If you live or work in a dirty grimy city no ordinary soap-and-water washing will keep your face clean. So when pimples break out, take a nail brush and soap and scrub your face long and hard. Then bathe it in alcohol and then anoint it with boracic acid ointment.

RYE PANCAKES

Two-thirds cup of sugar 1-2 cup of molasses, 1 cup sweet milk, 1 egg, little salt, scant teaspoon soda, a little cinnamon and ginger. Rye flour enough to drop into little balls in doughnut fat and fry.

ROLLS.

Some time when putting bread in pans take as much dough as you would use for a small loaf of bread, work in a heaping tablespoonful of lard and sugar, let rise until they come to top of bowl. Then shape into rolls, let rise again and bake in moderate oven.

CORN PUDDING

Chop the contents of one can of corn until fine. Add one pint of milk, level teaspoonful of pepper one tablespoonful of pouter, three tablespoonfuls of sugar, one tablespoonful of flour and two eggs beaten. The flour should be thoroughly stirred into the other contents. Pour into buttered dish, set in pan of cold water. Bake about three-quarters of an hour in moderate oven. Remove from oven, slip knife around the edge and invert pudding on hot dish, where it will slip out keeping its shape.
