LETTER DELIVERY FOR NORTH TORONTO.

The postmaster-general ought to grant street letter delivery to the Town of North Toronto. He gave the service to East Toronto and West Toronto before they were put into the city, on the ground largely that they were "contiguous," touched the city on one or more of its bounds. The annexation of Deer Park makes this case in regard to North Toronto; it now touches the city for a considerable distance west of Yonge-street, near the belt line. North Toronto, as The World pointed out the other day, is within the range of the metropolitan character of Yonge-street, and banks, stores and all kinds of businesses are being located on it, and as soon as the belt line has its yards on Yonge-street completed there will be at least 20 new building supply firms in the town.

What with city delivery and rural mail delivery, Yonge-street should be letter-carried up to Aurores.

THE REVOLT OF WOMAN.

When lovely woman raised the standard of revolt and began seriously her campaign for equality of rights and privileges, men saw in his first impulse thought to drive away the invaders of his domain by a series of impatient "shoo's." But the in her domestic sphere woman may deal in this way successfully with trespassing hens, she herself has made it plain that something much more rigorous than "shooing" will be needed for her retreat to the place of enforcement emerged. She has had set before him a question of whose importance he is hardly yet aware, and is being urged, entreated, implored and commanded to commit himself to a change which is nothing short of a revolution. Nor does there appear to be in the flesh a reincarnation of truculent John Knox to thunder forth new blasts of the trumpet against the monstrous regiment of women who are determined to storm even his parliamentary citadel.

What is to be done with these women and their aspirations after absolute equality with men? For be it observed that their goal is not independence and independent government for themselves, but the right to share with men in every department of national life—even, so some of them have said, the burden of naval and military defence. The phenomenon is bewildering to the ordinary man accustomed to regard himself as the roof and crown of things, however much it may really be otherwise. He cannot easily grasp the ideas that underlie all this feminine but not effeminate agitation nor understand why it is that he is asked to accept women as co-workers in places and situations hitherto his own peculiar appanage. Still less does he understand why the hurly-burly should have come just at this particular moment, nor why it has spread with such rapidity through the unwillingly, whether the problem offered by the uprising of woman must be faced ultimately, however long it may be shirked. These insistent rebels against the established order are evidently come to stay, to worry, to fight until as did the unjust judge, continual disturbance wears mankind into submission.

It is clear there is going to be a new social order. Women are out to find themselves. They want to measure themselves with man, to ascertain their real powers and capacities, to ascertain what they can and what they cannot do. The world is out of joint and women think and are assured that they were born to set it right. Man himself is not unconscious that there are many evils and grievances with which women are admirably fitted to deal. He is puzzled too, by the curious fancies which he stumbles against in the course of his daily round. He sees attractive women whose ideal is the home and who are admirably adapted for life partnerships, but who remain unwedded. And he sees again married women whose desire it is to get out of the home circle and play more ambitious roles before the public eye. In days to come the relations between the two great and complementary divisions of the human race will rectify themselves on enduring lines, probably not altogether in accordance with the notions that now prevail. Co-education, for example, is not fulfilling the expectation of its first advocates and is meeting with increasing opposition in influential educational circles.

THE FOURTH INSPECTOR.

Among the matters which will be considered by the board of education to-night is understood to be the appointment of a fourth inspector. The position is a responsible one and every effort should be made to secure the selection of an expert whose practical knowledge and record of service warrants confidence in his capacity and judgment. No countenance should be given to any recommendation that has not been preceded by full opportunity to candidates to come forward and by proper consideration of their claims. What Toronto needs and expects from the board of education is the recognition of nothing but the public advantage and the observance of everything necessary to secure it.

PERFECTION IN TRAVEL.

The recent introduction of a garden and truck farm on a small scale of the Hamburg-American Line SS, "Kaiserin Auguste Victoria," while an innovation, is not merely a detailed item appearing only on account of its novelty. It is a part of the development of a well-considered and carefully-planned scheme, the purpose of which is to provide ocean travelers with every possible and conceivable luxury and convenience. The term "Necessities of ocean travel" has departed from the category of the cross-sea wanderer. No longer does he think of these necessities in the sense that the enjoyment of the ocean voyage could be restricted and limited to mere necessities. In striving to provide the ocean traveler with the best possible cuisine and service the restaurant idea was adapted, this introduction being made on that magnificent floating palace of the Hamburg-American Line, the SS, "America," followed by similar restaurants on the "Kaiserin Auguste Victoria." So successful has this restaurant idea become that it has been responsible for the change made in the general dining-rooms of ocean steamers, namely, in a carte service has been adopted. Once begun, the la carte idea caught on, and is now being introduced on one or two lines in conjunction with the table d'hôte system, now prevalent extensively. After the la carte system had been introduced, it was but a step further to make another very decided improvement. Formerly the steamship dining-room contained a number of long tables, at which from 10 to 20 persons and even more, sat at their meals. It was but natural that ocean travelers desired to be alone at a table. Long tables were removed and in their stead the small party tables were introduced, at which two, four, six or eight people sat together. This scheme met with instant favor, as it promoted greater sociability, and, above all, the similarity to a restaurant ashore more pronounced. It might have been thought that the restaurant on board and la carte service, in the dining-room, the last word had been said regarding the comfort of large steamers, but vessels like the "America" and "Kaiserin Auguste Victoria" contain still another feature which is almost as much appreciated as the restaurant itself. This is the dining-room, a most beautiful room, situated on one of the uppermost decks. It is tastefully decorated, and has palm-trees and vines have been used with wonderful effect to make one of the most beautiful rooms ever seen on either land or water. Here afternoon tea is served and groups of ladies and gentlemen linger and chat over various beverages. A palm garden has also recently been installed on the famous flyer "Deutschland."

Thus we see that the truck farm and greenhouses on the "Kaiserin Auguste Victoria" is but the natural outcome of a well-ordered scheme. Formerly fruits, vegetables and flowers, in order to be available for the table, were kept in cold-storage rooms in the hold of the ship. Now a steamship gardener is one of the regular staff. It is his especial duty to look after the flowers, plants, the strawberries, the mushrooms, even the lettuce and other greens which are used in the restaurant. The storerooms of the great ocean liners may be compared to great markets, where even the most perishable foods are stored. The storerooms of the "Kaiserin Auguste Victoria," for example, consist of a series of chambers, artificially cooled to a fixed temperature, each devoted to a different use. There is a room for fish, another for meats, another for fruits and still another for vegetables. The grocery shop on board ship is a reproduction of its counterpart ashore, but of the

highest grade. Long shelves and pigeon-holes contain countless delicacies from all over the world. This room is fitted with regular counters and scales, the supplies for the various kitchens being issued here after being sorted to McIlwain's evidence, they vaults aboard are also marvelously complete. In hundreds of pigeon-holes can be seen the best products of the purveyor from every section of the globe.

WAS THERE DISSOLUTION?

Thomas Law Declines to Put For Drop in Stocks.

Claiming there had been a dissolution of partnership before his brother made a final purchase of 5000 shares of Temiskaming mining stock, and declining any responsibility for his brother's action in so doing, Thomas Law is contesting an action by the non-jury assessors, in which McIlwain & Armstrong, brokers, are suing the Bank of Ottawa for a garnishee on him for \$1424. Thomas and William Law, as partners, had dealings with the brokerage firm, purchasing 11,000 shares of the stock mentioned. Subsequently, according to the evidence, the company broke off business relationship on account of William Law having neglected affairs. After the dispute, he claims that William purchased 5000 additional shares in the firm's name, without his knowledge. As soon as he heard of his brother's action, Thomas Law says he wrote to McIlwain saying he would refuse to take any responsibility for it. The stock dropped \$280 on the 5000 shares, and the amount asked in garnishee is to cover the margin on this. McIlwain & Armstrong maintain that the brothers were still partners when the deal was put thru.

New Sportsman's Paradise. An official of the C. N. R. will in the near future take a trip thru the central Parry Sound district, with a view to gathering information concerning the routes to the many lakes and hunting grounds, which information will be disseminated among interested tourists. The C. N. R. line touches Wallbridge, the nearest point to this comparatively new sportsman's paradise, and the company are receiving many enquiries as to methods of getting from Wallbridge to Loring, which is about 30 miles, and about in the centre of the new district. It is understood that the district will shortly be extensively advertised as a game country.

PRICES NOT MUCH INFLUENCED BY IN AND OUT TRANSACTIONS

La Rose Continues the One Strong Feature of the Cobalts on All the Exchanges.

World Over,
Thursday Evening, June 17.
There was a good deal of in-and-out trading at the local mining markets today, but not such as to influence prices to any great extent. Buying orders from the public were somewhat scarce, but in spite of this, few declines in prices occurred, and the market on the whole remained steady. The general tone was on the firm side and business was fairly evenly distributed throughout the day.

The feature of to-day's trading was La Rose. This stock has been making a small but steady advance from 12 1/2 to 14 1/2 and sold up to 17 1/2 during the session. Considerable transactions were also made in Nipissing and Kerr Lake, but the prices for these issues remained about steady.

In the lower priced shares interest was mainly centred in Temiskaming, which opened at 88 1/2 and in spite of large blocks of stocks being thrown on the market, advanced to 90 and closed at 88 1/2.

There was considerable buying of Beaver, but the shares were not taken and the prices remained about unchanged.
