York. It is alleged that he has all along maintained that the Centre Bruce petition should be called off, and that he had put his name to the agreement they continued to ignore him.

**CANADIAN PACIFIC PLANS.**  
Will Build the Puget Sound Line 18 1/2 Miles Long.  
Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 28.—It was announced here today that United States Senator George Turner has accepted the position of special counsel for the Canadian Pacific Railway, to take effect upon the expiration of his term in March. As special and general manager he will have general charge of the Canadian Pacific of the construction by it during the next year of the Tacoma, Seattle and Canada Railroad, 18 1/2 miles in length, which is to be built from Tacoma to Sumas on the international boundary. There it will connect with a short branch line north to the Canadian Pacific main line.

The Canadian railroad recently decided that the time had come to get a direct connection with Puget Sound cities as its right of entrance over the Northern Pacific may be abruptly cut upon the termination of the present contract.

**ALASKA IS THE LEVER TO OPEN OTHER DOORS**  
United States Government Wants to Have Boundary Question Put to Rest.  
Washington, Jan. 28.—Senator Foster of Washington recently presented to Secretary Hay the request of some of his constituents for the establishment of a fish hatchery on the Fraser River in British Columbia, which has called for a general statement from the Secretary showing it to be the policy of the State Department to take no action upon any minor questions affecting the relations between the United States and Canada so long as the dispute over the boundary between British America and Alaska remains undetermined.

In a letter to Senator Foster the Secretary says: "The recommendations of the Joint High Commission so far as they touched upon the subjects upon which concurrent opinions were reached, are still in abeyance. The drift of sentiment on both sides being that while an agreement upon the subjects brought before the commission appeared to be desirable, and for the most part obtainable, it seemed appropriate to dispose of them as a separate matter, to the adjustment of the main question of the Alaskan boundary. The indisposition of the Canadian government to assent to the settlement of the subordinate question pending the disposal of the boundary question makes it unlikely that a particular detail of the general plan would be favorably considered by the British government at this time."

**ALLIES COME IN FIRST**  
CONFER WITH MR. BOWEN  
Claim Preferential Treatment Over Nations Which Did Not Exert Pressure.  
Washington, Jan. 28.—The British and Italian ambassadors and Count Quadi, the German Charge d'Affaires, called on Mr. Bowen, Venezuela's representative in the negotiations looking to a raising of the blockade and a settlement of the claims against Venezuela, about 10:30 o'clock last night. This conference was by appointment, and at the request of the representatives of the allies.

**DEMANDS ARE MODERATE**  
SHOULD BE ACCEDDED TO  
Premier Ross Says Ontario Would Benefit by the Addition to Its Revenue.  
DELEGATES FROM DOWN-BY THE SEA Want Quebec's Representation Increased Rather Than Reduction of Their Own.

Ottawa, Jan. 28.—The formal presentation yesterday of the Quebec conference did not conclude the business of the Provincial delegates with the Dominion government. Premier Murray and Attorney-General Longley, Nova Scotia, and Hon. G. W. Ross, Premier of Ontario, left for their homes. But the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island representatives, Premiers Tweedie and Peters, had a long hearing before the cabinet today on the subject of Federal representation. The next redistribution bill, based on the census of 1901, will reduce the representation of Prince Edward Island by 1 member of the Commons, and that of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick by 2 members each. The Maritime Premiers urged that the constitution be amended, so as to increase Quebec's representation, rather than reduce the others on the basis of the unit of population, established by Quebec's fixed representation of 65 members. They admit, however, that, so long as the proportionate representation of the provinces is not disturbed, the objection to the present system is founded largely upon a sentimental aversion to reduction in the number of members which a Province at present returns to the Commons.

**PREDICTS SUCCESS.**  
Ottawa, Jan. 28.—Hon. G. W. Ross this morning predicted success for the Federal subsidies by reason of the moderation and justice of the demands. "The process of enactment of the new scale would be doubtless the drafting of a bill by the Dominion government, which bill in the form of a memorial from the Dominion Parliament would be forwarded to the home authorities. The only barrier to the passage of the Imperial Act would be a single line to provide that the per capita subsidy to the provinces would be based on the last decennial census rather than on the census of 1901, as at present obtains."

New York, Jan. 28.—The total loss of life by last night's fearful collision on the Central New Jersey Railroad at Graceland, N.J., is figured to-night to be 20. In addition to these, Engineer Davies and Fireman McCarthy of the Philadelphia, and Reading express, who are in the hospital at Plainfield, are in a precarious moment, and it is believed that several of the injured passengers cannot recover.

**BEARS ATE BABY.**  
Attacked Children of Mountaineer and Killed the Youngster.  
Richmond, Va., Jan. 28.—A Bedford City, Va., special says: A few days ago, three black bears attacked the children of a mountaineer named Parker, living on the road from Mount Aracadia, in the James River, and killed and ate his two-year-old baby. Parker's three children were playing on the edge of the woods only a few hundred yards from the house, when the bears suddenly made their appearance. The two older children were saved, but the mother ran to save the little one, and the bears had killed the child. During the winter black bears have been very troublesome, and have preyed on hogs and cattle to such an extent that owners have been forced to keep their stock housed.

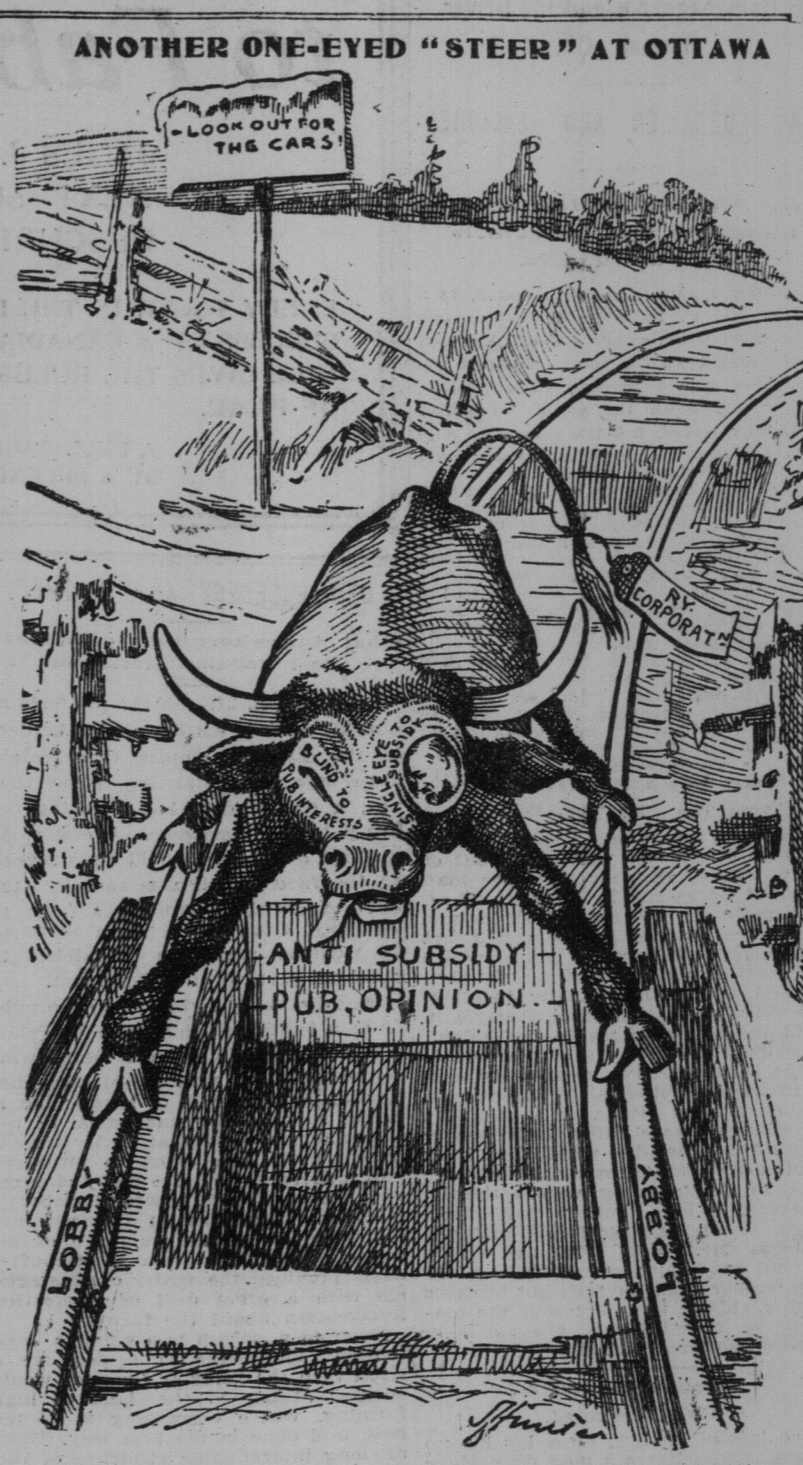

Port Hope, Jan. 28.—(Special)—The inquiry, to place the cause of the death of Fireman Matthews and Brakeman Everist, was resumed here this morning by Coroner Aldrich. H. A. Ward, M. P., appeared for McDougall, the Newtonville agent. W. W. Pope of Belleville appeared for the G. T. R. The first witness called was George Prescott, conductor of westbound train extra, west, 805, on the day of the wreck. He left here about 6:10 o'clock p.m., and had orders to meet third 84 at Newtonville. He was riding in the engine. When about four miles west of Port Hope he saw another train coming. He told the other men on the westbound train, and then he jumped to the south side of the track. He was badly cut, but helped to look for the missing men, and then walked back to Port Hope, and reported to headquarters. He said that if there were no orders against it, the eastbound train always had the right of track.

**ONTARIO FARMERS WANT**  
**TEN THOUSAND HELPERS**  
Scarcity of Labor Discussed by Representative Councillors and Farmers of York County.  
**IMMIGRATION BUREAU PLANS.**  
Enquiry Circular Sent to Farmers of Ontario—Help Expected From Great Britain.

The scarcity of labor on the farm of York and adjoining counties has given rise to a feeling of apprehension among the farmers, and not a few of them express the belief that this year the crops will suffer considerably if some steps are not taken to provide sufficient help in the harvesting season. Not only are harvesting hands likely to be scarce, but there seems to be a general want of good intelligent labor the year round.

**French Thrift Depopulates France.**

One of the perpetual questions in France, but nevertheless highly important, is that of depopulation. It is well known that the population in France is practically stationary—an excess of births over deaths of one thousand, as against an excess of 138 and 114, respectively, in Germany and England. Germany is adding 4,000,000 to her population every five years, which means that, if one takes the military losses into account, she would be the more in that period to put in line against the enemy. Closely bound up in this question, as Mr. Hamilton insists in an excellent article in The Matin, is the question of the French, which has been exaggerated into a positive force of the legally enforced system of the division of property. The fear of being unable to provide for the old and the young has become a serious obstacle to a growth of population. Now a recent proposition has been laid before the Academy of Sciences, the Moral Science, which contains at least the germ of a remedy. The author, Colonel Touche, at once proposes the father of a family should have the free distribution of his property, so that the present generation might be avoided, a son with children now receiving exactly the same proportion as a son without children. The real solution, I think, is to be found here.

## LORD ROSEBERY AS A FARMER.

What Agriculture Owes to England's Most Popular Statesman.

London, Jan. 21.—On the platform at a small railway station on the borders of the Russian empire there might have been seen standing, some time ago, a sure and box awaiting despatch to the continent. A closer inspection of the box would have revealed the fact that it was sent by the Earl of Rosebery from his farm at Dalmeny, from where farm seeds of all varieties are often despatched to different parts of the Continent.

Lord Rosebery is known to the public as a politician who was once Prime Minister, who has owned a Derby winnery, and who has won considerable distinction in the world of letters; but it is not only his hard work, but his intelligent enterprise, that will keep British agriculture alive and flourishing in face of the forceful competition it has to encounter from abroad. And certainly no one in the country has done more for the benefit of the farmer than the owner of Dalmeny.

## A PLAGUE OF SEALS.

In Northern Norway, however, the cry of alarm is even greater, the district being almost ruined by the devastation of the fisheries, which are the staple means of livelihood of the population.

It is suggested that the Norwegian fisheries should be utilized in the work of abolishing the seals.

It is declared that if extraordinary measures are not taken the Norwegian fisheries will be destroyed for many years.

NO SHOW FOR THE COUNTRY As Partner With Grand Trunk It Would Rank Last on Company's Assets.

DEMAND NOT FROM THE PEOPLE. Farmers' Sun on Railway Situation—Witness Would Grant Charter, Nothing More.

A strong case against the principle of granting any form of government assistance to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway is submitted in an article in The Weekly Sun.

It has been announced from several quarters, says the writer, that the aid required by the promoters of the Grand Trunk Pacific would not be in the form of a subsidy or a land grant, but would take the form of a government guarantee of bonds.

The proposal now made amounts, then, simply to a request that the government should rank first on the assets of the company, should rank last. In fact, it would not be a creditor at all. Its prospect of getting anything back would depend upon the road becoming a dividend-paying concern.

It is usually far better to have a claim against a farm subject to the mortgage of the owner, than to have no claim whatever. On the other hand, if the stockholder should be indebted and manipulated by the promoters, as the stockholder of nearly every railroad in this country is, he would be practically ruined.

But we are told, government aid will be made conditional upon government regulation of rates. Can it be that the government has so long refrained from exercising its right to control rates that people think that the right no longer exists? Yet the fact is that the right of parliament to fix and control railway rates is a sacred right.

There is a marked difference between paying dividends on the cost of a railroad and paying dividends on its stock issues. The former is a return on investment, the latter is a return on a loan.

There is no evidence, so far, that the proposal that the government become a stockholder in the Grand Trunk Pacific is a step towards the securing of a dividend-paying concern.

THE METROPOLITAN BANK

The First Annual Meeting of the Shareholders of the Metropolitan Bank was held at the Bank's Head Office in Toronto, on Tuesday, 27th January, 1933, at eleven o'clock a.m.

After reading the notice convening the meeting, the Secretary read the following general statement:

General Statement

York County and Suburbs FIRE CHIEF ON HIS METTLE

Says That a Fireman's Union Would Have a Serious Effect on Discipline.

AGAINST THE CITY'S INTERESTS.

Matter Was Before the Fire and Light Committee and the Chief of Firemen Was Emphatic. There is not the slightest shadow of a doubt left as to where Fire Chief Thompson stands in regard to the Firemen's Union. The chief came down with both feet very strongly against it at a meeting of the Fire and Light Committee yesterday afternoon, and he deplored the position in which such a union placed the city. His contention was that he had favored uniform in trades, but in the civic service it was a menace to discipline, and particularly in such an institution as the fire brigade it was something which should never be allowed.

The matter was broached when J. H. Huddellstone and D. W. Kennedy, representing the Trades and Labor Council, asked to be heard in regard to the Firemen's Union. Their contention in brief was that there should be no opposition to the union strike fund, and that the Fire and Light Committee should not interfere. They were not hurrying anybody. Their organization program was in their own minds, and it was for their own benefit and that of their fellow workers who had been elected for the fire brigade.

Chief Thompson opposed it tooth and nail. He said that discipline would be impaired and that a lack of confidence in the brigade would result if the firemen were under the jurisdiction of a trades and labor body. He said he had called at every station and explained to the men that he thought they should not join the union, but some of them thought it would injure the department.

Chief Thompson said that in cases of strikes, and there was a fire in the establishment where the strike occurred, no matter how hard the firemen worked to subdue it, the people would say the sympathy of the firemen had been with the strikers, and that therefore no sufficient effort had been made to put out the fire.
