


ITS SIGNIFICANCE

The Times has said before, and was more impressed last night than ever, with the force of the statement that the present campaign in the city of St. John will do much more than rebuild the Metropole. It was good to see so many people of different creeds crowding the Imperial Theatre on Sunday afternoon to unite for a common purpose, and it was, if possible, more inspiring last evening to see the large assembly of ladies and gentlemen of the city inspired by a common purpose and a common enthusiasm. There was no jarring note, but a universal confidence in the success of the campaign. If those assembled needed inspiration, they must have received it from the admirable brief address of the president of the Women's Canadian Club, who in her address to that organization of nearly eight hundred women representing all classes and creeds in the community. It was an inspiration also to have present Sir Frederic Barker, Chief Justice McLeod, the mayor, and the pastors of many churches. The feeling expressed by Rev. Mr. MacKeigan, when he declared that the citizens in this affair are making a good investment, was the feeling of all present. Major Moore and Mr. Earle emphasized the need of a prison farm as well as a shelter for homeless men, and in this they, too, gave expression to a feeling that grows more and more widespread as people study the phase of the social problems which deals with men who are not producing factors in the community. The men who are now uniting their efforts to rebuild the Metropole will be compelled by the very force of circumstances to continue their good work until a prison farm has also been established, and their co-operation in this work means much for the cause of social betterment in many directions in the city of St. John in years to come. To the extent that it co-ordinates for good the forces existing in the city, the Salvation Army is doing a work of far-reaching importance, entirely apart from the mere rebuilding of the Metropole.

THE BORDEN EMERGENCY

That ill-favored and unhappy naval emergency which was for a time so eagerly nursed by Premier Borden and his friends has received a vicious kick from an unexpected quarter. Mr. Winston Churchill in a recent speech referred to the great wisdom of the naval policy of Australia. The Australian policy is not one of contribution, but for an Australian navy, such as Sir Wilfrid Laurier with the approval of the Admiralty proposed for Canada. Commenting on Mr. Churchill's significant remarks the London Chronicle says: "We welcome that part of the First Lord's speech in which he seems more or less converted to a preference for the Australian plan of provision by local feet units by the Dominions. It is, we are sure, the only naval plan in which the interests of the Dominions can be permanently enlisted and kept alive. The avoidance by this scheme of the insoluble question of the due division between British and Colonial taxpayers of the undivided cost of the Imperial fleet is a decisive argument in its favor. Recent experience suggests that the frank abandonment of the contribution idea would be to the best interests of all concerned, including the British tax-payer."

THE ULSTER PROBLEM

Readers of most of the press cables received in Canada from the mother country must be impressed with the fact that the writers of them give more prominence to the sayings and doings of the opponents of the government than of its friends and supporters. The reader of these cables would sometimes be almost led to believe that the government was on the verge of defeat, or that at least the tide against it was running very strong. Those who have the opportunity of reading the English papers, however, do not get any such impression. The Unionists, having done all in their power to defeat the Home Rule bill and having failed, turned their attention to Ulster, and stirred up disaffection and even threatened rebellion if the will of the people of the United Kingdom, as expressed at the polls on more than one occasion, should be carried out. Even this heading failed them turned their attention to the army, and attempted to stir up disaffection among the officers. It would be incorrect to say that they have not met with a certain degree of success in their varied efforts, for the appeal to prejudice is always more or less effective. Nevertheless the government has held firmly to its purpose and has behind it the expressed will of the people. It has gone a long way in the direction of compromise and conciliation, and has shown an earnest desire to present a clash in Ulster, but it could not

abandon its policy, and has therefore been compelled to take note of what has been going on in Ulster under the leadership of Sir Edward Carson and others, and though the situation today is very grave, there is but one course to pursue. By tampering with officers of the army the Unionists have merely added another count to the serious indictment against what are termed the privileged classes, and there is now a demand for the democratization of the army. It is very pertinently asked if privates in the army must be expected to do their duty to the King under all conditions, but officers are not permitted to throw up their commissions when their services are most needed. The government is showing great forbearance, and indeed some of its own most active supporters are disposed to charge that it has erred on the side of leniency and should take sterner measures. The situation, however, is one that calls for great prudence and a conciliatory spirit, and if in the end there is trouble in Ulster it should not be of the government's seeking. So far as those citizens of Ulster are concerned who really fear that their rights and liberties are endangered, one may to a certain extent sympathize with them without sharing their fears; but there can be only the most severe condemnation of the political agitators who would even encourage the shedding of blood in the hope that out of the resulting turmoil might come some political advantage to themselves.

HON. WILLIAM PUGSEY

A big reception was given to one of Canada's big men at Ottawa yesterday. The welcome extended to Hon. William Pugsley when he re-entered the House of Commons after his long illness was a significant proof of the high estimation in which he is held by the people of Canada. The warmth of that reception is also a rebuke to those who have persistently pursued Dr. Pugsley with calumny, and resorted to the most despicable means to destroy his reputation as a public man. He stands today in the foremost ranks of Canadian statesmen, and his great ability and his eminent services to the country are freely acknowledged by those who are most competent to judge of the ability and character of a public man. Dr. Pugsley's friends in New Brunswick are not only glad to see him once more in his place in parliament, but they rejoice in such a recognition of his services as was manifested yesterday.

CONDITIONS IN HALIFAX

The Halifax Recorder is looking for the photograph of the man who wrote from that city to the Montreal Financial Times last October telling the readers of that journal about the wonderful boom in Halifax. This correspondent declared that there was no unimproved real estate in the market in Halifax because everybody was waiting for spring and the boom which would then arrive. He said this would be the biggest and best winter Halifax had ever seen, and wrote with enthusiasm of the thousands of passengers and thousands of tons of cargo to be handled in Halifax, as well as the hundreds of trains and hundreds of men employed to move the extra traffic. He declared that the old Halifax was passing away and would soon be nothing but a dream. Land was increasing in value every day and fortunes would be cleaned up in the near future. After quoting this letter in full the Recorder says: "Perhaps some of the Montreal investors in real estate in Halifax would send us their experience of the so-called boom."

Evidently the Recorder wants this information to print along with the photograph of the Halifax correspondent of the Financial Times. Apparently the switching of the Empress steamships to Halifax, while it was a severe blow to St. John has not made the people of Halifax rich. A bill that will require watching, particularly by the St. John members, is that concerning plumbing inspection. No legislation tending to give a virtual monopoly to any class of citizens is to be tolerated. At last those who should speak for St. John in this matter of the St. John Valley Railway are to be heard from. If they speak loudly enough, that which they have to say should have some effect upon the members of this constituency. The time has arrived for a full and complete statement in relation to the affairs of the St. John Valley Railway, and full information with regard to the route between Casparytown and St. John, and the prospects for handling by this route the traffic of the Grand Trunk Pacific.

GREAT OVATION TO HON. WM. PUGSLEY IN THE COMMONS

Cheered by Both Parties When He Enters House After Long Illness - Budget on Monday Next

Ottawa, March 23.—Parliament loves a great and good fighter. Shortly after tonight's sitting of the commons had got under way Hon. Wm. Pugsley, who led the historic struggle of Liberalism on the naval issue last session, and who has been absent through illness since last night, entered the chamber and quietly took his place.

His arrival was totally unexpected, but he was accorded a remarkable reception. Liberals stood and cheered for several moments, while many Conservatives also pounded their desks in greeting. The ovation was a general one and continued for some time.

The break in the proceedings was general, and Dr. Pugsley was accorded a unique reception. Despite the fact that the house was in session members crowded down to his seat to shake hands and extend congratulations. Hon. J. C. Deberry, minister of justice; Hon. Mr. White, minister of finance, and about a dozen of the members of the government side crossed the floor and joined in the personal reception, which finally terminated in another burst of cheering in which both sides joined.

Then Mr. Lemieux, who was speaking at the time of Dr. Pugsley's entrance, extended felicitations in a formal message, and was followed by Hon. Mr. Deberry, who was leading the house at the time, and who expressed the national sentiment of pleasure at the recovery of a big public man.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley still bears the marks of his recent severe illness, but seems to be in splendid spirits. He expects to stay until the close of the session and re-enter at once into the parliamentary fray.

Hon. W. T. White announced that the budget will be brought down on Monday next.

According to an answer given to Mr. Wallace by the secretary of state, Victoria day will be celebrated this year on May 28. The anniversary of Queen Victoria's birthday comes on Sunday, and according to statute, the following day in such cases becomes automatically a public holiday.

In reply to Mr. Carvell, the minister of marine said that John C. Chesley, of St. John, had received \$1,207 since the 31st of March last for motor boat service, furnished the government.

George W. Fowles, of Kings; Mr. Kyrle, Hon. H. R. Emmerson, and D. D. MacKenzie briefly urged an increase in the salaries of the judges in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

In answer to Mr. Kyrle, Premier Borden said that the minister of militia was ill, but he had assured him that he had not sent any message to Ulster that the Canadian government would not interfere with Orangemen going from this country to fight against Home Rule.

The motion was made in response to a letter read upon the matter from Mary D. Calver. Mayor Frink read a letter which he had already written and it was deemed sufficient.

A letter from John Kimball & Son Dr. Whistler for damages from alleged injuries sustained in a fall at the corner of Union and St. Patrick street and the report was adopted.

An application from J. Atkins asking renewal of lots under lease to Yandell in Queen street was referred to the commissioner of harbors, ferries and public lands.

There was some discussion as to the sale of the city lot to Dr. Broderick at \$200 and it was finally decided to give the doctor the option of purchasing at \$200 or renewing his lease at \$10 a year.

NO PLEBESCITE ON \$300,000 GRANT FOR LOCAL HOSPITAL

Bill Passed With Slight Amendment—To Superannuate Police Magistrate Marsh - Petitions Presented

Fredericton, March 23.—The house met at 8:45 p. m. Mr. Carter presented a petition in favor of a bill to incorporate the Perth-Sagway district.

Hon. Mr. Morris presented petitions in favor of bills to authorize St. James' Presbyterian church, Newcastle, to sell certain church lands; in favor of a bill to incorporate the Miramichi hospital, and to amend the act incorporating the Northwest Boom Company.

The house went into committee on the petition of the town council of Maryville to amend that town's incorporation act.

Hon. Mr. Fleming introduced a bill to provide that any issue of bonds to confirm certain sales made under the order of the chancery division of the supreme court and amend the children's protection act.

Hon. Mr. Guthrie moved for the suspension of rules to introduce a bill to provide for the superannuation of John L. Marsh, police magistrate of Fredericton.

The bill relating to the General Public Hospital, St. John, was then taken up.

Mr. Tilley said that he desired the fullest protection should be accorded to the city in the matter of the proposed hospital and for that reason he was going to move an amendment to section 2 to provide that any issue of bonds must be sanctioned by at least four out of the five commissioners.

The section as originally set out in the bill was as follows: The said council of the municipality of the city and county of St. John may from time to time, at any general meeting thereof, order one or more issues of bonds, in order to raise a loan for the payment of the said proposed hospital in the city of St. John, not on the whole to exceed \$200,000.

With this amendment the bill was agreed to.

Mr. Baxter suggested that a more convenient reference to the various acts would be provided if instead of the name of the sovereign with the year of the reign and chapter, each act was referred to by name, with the date of the calendar year in which it was passed. This suggestion was adopted in this bill.

Baby Suffocated By a Dog

A distressing accident occurred at Hentley, Abercrombie, the infant son of William Roy, baker, being suffocated in the cradle by a dog's head. When Mr. Roy went to work in the early morning the child was sleeping peacefully, but when he returned to breakfast he found the child dead, the dog having jumped into the cradle and lain on the face of the infant.



CHINESE HAD OPIUM; SEIZURE MADE AT SAND POINT ON A STEAMER

Between fifteen and twenty pounds of opium have been seized by customs officers at West St. John from the South African liner Benguel and will be sent to Ottawa for destruction.

Not only is the importation of opium into Canada prohibited, but it is a criminal offence to have it in one's possession and the penalty is three years in prison, but it is not expected that the case will be brought before the courts, as the men suspected of the traffic will be leaving here with the steamer.

CASE CONTINUED The three negroes charged with assaulting Frank E. McHugh in Brussels street several days ago were brought before Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning and were further remanded. No evidence was taken.

THE FIRST TIME Thomas Morrissey, a coachman who was reported a few days ago by E. C. H. Tolman Scott Smith for going beyond the stand allotted to coachmen at the depot, was fined \$20 in court this morning, but as it was his first offence the fine was allowed to stand.

WELL PLEASED WITH PROGRESS OF ST. JOHN

Steady Growth and Development Promising Great City

Views of W. U. Homfray Who Has Invested Here and is Ready to Invest More—A Warning Against Some Conditions

Only the united effort of the citizens is required to make St. John a city which will eventually rival New York is the opinion of W. U. Homfray of Montreal, who has invested here and is ready to invest more. He has made a careful study of real estate conditions all over the continent and who has selected St. John as the best place he can find for investments of this character.

Speaking of conditions here Mr. Homfray said that he was greatly pleased with the steady progress which St. John has been making in spite of the depression which has existed elsewhere throughout the world. He remarked that there was no boom in St. John at present, but there was something much better, a steady growth and development due to conditions which must make this one of the greatest cities on the Atlantic coast.

"There is a word of warning which I might give, however," he added, "I do not pretend to be a critic, and I do not want to assume that role, but there are some things which have been impressed upon me and of which I might be permitted to speak.

"One of the chief of these is the feeling of bitterness which seems to prevail in the relations of the various parties to persons in England whom I had been hoping to interest in St. John investments, but the effect has been to prejudice them against a city which seems to have so many internal troubles and so many factional wars.

"I would like to suggest that the citizens and the newspapers should get together to decide upon a campaign to secure the things which are most needed for the advancement of the city and that all should work together to achieve these ends and let personal differences be forgotten.

"A city is as great as its people. A community with the right kind of people can compete successfully with any other which has the advantage of a geographical situation a thousand miles more favorable than that which it enjoys here.

"I have all the advantages here, but I do not know whether or not the bright future which the city deserves should be realized. You have tremendous advantages, you have many enterprising citizens, in short you have everything which is needed to make a metropolis of this city, but in order to achieve the best results it is expected, St. John is at a critical period in her history, the opportunity is here and if it is passed by it will not be the fault of circumstances but of the citizens themselves.
