



JUDGE WANTS EXPERT TO REPORT ON QUESTION OF INTERFERENCE OF WIRES

C. D. Mills of Sussex Suggested in Power Co. City Matter.

At a hearing this morning in the Junction case of the New Brunswick Power Co. vs the City of St. John His Honor Judge White said that in his opinion the question at issue was whether the city in the construction of its distribution system had trespassed on the rights of the company, which already had a system in operation, and for this purpose he wanted the report of a disinterested party on this case of alleged interference.

Hon. Dr. Baxter contended that the company in selling current which they knew was to be distributed over the wires of the city system had invalidated their claim that the city system was too dangerous for operation. A list of the alleged interferences, some 200 in number, was placed in evidence by Dr. Taylor, and this will be checked up by the expert secured by His Honor, probably C. D. Mills of Sussex.

Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., appeared for the city, and Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., and M. G. Teed, K. C., for the New Brunswick Power Company. Only two witnesses were examined, J. D. Harwood and M. A. Pooler. F. R. Taylor said he had received a letter from Mr. Baxter that he had certain matters to bring to the attention of His Honor in regard to the supply of current by the New Brunswick Power Company to the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, and he himself desired to place before the court some further instances of alleged interference caused by the construction of the city system.

His Honor said there had been 200 alleged cases of interference, and he wanted a report from some independent witness. He had asked F. Vaughan to act, but the advice of the Engineering Institute Mr. Vaughan had refused to do so. Mr. Baxter said he had and Mr. Taylor had discussed this matter, and he suggested that Barry Wilson, of the city, and R. J. Cochrane, for the company, go over this list and report, as he did not think there could be any disagreement between them as to actual interferences. Mr. Taylor said he did not dissent from the view of Dr. Baxter, but he thought it would be wise to have two men who had ready access to the list of interferences. His Honor said he would give an impartial report and Mr. Baxter and Mr. Taylor said they had no objection to his appointment. His Honor said he thought it would be wise for him to state his position and what he wanted this report and after careful consideration he had taken the view that the power commission should be given certain rights by the legislature to construct a system in St. John and they had constructed it in accordance with the requirements of the legislature. When the city was given the right to construct a system this must be construed in view of the fact that no expression of power was given, as meaning that the city must not interfere with the system of the company in such a manner as to constitute a trespass. In his opinion the question to be decided was whether any trespass had been made. In the case of a trespass it would be a technical trespass but in view of the small amount of damage he believed to grant injunction. In the case of the city wires passing poles to keep their wires away from the poles which were in a perpendicular position, and to prevent interference from the crossing and sagging of wires. It was understood His Honor was to obtain the services of Mr. Mills. Mr. Taylor then placed in evidence a list of the alleged interferences since September 28 to date and this was sworn to by John D. Harwood, who had made the reports. Mr. Baxter's Point.

M. A. Pooler, general manager of the Power Co., was then called by Dr. Baxter and in answer to questions by Dr. Baxter said the company knew in a general way that current sold by them to the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission was to be distributed over the city distribution system. Questioned as to why the company had sold current which they knew would be distributed over a system which they claimed was dangerous to their line-men, Mr. Pooler said the line-men of the company had been taking extra special precautions ever since the city system was started and that there was danger to the public, as well as to

TO REPORT DEC. 17 ON PHONE RATES

S. H. Mildram Given More Time—Matters Before Utilities Board.

The monthly meeting of the Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities was held this morning with the chairman, Mr. William Truman, and Commissioners LeBlanc and Burpee present. The first business was the hearing of an interim report from S. H. Mildram, expert of the board, who has been investigating the affairs of the New Brunswick Telephone Co. with a view to recommending a reduction in the rates if possible. Mr. Mildram reported that so much interest had been shown in the outcome of the report that he would otherwise have done so with a view to comparing the rates charged in New Brunswick with the rates in other parts of the Maritime Provinces as well as in the New England States, and he desired to have further time before submitting his conclusions to the board.

It was resolved to receive the report of Mr. Mildram on Monday afternoon, December 17, when the board will meet for a brief period prior to its departure for Woodstock, where there is to be a hearing with regard to electric light and power rates on the following day. Five copies of the report were ordered to be prepared for the use of the board, the N. B. Telephone Co., the Board of Trade, the press, and Mr. Mildram himself.

Previous to entering the moving picture field, Mr. Chantler was engaged in an expert capacity with the DuPonts, the wealthy powder corporation, which is now financially interested in pictures as an investment same as Standard Oil and other large corporations.

Mr. Chantler claims that a close scrutiny of the Canadian situation generally supports the assertions of leading experts and commercial leaders that Canada is on the first impulse of an historic boom. Momentum is a bit slow in some places, but the big ball is rolling steadily and everything is conspiring to make the forward movement unprecedented. None but those who come directly in touch with the whole Dominion are forced to investigate its possibilities and probabilities in order to gauge their own business deliberations can sense the wonderful things almost immediately in store for this country.

Out west, Mr. Chantler reports, there has been such an abundant wheat crop that not only the elevators are filled to overflowing, but barns, carriage houses and all sorts of outbuildings have been pressed into granary service. A railway man in Calgary claims that it would take half a million grain cars of the new and large type to move the crop. The west, too, is ready to supply its own territory with coal, and mining will take great strides forward as soon as freight rates are adjusted satisfactorily. It is claimed that mines located near Calgary can fill every bin west of the Great Lakes & the haulage is made right.

In British Columbia various industries, such as lumbering, shipping, fishing and mining are speeding up again after the war-shock and will be co-ordinated with the other Canadian enterprises in the general advance now commencing. The Maritime Provinces, he says, with their shipping, lumbering, fishing and quite comprehensive array of industries—a sort of little Canada in themselves—will be sure to enjoy the grand resumption of prosperity same as they have always done.

"From what I could gather," Mr. Chantler says, "the banks and transportation people do not look for any sensational or sudden boom. They say it is going to be a steady climb back to Canada's pre-war prosperity, then a continuous forging ahead away past that mark. They say this is Canada's golden age, a great nation same as it was the United States a hundred years ago, and with a favorable immigration policy, which will bring to this country the worthy people of Europe and the British Isles, nothing can prevent the beginning of a great new era—Vista Dry Dock.

Mr. Chantler spent part of today visiting the new docking and shipbuilding facilities at Courtenay Bay, also mentioned about town viewing the port facilities and general activity. He thinks the new hotel scheme is a much-needed "cincher" for tourist advertising purposes and is always a gratifying convenience to travelers used to big city advantages. "Nothing hurts a town more," he says, "than aggravating hotel accommodations. There is a personal touch to hotel life that makes either a booster or knocker out of a stranger."

URGES INTEREST IN MARITIME PORTS

Board of Trade Appeal in Annual Report Sounds Good Note.

The annual report of the Board of Trade for 1923 has just been sent out to the members and is a document well worth careful reading and filing for future reference. It contains a very full report of the activities of the board during the year just closed and much information about possibilities of expansion in the trade of the port. A picture of St. John from Fort Howe shows on the front page in an excellent one. It gives a good view of the sugar refinery and the grain elevators. This year an appendix, giving a great number of statistics, has been issued and this will be distributed very widely. It gives facts about the city and port of St. John and the provincial farms and fisheries statistics. The figures show an increase in the value of exports and imports passing through the port, the amount of grain, sugar, wheat, flour, potatoes, fish, cattle and hay exported through the port for the fiscal year and in the customs and excise receipts.

In closing the report makes the following appeal on behalf of the Maritime to the rest of Canada: All Canadians, and all business men of the British Empire, are urged to take a deep interest in the use of Canada's Maritime Provinces ports (St. John is Canada's Maritime Province port) for the traffic of the Dominion in preference to foreign ports; to help strengthen Canada's bond of union and also that of the Motherland; in what is owing to these provinces through the confederation pact; in the trade possibilities that exist for all British possessions; in the natural resources of the Maritime, the development and utilization of which will lend powerful aid in building up of Canada as a great nation within the British Empire.

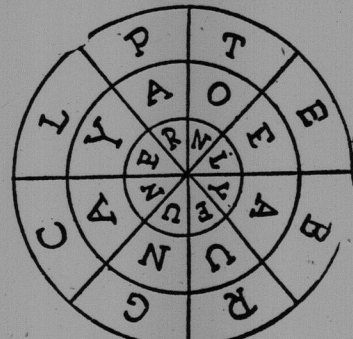

Yet Dr. Duncan, she said, was fighting this pact with the Methodist Church. A sister denomination of like ideals and purposes.  
Mrs. MacLean said that she felt herself constrained to speak her mind, especially when her husband was lying ill in bed at home and unable to be there to oppose the position of the Anti-Union leaders.

Rev. F. McTeague welcomed Dr. Gordon back to his old pulpit, which he had held for fourteen years.

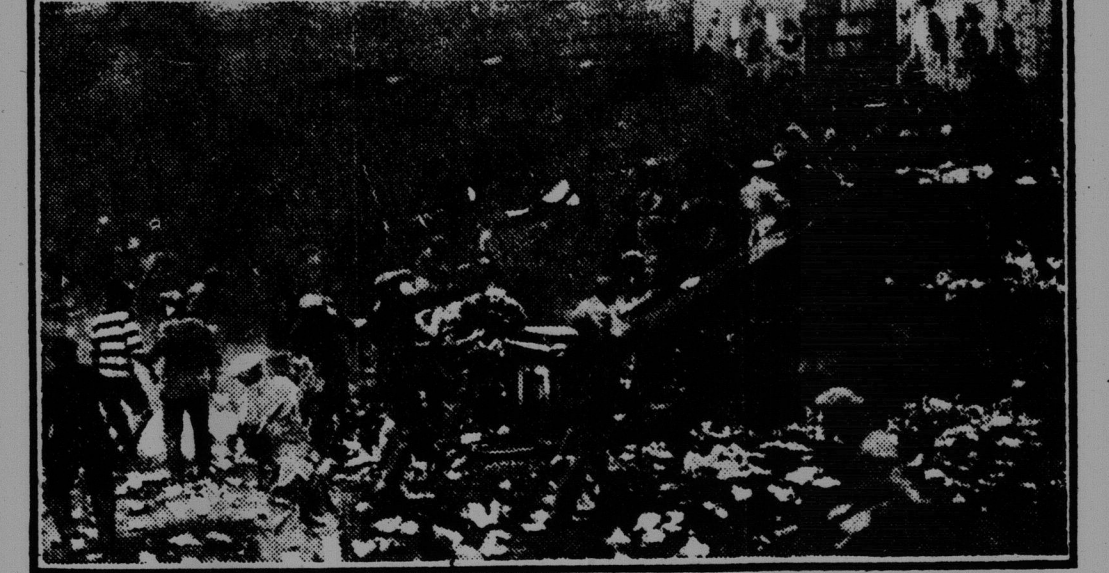

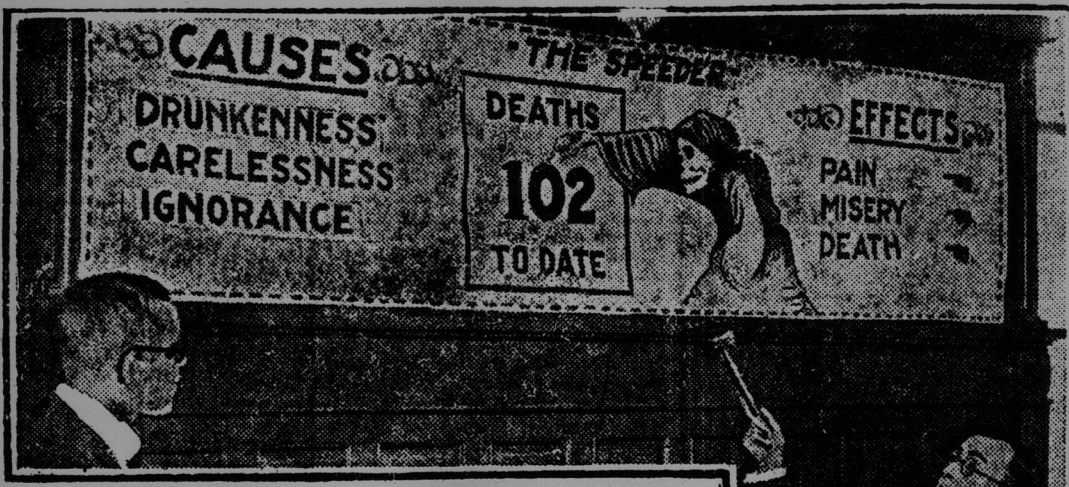

### CITIES FIGHT DRUNKEN DRIVER AS TRAFFIC DEATHS MOUNT

(By N.B.A. Service.)  
The death knell is sounding for the drunken autist.  
Appalled by the ever-increasing toll of traffic deaths, judges throughout America are bending their efforts toward curbing the practice of driving while intoxicated, which today looms as the greatest single factor in America's street slaughter, according to a survey made by N.B.A. Service for The Times.  
Despite the adoption throughout the country of traffic regulations of almost every degree, it has been impossible to eliminate the intoxicated driver. And the natural increase in traffic congestion has given him a bigger mark to shoot at in his wild career.  
**A "Red Murderer."**  
The drunken driver has been termed by sober-minded jurists "the most deadly man alive"—a virtual red murderer running rampant.  
So his punishment is to be severe than ever. This, it is hoped, will make the streets safe for the sliding motorists and pedestrians.  
Some judges regard a jail term as the only effective cure; others believe in combining drastic punishment with wide-spread publicity.  
In certain cities where drunk drivers are examined by a psychiatrist in order to determine the offender's mental fitness to drive. Other cities are depriving the culprit of his driver's license.  
In Massachusetts the law now provides a fine of from \$50 to \$100 for the first offense, or a jail sentence of from one month to a year. For second offenses a jail term is mandatory, a year's sentence being not infrequently imposed.  
Judge C. C. Dalton, of Seattle, always inflicts the maximum sentence, 90 days in jail, \$500 fine and revocation of the motorist's license.  
"If the laws allowed me," he says, "I would put a large red cross on the door of the drunken driver's automobile. For the second offense I would add a skull and cross-bones. For the third offense I would revoke his driver's license for life, for a drunken motorist is more dangerous to life and property than a maniac with a gun."  
In Missouri it is a state offense to



drive while intoxicated. Circuit Court trials often result in long jail sentences.  
Judge Charles A. Oberwager, of the New York Traffic Court, believes the jail sentence is the only proper one for an intoxicated driver.  
"If a man comes before me a second time," he says, "I give him the limit and revoke his license. First offenders usually get 60 to 90 days. A second offender gets as much as a year."  
In two months, Judge Henry M. Walker, Chicago, sent 25 drivers to a psychopathic hospital for examination.  
Nineteen of them, he declares, are in insane asylums now.  
The sensible preventive, Judge Walker holds, is to require a license of every person who drives, applicants being compelled to prove not only their skill but character, physical strength and mentality.  
**Livery Stable Laws.**  
"Automobile traffic regulations," he says, "still savor of the livery stable. Penalties which were adequate to deal with horse and buggy traffic are outgrown."  
Judge John P. Haas, another Chicago jurist, mates out justice to traffic offenders with Dr. David J. Jones, city physician, sitting at his elbow.  
"To church every Sunday for a year was the requirement Judge Haas made

### DECREASE SEEN IN STEAMSHIP PROFITS

**Officials Hope to Boost Earnings When Other Line Taken Over**  
The Eastern Steamship Lines, Inc., which is in the control of the St. John in the north to Norfolk, Va., in the south, did not have a very prosperous month in October, according to the corporation's statement just issued. The company barely covered expenses during the month, the surplus after deductions being only \$8,888 as compared with \$116,910 in October, 1922. An increase in gross earnings of \$8,490 proved totally inadequate to offset the augmented operating costs. It is understood that about 85 per cent of the contraction in income was due to higher operating costs, the balance being attributable to certain extraordinary expenditures. The company's costs show an increase all along the line as compared with a year ago, salary increases, advances for common labor, higher pier rentals and canal tolls combining to reduce the net profits.  
In due course officials hope that revenues of the Eastern Steamships will be materially enhanced by the acquisition of the Old Dominion Steamships interests. Eastern Steamships preferred dividend requirements approximate \$500,000 per annum and the management is hopeful that the Old Dominion earnings will be able to take care of these charges.

### TRIES SUICIDE IN TORONTO PRISON

Toronto, Nov. 27.—Joe Camby, held on a charge of attempted murder of Mrs. Freda Dembak, who it is alleged he stabbed in her home, 4 Baldwin street, two weeks ago, attempted to end his life in the cells below the police court today while waiting to be called into court to answer the charge.  
Camby seized a milk bottle out of the hand of another prisoner, threw it on the floor, smashing it. He picked up a shattered piece and slashed his throat with it. He then put his finger into the wound and tried to tear his flesh open. Several other prisoners looked on in amazement, while one seized him and threw him to the ground. Cell guards rushed to Camby and pinned him down.  
**CHURCH UNIONISTS HOLD BIG RALLY**  
London, Ont., Nov. 27.—An enthusiastic Union meeting was held here tonight, Rev. Dr. William Beattie was chairman and the speakers representing the three denominations were Dr. Gunn, the Congregationalist; Dr. Clarence MacKinnon, of Halifax, the Presbyterian, and Dr. Trevor Davis, Toronto, the Methodist.  
Following the historical summing up of the denominational progress toward union by Dr. Gunn and the explanation of the proposed Act of Union by Dr. MacKinnon, who carefully avoided reference verging into controversial ground, the programme had its culmination in Dr. Davis' pronouncement of the imperative need which is taking union into consideration of the church in every land.

### TORONTO JEWELRY FACTORY ROBBED

Toronto, Nov. 27.—Two men walked into the wholesale jewelry firm of Paquette and Hughes, 209 Victoria street, today, and ringing the bell in the front office attracted the attention of Mr. Paquette, who was alone in the factory adjoining. On his entrance the men confronted him with drawn revolvers and ordered him to put up his hands. He was compelled to walk backwards to the rear of the building and was struck down by the vault while the robbers stole goods worth \$10,000. Paquette recovered half an hour later.  
Joplin, Mo., Nov. 27.—A captured policeman was forced to drive to freedom four bandits who robbed the Bank of Albany of \$12,000 at Asbury, Mo., yesterday. The kidnapped officer was Clarence Allison, who engaged the men singly in a field near Crestline, Kansas, only to be overpowered and made an instrument in their escape.  
New York, Nov. 27.—The arrest of a third and fourth man in connection with the murder of two Brooklyn bank messengers on Nov. 14, and recovery of nearly all the stolen \$48,000 was predicted this afternoon by the police. The two men whose arrest is expected are well known thugs.

### MOTHER AND HER DAUGHTER PERISH

Winnipeg, Nov. 27.—Mrs. Mary Milan and her 12-year-old daughter, Victoria, were burned to death when a fire destroyed their farm home on St. Ann's road, near Grand Point, Man., on the Canadian National Railway, Monday night. The father and three other members of the family escaped without injury.  
Mrs. Milan was awakened by the smell of smoke and immediately started to warn her family. She was trapped in the upper portion of the house while endeavoring to rescue her daughter.  
**SAYS COMPANY NOT A GREAT OCTOPUS**  
Sydney, N. S., Nov. 27.—That the Dominion Iron and Steel Company is not the monstrous octopus that general public might believe, was stated by General Supt. Biscoff in his evidence before the Royal Commission at this morning's session of the enquiry. Mr. Biscoff who has been general supt. of the steel company since June 1922 and previous to that was assistant superintendent of the company from November 1916 to April 1919, when he left the concern for a period of three years, gave evidence as regards company affairs regarding the corporation's efforts to deal fairly with the men in their employ.

### TWO OTTAWA MEN ARE BURIED ALIVE

Ottawa, Nov. 27.—Two corporation employees, Joseph Labl, Seneca street, and Andrew Chiffo, Booth street, were buried alive when a corporation sewer under construction in Monk street, caved in near the corner of Melgund avenue today. Both were dead when uncovered.
