In order that the people of St. John may understand clearwhat is proposed in the way of special freight rates to enable the C.P.R. to haul its trains past St. John to the port of Halifax, it is only necessary to make a comparison between the rate from St. John to Halifax and the rate from St. John to West St.

Under the Gutelius agreement, the I. C. R. will carry flour from St. John to Halifax at the rate of sixty cents per short ton The rate which the C. P. R. charges the I. C. R. for hauling flour from the I. C. R. yard in this city to West St. John (or Carleton) is sixty cents per short ton.

figure in whom he may enshrine his sentiment. Then he marries.



The Murder Shaft

The shaft is about 4 ft. by 2 1-2 ft., and runs up the south wall against No. 24 to the roof. At the bottom is a pit 42 ft. deep. On each of the floors and in the basement a dummy brick fire-lace opens into the shaft. In place of ates age wooden doors, looking like namental screens, covering the grates. Dart of the ornamentation of the side of the mantelpiece is really a knob at the end of an iron bar, which is a lever connected with spring bolts. When this knob is pressed the doors of the dummy screen fly inwards and a big flap in the floor holding the hearthstone drops on hinges. Anyone standing in front of the fireplace would fall down a "chute" into the shaft.

Around the sides of the "murder-chute" rooms on each story, are six other trap-doors in the floor. They are directly over one another and over vaults brow the basement. The solution of the problem, according to the manufacturers, lies with the Educational Authorities, who should, say, establish machine knitting schools either as part of the general technical education, or in special institutions in the various hosiery centres.


Is it quite the business of the com-munity to train girls in the skill requis-ite to factory life, with the object of enabling them to enter into competition with those already employed and so bring down wages?

JOHN CORBETT'S VIEWS ON THE OCEAN FREIGHT RATES

Arguments Against Government Interference — Solution to be Found in Liberal Policy of Increase in British Preference

Board of Trade Building, Montreal, 7th Oct., 1918.

A very interesting statement of the fluctuations in ocean freight, rates was published in one of the leading shipping papers sometime ago. That statement which was illustrated by a diagram, took the boom year of 1900 as a basis for its remarks. As is well known to everyone, the high rates prevailing in 1900 were not the result of an increase in trade, but of a spasmodic increase due to the large requirements of tonnage of all kinds by the British government in the South African affair.

From 1884 to 1889 trade was steady and very little variation in rates took place, but from 1890 to 1895 rates again fell, till in the latter year they wera 40 per cent. less than in the former. Unsettled political conditions had again had an effect on rates, which rose to within 9 per cent. of the basis of 1900. When the British government were finished with the large amount of tonnage employed by them, the effect of so many vessels being replaced on their regular trades, was seen by a fall off of 26 per cent. in that year. Rates remained so unremunerative that shipowners refrained from building new vessels until, in 1911, a natural increase in the demand for tonnage having taken place, the supply available was overtaken and rates began again to move upwards to a paying basis.

The great coal and transport workers' strike of that year in Great Britain had a very serious effect of freight rates tying up thousands of tons of steamships, and resulting afterwards for a short period in a fettitious rise of rates for the time being, in order to overtake lost time.







Montreal, Oct. 10—(Special)—J. M. Robinson, President of the St. John Board of Trade, authorizes the calling of a public meeting Monday evening in St. John to hear the report of the delegates.

The Gutelius Agreement.


