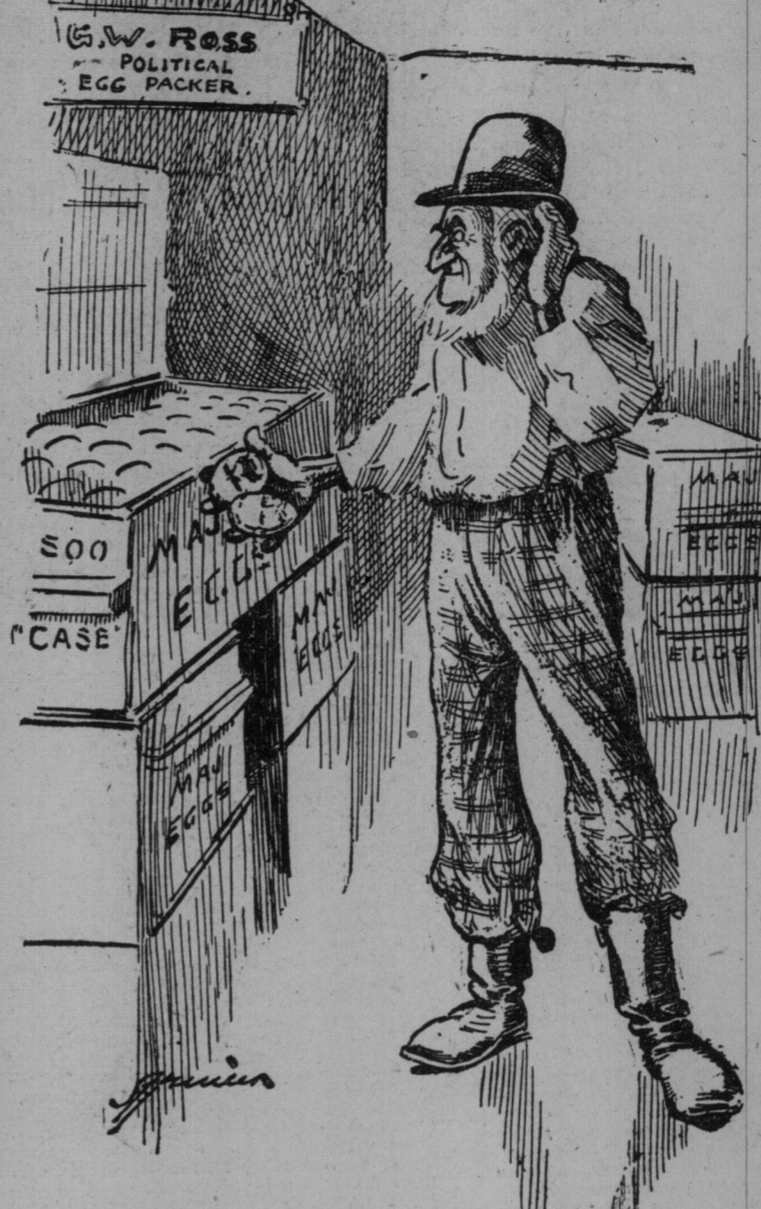

THE CANADIAN SEA.

The minister of marine has introduced a bill providing machinery for asserting jurisdiction over the whale fishery in Hudson Bay, where for many years the industry has been monopolized by Americans. Ten years ago notices were sent to American ports on the Atlantic, where whalers outfit, that Canada claimed jurisdiction in the Canadian Sea. By the new bill the minister of marine is authorized to exact a license fee from whalers. Regulations are made with a view to preventing the wanton and wasteful slaughter of whales, and also in regard to the establishment of stations where whale oil and bone may be extracted. In accordance with the same policy, the Canadian government will send out expeditions for the purpose of claiming jurisdiction and hoisting the British flag on various points. These are measures that will be generally approved by Canadians, and they will not begrudge liberal expenditures for the purpose of carrying them into effect. But we must bear in mind that valuable privileges and franchises may be seized by others besides American whalers. The Dominion government must not become possessed of the idea that the Hudson Bay region can be developed only by giving away valuable privileges for long periods. We might just as well have the Yankee whaler as the Hudson Bay Fisheries and Whale Company, or the Hudson Bay Mineral Development Company. Another point to be borne in mind is the importance of railways to the Canadian Sea, and of the ports which will form their terminals. There is no reason why whale and fish products should not be brought to these points, prepared for commercial purposes and transported thru Canadian territory. The difference in the sea voyage would be so much in favor of Canada that would offset all the other advantages that the Americans might enjoy.

MAKE ONE MAN RESPONSIBLE.

In the coming election for controller there should be absolutely no interference with Mr. Littlejohn, as chief returning officer for the city. He should appoint all the deputies according to his own judgment, and he should be held responsible for the exercise of his judgment. On this ground The World believes that a good purpose would be served by indicting Mr. Littlejohn for the frauds committed in the last election. Not because he had any connection with them, or any guilty knowledge of them; but because it is a good principle, in fixing responsibility, to strike at the top. For executive acts, and especially for acts connected with elections, there ought to be no divided authority and no divided responsibility.

EXTREME IDEAS OF SALVAGE.

The contention that wholesalers should have moved their goods out before the fire reached their buildings seems hardly reasonable. Who knew in what direction, or how far the fire was going? Who could gauge the exact direction or force of the wind, or the resisting power of any building the fire might encounter in its path? There was no reason to expect that it would stop at or before Yonge-street; there is nothing sacred about Yonge-street, so that according to this contention all the merchants and manufacturers east of Yonge-street should have been hauling out and carting away their goods as soon as the fire drew near the custom house. In all probability such a line of conduct would have resulted in a farce. This city has not at its command unlimited facilities for transporting and storing goods in an emergency. Let us suppose, for example, that Messrs. Eby, Blain & Company, doing business east of Yonge-street, had begun frantically telephoning for express wagons and warehouse accommodation, and carrying out parcels of tea, sugar and raisins in the midst of the excitement of the fire. Suppose a similar panic had seized The Globe or The World as soon as The Telegram building was attacked? Everybody would have laughed at them, and no good would have been done. There was a certain element of danger, of course; but there are some dangers against which you cannot provide.

THE GOVERNMENT'S UNIVERSITY POLICY.

About a month ago the graduates of the University of Toronto met the Ontario government and asked for a grant for a new physics building. The amount was \$250,000, involving a annual charge of \$10,000 a year on a 4 per cent. basis. The premier's reply was that the province could not afford the money. In the legislature the other day he made a similar plea, comparing the amounts given by the province for various branches of education, and contend-

ing that higher education was liberally endowed.

The supplementary estimates brought down in the closing hours of 1903, contained an item of \$6000 for the mining school at Kingston. If this is an annual grant, it represents, on the 4 per cent. basis, to which we have referred, \$150,000, or three-fifths of the sum required for the physics building. In the last few years the provincial grants to Queen's have been increased steadily and largely. The province now pays for nearly the whole physical science department of Queen's. If the Ontario government was adopting now with the rivalries of universities instead of one, or several others, the establishment of rival universities, it ought to say so frankly. It is anything but frank or straightforward to tell the University of Toronto that the money for its buildings cannot be afforded, and then to smuggle thru the legislature a large grant for similar purposes to Queen's. What is the university policy of the government? Has it any clearly defined policy, or are its actions guided by the personal friendships and animosities of Premier Ross?

These are matters on which the people of Ontario are surely entitled to some information. We are not dealing now with the rivalries of universities. Queen's has done and is doing good work in its own line. But it is not a provincial institution, and ought not to receive provincial aid while the plea is urged that the province has not money enough to carry on the work of the provincial university.

POPULATION OF NORTH AMERICA.

It is estimated that the population of the United States at the present time is about eighty millions. The next census—1910—will probably show about ninety millions, and about 1915 we may expect that the hundred million mark will be reached. It requires no prophetic talent to tell us that there will be great jubiliations and celebrations of that time. In fact, it is altogether likely that some patriotic congressman will suggest the taking of a special census to catch the United States at the happy moment. Our neighbors are fond of counting and measuring things. One of them asked the writer what Brock's monument was intended to commemorate. In the midst of his explanation the latter enquired: "How high is it?" thus averting a great international controversy. Putting international controversies aside, there can be no doubt that both the United States and Canada will see enormous increases in population during the present century. They now contain, together, less than ninety million people. They could accommodate five hundred millions and still be far more sparsely populated than Europe. The English language will prevail throughout the enormous community, and there will be certain similarities in the evidences of civilization. The fact that the two peoples will live under different political institutions will be rather an advantage than otherwise, encouraging healthier rivalry, and checking the growth of undue national self-conceit and other faults of isolation.

FIRES IN BRITISH CITIES.

From whatever cause arising it seems to be undoubted, that fires, while possibly as numerous as never so serious nor so disastrous in the great cities of Britain as are those of the cities of the American continent. This result cannot be set down to any superiority in the fire extinguishing appliances in use, or to any greater efficiency on the part of the brigades. In the opinion of United States experts—no possibly the judgment is not altogether unprejudiced—neither the plant nor the staff, as a rule, equal to that of a western city. How is it, then, that the fire-fighters of England and Scotland seem to be able to confine an outbreak within much narrower limits than is unfortunately the case on many occasions on this side of the Atlantic? This is so even in London, where the older and denser portions intersected by narrow and winding streets and lanes offer a fine field for the spread of fire and present correspondingly great difficulties in the struggle with it. The staff of the London fire brigade in 1900 numbered 1216 for a population of about 7,000,000, which included the chief, second and third officers and all ranks down to the workshop and clerical staff. In that year there were 4529 calls, of which 3.40 per cent. were serious and 96.60 per cent. slight. The fire staff of Glasgow, for a population of, roughly, 700,000 totaled 116 including the chief officer, superintendent and all ranks. Manchester's brigade numbered 106 of all ranks, Belfast had 78 and Birmingham 65.

Gave Him a Signet Ring.

R. J. Hamilton of the Equitable Life in this city is being congratulated by his numerous friends on receiving from the head office in New York a hand-some signet ring bearing the emblem of the Equitable Society. This is a result of his magnificent record during the last three months of personal business in this time, which is a good year's worth for any ordinary insurance man. Mr. Hamilton graduated with honors from Toronto University, and has since held the position of President of the Equitable Life in New York. He was the winner of the gold watch given about a year ago to the leader among the hundred or more graduates composing this school. In Hamilton is business manager of the University of Toronto.

Blood Stains on His Knife.

Boston, Mass., April 25.—The station on Charles Tucker's broken knife are those of human blood, according to Dr. E. S. Wood, of the Harvard chemist. This is the first time the statement has been positively made. At the hearing in Waltham last week it was stated that the broken blade bore stains of blood, but that it was human blood was not stated. He wrote and told the handle of the knife is still missing. Tucker has been held for the grand jury on the charge of killing Miss Mabel Page.

FROM YANKEELAND.

Immigration Into the Northwest Increases—Hush From All Points.

Ottawa, April 25.—(Globe Special).—The Department of the Interior is in receipt of most satisfactory reports in regard to immigration from the United States. The reports are sent in by W. J. White, Inspector of Immigration agencies, who has just returned from a tour of inspection. It is expected that North Dakota will this year contribute about 7000, as compared with 5385 last year. On account of the bad weather in the Northwest, the immigration officials have been under the necessity of keeping settlers back. Minnesota will make a better showing than last year, but the increase will not be large. The immigration to Canada than at any time in the past. The number of those buying and speculation on the decrease, but that is a good sign. Immigration from Illinois will be considerably better than in some time. There are about six cars of settlers' effects, as such as during the whole of last year from the States. Immigration is better, and the prospects are good. Immigration from Indiana, Missouri, Nebraska and Wisconsin will be better than last year. From Michigan the rush will be considerably greater. There is a growing interest in the Eastern States in immigration to Canada, and the prospects are such that the east will supply a good number. The west will also give more than last year.

POPE WILL PROTEST.

Rome, April 25.—President Loubet of France (who arrived in Rome yesterday to repay the visit of King Victor Emmanuel to Paris last October) went in a royal cortege to the Pantheon to lay wreaths on the tombs of King Victor Emmanuel II and King Humbert. He was received by the veterans of the Italian army. The function was of the most impressive nature. President Loubet speaking to the veterans and to those of whom medals were given for fighting in 1859 with the French against Austria. With the same cortege President Loubet proceeded to the Palazzo Margherita to pay a visit to the queen mother, Margherita. He remained a half hour, and then he returned to the Pantheon, where he expressed his intention to protest against the visit of President Loubet to Rome, on the Pope's part. This is the first occasion on which the president of a Catholic country has visited the Quirinale since the fall of the Papacy. The protest, however, is not known when or under what form the protest will be issued.

ENTERTAINED PRINCE HENRY.

Heavy Demands on Cashier Induced Him to Rob Employer.

New York, April 25.—Bertam Nagelschmit, cashier of the Hermann Furniture Company, who disappeared December 19, leaving an alleged shortage of several thousand dollars in his accounts, has been arrested. He returned from Montreal in order to effect a settlement with his creditors and to give to his former employers. Nagelschmit was a member of numerous German societies in Montreal, and he is reported in entertaining Prince Henry of Prussia two years ago. His heavy expenditures in meeting social obligations, he admits, caused him to use some of the company's funds, but not to the extent of \$15,000, as is charged by the detectives.

OBJECT TO ORIENTALS.

Contractor for Australian Mail Must Do Without Them.

Ottawa, April 25.—Owing to objections on the part of the Australian government to Orientals working on vessels plying the Suez, the Canadian Australian mails may be carried by a new line on the Pacific or an increase in the number of vessels in the present line. Sir W. Mulock has asked the present contractors to discontinue with Orientals, but they demur, and a new arrangement may be necessary.

ICE BREAKING UP.

Sault Ste. Marie, April 25.—It is expected the passage will be open for several days.

WIDOW COMITS SUICIDE.

Belleville, April 25.—Mrs. Herman Knox, a well-to-do widow, living with her mother-in-law, near Trenton for some time, committed suicide in the cellar of the house, while the family was out making tea. She was assigned for the act. She was about fifty years of age.

YUKON GOLD OUTPUT.

Dawson, Y.T., April 25.—Sluicing is well under way. Water is running freely and the Yukon shows signs of an early break up. The season is fully opened and the gold output of the district for the season is expected to be \$13,000,000.

The city council yesterday decided almost unanimously to award the contract for the 72-inch steel pipe to be laid across the island to the lowest bidder, James McNeill & Bros. of Pittsburg. The board of control had favored the Canada Foundry Company, but Dr. Noble, in moving to strike the pipe from the list, stated that in addition to being wrong in principle, the board had no right to vote away about \$300, the difference in the price quoted by the two firms. The United States company also had to pay 20 per cent. duty, which would make a difference of almost \$30,000, that the Canada Foundry Company would apparently make on the contract. It would appear from the contract awarded to the lowest bidder, that the motion carried the Contract. A delegation from the Trades and Labor Council protested strongly in favor of McNeill & Bros. The amount of the contract will be approximately \$88,800, as there are about 6000 feet to be supplied at \$14.50 per foot. The contract is awarded to the United States company, the Port Iron Works and John Inglis & Sons also tendered.

CONCOUNCIL UPSETS CONTROLLERS' RECOMMENDATIONS

The mayor brought down a message suggesting a special meeting of council on Wednesday to pass a bylaw providing for the submission of the question of purchasing gas stock to the voters on Saturday next. His proposal stated that he understood a large amount of gas stock would be offered for sale shortly. It was ordered that the city solicitor prepare this bylaw and that the special meeting will be held this evening.

ROBBER WAS BOLD.

San Jose, Cal., April 25.—A masked man, armed with two revolvers, entered the rooms of the Delmonico Social Club and after lining up against the wall six men who were in the room, he laid a diamond ring valued at \$500 from one of the men, grabbed \$300 or \$400 from the table and then backed out of the room. After pursued by citizens, lasting over an hour, during which over thirty shots were exchanged, the robber was finally killed. The dead man was found to be Bert Thornlyke, one of the best known young men in this city. He has a wife and child.

WHEN GREEK MEETS TURK.

Athens, April 25.—An affray between Turkish gendarmes and Greeks is reported from Smyrna, in which M. Delany, secretary of the Greek consulate, was slightly wounded. A Greek squadron has sailed for Smyrna.

WILL INSPECT ALL THE SCHOOLS.

To-morrow the members of the board of education will go on a six days' tour for the purpose of inspecting all the schools. They start at Parliament Street School, and on the sixth day will be joined by the separate school representatives, and will go to the Technical School and the Collegiate Institute. There is an added importance to the inspection this year, because a member of the board is now elected by the whole city and has to be familiar with all the schools, instead of only knowing the conditions in his own ward, as was the case in the old board.

IN GOLD-TRIMMED COFFIN.

St. Louis, April 25.—Henry Eggert, a miser, who committed suicide to escape the privations he imposed upon himself, was buried yesterday in a coffin trimmed with gold. The casket cost \$1000. Eggert left an estate of \$10,000, and his nephew said his uncle was entitled to a lavish funeral.

TROOP IS IN RUINS.

The index records of the crown lands department are duplicated in the various branches, so that their destruction in the fire is not irreparable. Half a dozen of the agriculture department's reports were burned, with several hundred plates, many of which were worth \$5 each.

The throwing over of the protest on September next will give the administration breathing time. The impression prevails in some quarters that there is a deal on in respect to the pending election trials.

Mr. Conmee's retirement from provincial politics, which is important to note, is expected to occur in the next cabinet with Hon. Mr. Latchford out of the way. He is the only Irish Catholic in the house with the shadow of a chance, and his decision to go to Ottawa (with the kind permission of certain duly qualified electors of one of the Ontario ridings) must mean that all the good things here are likely to slip away.
