

The collision, according to Olson, occurred when a truck belonging to the Metal Package Corporation and driven by Morris Goldstein crashed into the front of his car when it attempted to pass on the left side instead of stopping when the trolley came to a halt at East Tremont and Mapes avenues, the Bronx, to discharge passengers. J. Arthur Hilton, counsel for the firm, tried to show Goldstein was on a prisate errand and that the company was ate errand and that the company was

An unusual aspect of the case was the conflicting medical testimony offered. The defence called Dr. Samuel B. Burk of 869 Madison avenue, who is listed in the Medical Directory as connected with several well known institutions. He said that in his opinion, based on a three-hour examination of Olson last April, there was nothing structurally wrong with Olson and that he was suffering merely from hysteria. He said that the patient could recover the use of his legs if only he would change his mental attitude which had brought about a condition resembling paralysis known to the profession as pseudo-paraplegia.

When the news of the verdict was carried to Olson as he lay in the corridor out side the court room he merely said, "They can have their \$102.000 if they give me back the use of my legs." His mother and sister were completely overcome with emotion as they thanked the jury.

SAYS MEN UNDER 40 WOULD FIX EUROPE

Dr. M. Cary Thomas Found 'Elder Statesmen' Were Causing the Trouble Abroad.

Philadelphia, Nov. 28. — Men under 40 are better equipped to settle the world's acute political and economic problems than those over 60, according to Dr. M. Carey Thomas, President Emeritus of Bryn Mawr College.

She expressed that opinion in recounting the impressions she obtained during her recent sixteen months' tour of Europe and the Orient.

Miss Thomas is strongly in favor of the United States joining the League of Nations as a result of what she saw and heard abroad. She believes this nation should stand with Great Britain in guaranteeing France from attack, and also that aid of the American people is urgently needed in the Near and Far East.

Her statement, given out at her resi-

Her statement, given out at her residence on the Bryn Mawr College grounds, follows:
"Elder Statesmen are a great mis-

"I believe that if the men in control of affairs in this country and abroad were under 40 instead of over 60, the world would not be in its present condition, and as far as I am concerned, I am going to try to confine my activities to applauding and backing up of the younger generations.

"I believe in the present generation planning the things it has to put through.

"Traveling in Europe and Asia for sixteen continuous months gives one an impression of the world totally different from that we have as stay-athome Americans. It is not only what a

globe-trotting American sees of dif-ferent countries; it is the imaginative conception that somehow comes of the conception that somehow comes of the people of the country.

"I have come, for my own part, to be absolutely sure that it is the duty and also to the profit of the United States to delay no longer, but to use her great moral and financial power to the utmost to help to solve the many pressing problems that must be solved if the world, as we know it, is to go on. It seems to me our first duty to enter the League of Nations, to which fifty-four nations already belong, including the Free State of Ire-

land and Abyssinia, which joined it this Summer. And there is every reason to believe that as soon as Germany and Russia apply they will be admitted. If adopted Mr. Mellon's plan will give to taxpayers an income of \$10,000 or less 70 per cent. of the proposed income tax reduction and distribute the other 30 per cent. among those with greater incomes. Only 5 per cent. of the proposed reduction will go to those who have an income of \$100,000 or more a year.

There are 13,000,000 persons making tax returns who have incomes not greater than \$10,000 a year.

Leach and Commissio missioner John A. Leach and Commissioner of Licenses August W. Glatzmayer. As a result an open invitation has been extended to every theatregoer, and especially women, to make complaint of specific objectionable plays. Such complaints, Mr. Hulbert pointed out, should be sent to the Police Commissioner or the Commissioner of Licenses

"A decent regard for the require-ments of good citizenship," said Mr. Hulbert, "demands that theatregoers Hulbert, "demands that theatregoers of this city recognize their obligation to aid those in official life who would have the stage barometric of actual social conditions, culture and intellectual thought and not a vehicle for the unclean and dank imaginings of those who would have the public wallow in dirt that they might wallow in riches.

Whether that censorship be of the press, free speech or the stage, it is equally repugnant to our American institutions. 




