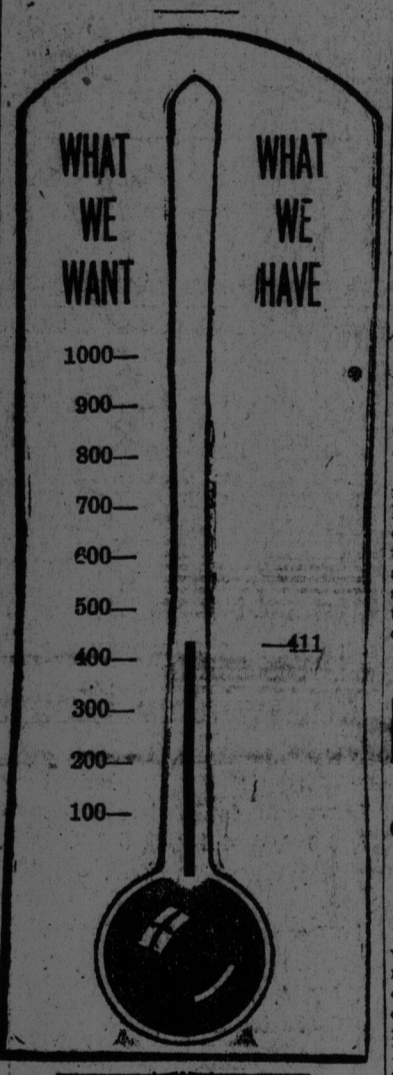
BOARD OF TRADE MEMBERS NOW NUMBER 411

There is more to the mere fact that Chinese crepe and embroidery is in fashion than all women recognize. They regard it as a high priced venture in clothes, for the word Oriental always spells expense to the American mind. Of course we are not so ignorant as not to know that pongee, raph, Shantung and the thin weaves of Chinese silk sell for a song in China and Japan. They are merely expensive when brought over here, as they usually come by way of Paris with an immense duty added to the French price.

A good quality of Chinese silk over here sells for about a dollar a yard; it is probably fifteen cents over there. The pongee that is usual in America is the kind that the coolies use in China and sells for a price so low that it is a negligible factor in the cost of living. But none of this question of price is the exact subject under discussion. The delightful thing about the incoming of Oriental weaves to fashion is that America is well filled at the present moment with small Oriental shops in which one can get amazing bargains in attractive fabrics. For instance, at one shop in New York a woman can get ten yards of embroidered Filipino crepe for \$5. All it needs is some cheap lace in addition, and if a woman does not wish to go to this expense she can use gay colored taffets or one of the new plain silk ribbons that have jumped into favor.

Any one of the Oriental shops carries small odds and ends of embroidered ribbon, painted and embroidered silks, squares and bands of crocheted lace, which will contribute immensely to the wardrobe of a woman. One woman picked up a few yards of lace for a few cents, and she says that it is the most beautiful she has ever seen. It can be used across the back of a gilette or as a tab to the collar or the middle of a cascade of lace. The uses for these quaint silks in millinery are even more varied than in gowns. Although the milliners believe that elaborate trimming will force its way on hats this summer, the majority of women are opposed to it and do not intend to allow it if they can help it, so the plain hat is made exceedingly effective by a small dash of vivid Oriental coloring.

Crinly fabrics have been tried out for three seasons, with more or less success, but the original Chinese crepe has not been brought into fashion until this season. Now one sees a good deal of it as the material for the spring model. It is possible that it is Oriental in name only, as the French looms are turning an immense amount of it into the market, but

Little Beauty Chats By BLANCHE BEACON

Simple Treatment for Nails That Crack

A WELL-KEPT hand is one of the points of beauty, therefore the woman who wishes to be entirely charming must see to it that her hands are in good condition. Suppose you give your hands a thorough inspection this very minute, then you will discover if anything is amiss with them. Are they white and soft and neither too plump nor too thin for beauty? Silence answers yes. Look again and tell me if your nails are perfect in every respect. They have one lack? That is a great pity, but if you will tell me what it is, I doubt not that I can show you a way out of your trouble, whatever it is.

Did you say that your nails have ugly ridges and persist in breaking upon the slightest provocation? Yes? Then there is work ahead for you as it will be no easy matter to teach your unsatisfactory nails better manners. I think it will be necessary for you to coat them every night with a certain cream, whose chief object in life is to go to soften the nails that they will find it difficult to crack and tear.

This is how this helpful pomade is made: Melt slightly grains of powdered resin in a double boiler, or, lacking this useful utensil, place a china bowl in a pan of hot water and set on the stove. Stir the resin and wax mixture as it heats, then add one-half ounce of petroleum jelly, thirty-two grains of table salt, thirty-three grains of powdered alum, and two grains of carmine in the order named. Finally remove the bowl from the stove and beat compound with a fork or patent egg-beater until it firms, then pour into a wide-mouthed porcelain jar with a screw top.

The time to apply this pomade is at night, just before you retire. After this cream has been thickly smeared over the fragile nails with a small ball of antiseptic gauze, it behooves you to draw on a pair of kid gloves—a size too large, as the will

The white crepe, however, is guaranteed to wash and needs no starch. You have yet to find out whether it shrinks like the cotton French crepe of two seasons ago. ALL OF you women whose husbands have told you, you have been spending too much money, please stand up. Great Scott! Every married woman in America is on her feet. All you who are earning your own living and spending as much as you earn please stand up. Now we've got the rest of them. "Well," you say, "now that you've got us standing here what are you going to do about it? I'm going to give you the first law of business: Cut your expenses down first, and then find out how you can do it afterward. Every big institution carries what it calls a "butcher."

When the expenses of that Institution begin to eat up the profits of the "butcher" issues a sweeping order to cut down so many hundreds of dollars a day. He doesn't ask how it can be done. He knows it has to be done if his business is going to continue, and he leaves it to the people under him to find out how.

This cutting seldom if ever ruins a business. It simply sharpens the wits of those who are left. Now let's take your case. Instead of taking the money that you think you ought to have, suppose you take the money that you have actually got. In your case being both "butcher" and buyer, you naturally have to sharpen your own wits.

Therefore the first thing you begin to do each day (just as are going to do now in a minute or two) is to open this paper and see what special inducement each store is offering in the things that are necessary for you to buy. You look for the clothes, and the shoes, the children's dresses and suits, the underwear, the house needs and all of the various necessities and luxuries demanded in your standard of life.

The next thing you do is to cut out all those snobbish, exclusive, little non-advertising concerns, who find it somehow beneath their dignity to sell their goods at less than a profit of several hundred per cent.

The third thing you do is to reckon up your savings at the end of a week or two. And the fourth thing you do is to stand amazed at the amount you have saved in spite of the amount you have bought.

Now of course this is letting you in behind the scenes. There isn't a buyer in any store who doesn't have to bring himself up with a jerk or get brought up with a jerk every once in a while; and who doesn't stand amazed at what he has been able to accomplish with a smaller amount of capital and a greater amount of energy and a little extra thimbleful of brains.

Now don't tell anybody you have been behind the scenes, but just dig into the advertising in this paper quietly for the next few days; cut out the "dropping-in-anywhere" method of shopping; make a business of your household expenditures, and see if this little financial plan doesn't relieve your terrible money strain.

Daily Hints For the Cook

SCALLOP BROTH. Wash and cut in small pieces 1-2 pint scallops, add 1 1/2 pint each of milk and water, a dot of butter and salt to taste. Simmer 20 minutes, strain and serve.

VANILLA SAUCE. Mix 1/2 cup sugar and 2 tablespoons cornstarch, add 1 cup of water and boil five minutes. Remove from the fire and add 2 tablespoons butter and 1 teaspoon vanilla.

SOFT MOLASSES GINGER CAKE. One-half cup sugar, 1 cup molasses, 1 1/2 cups flour (or crisco), 1 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon salt. Mix together, then add 1 cup boiling water. Stir, then add 2 1/8 cups bread flour, if bread flour is used, 3 1/4 if pastry.

There are already four tracks running into the shed and it is proposed to have four more. On motion, the secretary-treasurer was instructed to furnish the parish clerk of each parish a copy of the orders issued under Chapter 157 of the Provincial Statutes relating to fences, trespasses, and pounds.

It was resolved that Wm. L. Belyea be appointed the collector of all notes for the purchase of Grand Jurors for 1913, and be required to enter into bonds to the amount of \$500, with two securities, such bonds to be approved by the council, and which, and that he receive a ten per cent of such notes, and three per cent for each payment.

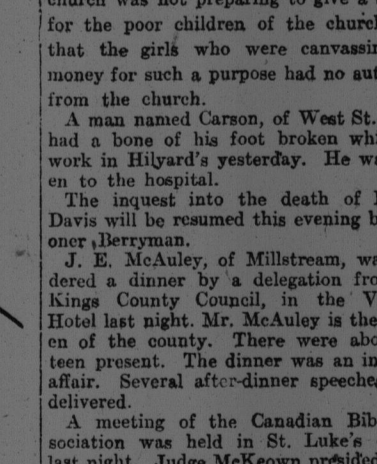

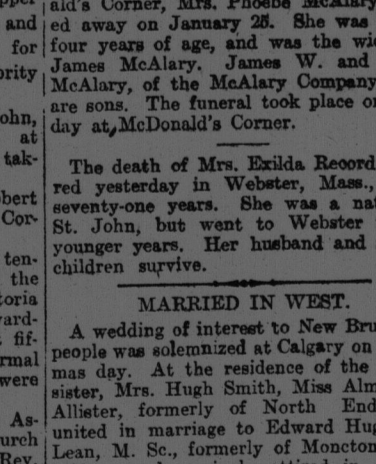

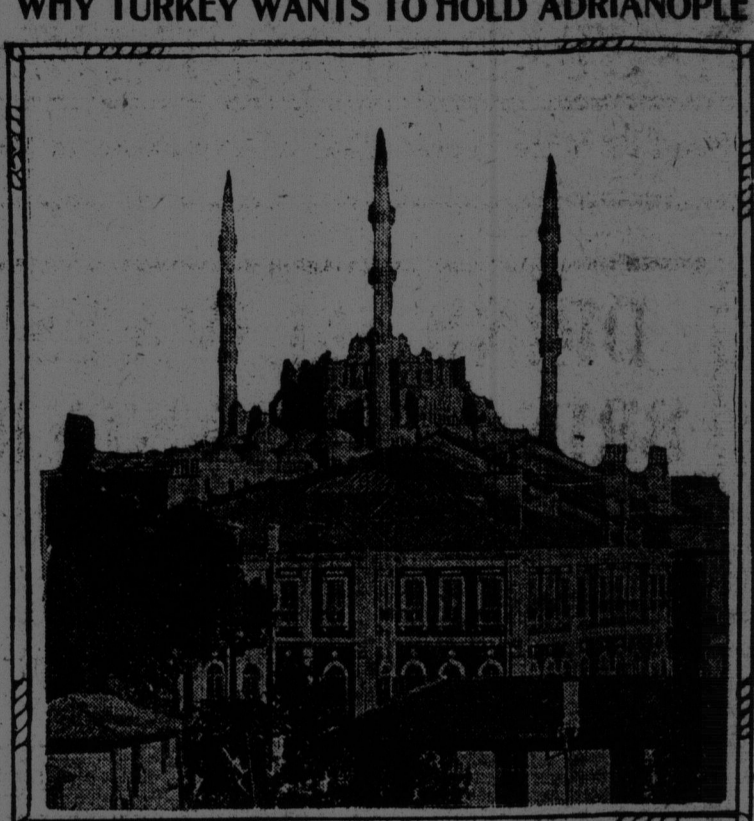

### IN PARLIAMENT

Hon. Mr. Rogers Is Given Bad Time

#### ANTIGONISH OUTRAGE

Minister Again Shows Apparent Contempt For Parliamentary Decencies—A Uniform Naturalization Law For The Empire

Ottawa, Jan. 29.—Hon. Robert Rogers has again shown his apparent contempt for parliamentary and political decency. The making public in advance of presentation to the governor-general and parliament of both the main and supplementary estimates, totalling over \$20,000,000, to be expended in Antigonish county, with a view to influencing the recent by-election there, was in itself a brazen breach of ministerial propriety hitherto unrivaled in Canada.

This afternoon, in the house of commons, Mr. Rogers, when questioned by Mr. Chisholm, of Antigonish, as to whether the minister of public works had authorized the publication of the estimates, declared that he had not personally authorized it, and bluntly declined, when pressed, to say whether or not his secretary had been authorized to send the letter published on the eve of posting.

Mr. Rogers told Mr. Kyle in the house today of the advance estimates, that the minister himself did not authorize the publication. Senator Girard had been asking the memorandum as to expenditures and the memorandum was forwarded in response to his request.

But Mr. Chisholm was not satisfied with Mr. Rogers' explanation. He accused the minister of "evading the question." He thought he was entitled to a straight answer to his questions.

Rogers Consults Borden

Mr. Rogers engaged in a whispered conference with Premier Borden.

The minister did not authorize or send the communication," he replied finally.

### FOR GOOD ROADS

Convention Says Take Them Out of Politics

#### PROVINCIAL ASSOCIATION

Resolutions For Abolishing Statute Labor, For Three Trunk Roads and Patrol System—Delegation to Be Sent to Legislature

The idea that New Brunswick must have better roads has taken firm hold of the people of this province and the Good Roads convention yesterday afternoon and evening in the rooms of the board of trade, clearly showed that the people have awakened to the fact that the present state of the highways and byways is a great drag on the progress and prosperity of New Brunswick.

The convention was held in the rooms of the board of trade, and was attended by a large number of delegates from all parts of the province. The resolutions passed at the convention were as follows:

**Abolishing Statute Labor.** The convention resolved that the present system of statute labor should be abolished, and that the roads should be taken out of politics.

### SEASICKNESS

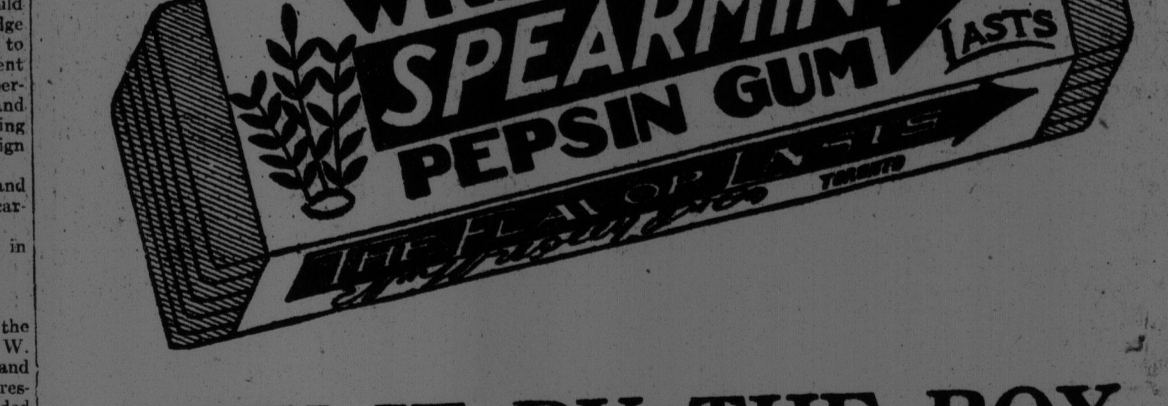

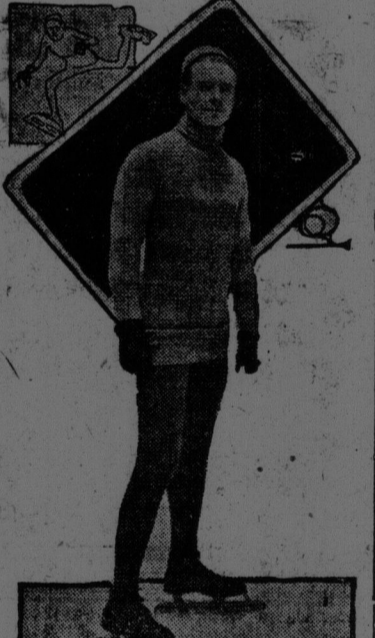

## NEPHEW OF ST. ANDREWS PEOPLE BURIED SIXTY FEET BY AVALANCHE

Edward C. Treadwell Meets Death in Slide in Northern California

That Edward C. Treadwell, son of James Treadwell, and superintendent of the Trinity Center Bonanza Mine in Northern California, was swept to his death on Jan. 14 by an avalanche of snow that had threatened down the mountain side at night, was distressing news that reached St. Andrews on Monday.

It was buried sixty feet in the snow. Forty men were engaged in the search.

Edward C. Treadwell was born in San Francisco thirty-seven years ago. He was a graduate of the University of California, and had been superintendent of this mine for less than a year.

## LAKE ERIE IN PORT

The Erie left Havre on Christmas Day and came to St. John via London. She had not a heavy cargo. The passengers were landed this morning and most of them went through to the West.

The C. P. R. liner Empress of Ireland is expected to land at Halifax this evening and is due to arrive here tomorrow afternoon or evening. She is bringing aboard a record number of passengers, 120 cabin, 300 second cabin and 790 steerage. She has also on board a big cargo.

## WILL HAVE FREE RINK IN CARLETON

Commissioner Wigmore Arranges for Flooding Plot Near Methodist Church

Commissioner Wigmore is busy answering inquiries concerning skating rinks. In other years rinks have been provided in different parts of the city, the aldermen making them possible by having water supplied from the city mains. Formerly the rink at the foot of Broad street was the King Edward school, has been available for rink purposes. This season the vacant city property at the foot of Broad street has been flooded and the young people of that part of the city have greatly enjoyed the pastime this made possible.

Another rink that will receive city aid in the way of water will be situated on the grounds of the Carleton Methodist church. This plot of ground has been prepared for flooding and as soon as the weather permits the water will be supplied by the city water department.

The result has been entirely satisfactory to the young people of the North End who have greatly enjoyed the good ice provided.
