





REPORT OF DIRECTORS

For presentation to the 3rd Annual Meeting, 19th May, 1884.

GENTLEMEN,-

The Directors present to you their Report for the past year with considerable pleasure and pride inasmuch as, mainly through their attention to the affairs of the Association, it is now in a more prosperous condition than at any time since its organization, the membership being larger and the financial outlook most satisfactory. The major portion of our income is derived from the subscriptions of members which foot up to the respectable figures of \$5567, an increase of more than \$1200, over that of the previous year, while the membership of the Association and its various branches and affiliated clubs is as stated below :

The Financial Statement which has been circulated among the members in accordance with the requirements of the By-Laws, duly audited and found correct shews a nett surplus of Revenue over Expenditure of nearly \$1600 which exceeds even the most sanguine expectations of the Board of Directors; and that, in spite of the extraordinary outdoor attractions during the past winter, which considerably reduced our Club House Receipts for January, February and March, and the wretched luck of the Lacrosse Club in having wet weather for 3 of their matches, bringing them out with a deficit of about \$370.

It was matter for regret that several members had to be expelled during the year for non-payment of dues.

You are of course aware of the formation of "The Amateur Athletic Association of Canada," which will in future control the Canadian Championship Competitions and adjudicate upon applications of disqualified Canadian Amateurs for reinstatement; this will be much more satisfactory than the former system of appealing to the N.A.A.A. with which it becomes a question whether we should continue to affiliate now that we have a National Body of our own.

During the Fall we had several "Hare and Hounds" runs, some of which were very largely attended notably on the 13th, 20th and 27th October, when the fields averaged between 25 and 30. The Chairman of the Billiard Room Department, reports the income from this source slightly in excess of last year's, in spite of counter attractions, 2 tables recovered and repairs done to some of the cushions, the room decorated and a number of surplus pictures from the Club Rooms hung on the walls. He recommends the incoming Chairman to have the pool-table recovered and new Three Tournaments have been held during the season, resulting as follows :---

During the season a new Sett of Pins was purchased and the Rifles put in good order. The Chairman of the Entertainment Committee reports the same difficulty in getting up Amusements as experienced by the other departments and the only Entertainments were one on 21st December, by members of the Bicycle Club, and on the 28th March, by the Dramatic Club; the thanks of the Association are due to the Misses Allan for their kind assistance in the latter case. The amount outstanding for the New Stage is now only a little over \$100, which will no doubt be cleared off this The Chairman earnestly recommends to the attention of season. the incoming Board, the absolute necessity for providing additional means of egress from the Hall, preferably by a door at the side of the Hall to lead by a passage to Mansfield St. The main door should also be made to open outwards, so soon as finances permit. The Chairman of the Library and Club Rooms reports that during the winter a private subscription was raised among the members to redecorate the Rooms and an equal amount to that raised granted by the Board from the Association Funds: the large composition picture of the Snow-Shoe Club of 1877, has also been added to our Contributions were received from Messrs other adornments. Gymnasium Department reports an important addition to the equipment of the Hall by the introduction of a quantity of Dr. Sargent's improved apparatus, purchased at a considerable outlay, the beneficial qualities of which have been enhanced by a new system of medical examination by Dr. Gurd, who has awarded the prizes for best physical development during the season as follows :---

As a means of introducing the new system, a Lecture (with free admission) was given by Dr. Gurd, in the Hall on the 16th October, after he had paid a visit to Boston and interviewed the inventor. The Chairman recommends the purchases of further apparatus, repairing and tinting the walls and ceiling and fixing up the dressingcomparter reports the same difficulty in period of Anos. zmoor

He is strongly against attempting to return to the old plan of a so called Gymnastic Instructor to lead a class of unequally powerful individuals through the same amount of work. Arrangements were made in the early part of the season with a first class Boxing Instructor from New York but they turned out so unsatisfactorily that the Chairman recommends that in future such matters be left to the responsibility of individual members who may wish to obtain instruction. During the latter part of the season the Hall was, as usual, devoted to the use of those members who wished to practice Bicycling on Wednesday evenings. The Chairman of the Out-door Sports Committee reports on the results of the Spring and Fall Meetings, the latter of which will of course be the last Championship of Canada Meeting conducted by this Association, Canada retained 7 out of 16 Championship Events. By resolution of a Special Meeting of the members of the Association held on 21st January last ; the Club Rooms and Library were opened from 8 till 10 p.m., on Sunday evenings during the balance of the winter and were very well attended. This spring a petition to the License Commissioners was drawn up and signed by the officers and a large number of members against granting licenses for saloons in the neighbourhood of our Club House, The license petitioned against has not been granted so far. The Directors decided to offer to any of the Clergymen of the City who might be suggested the privileges of the Club House without fee and several have accepted the same,

During the month of April the Caretaker James Austin left for Nebraska and his place has been filled by George Crawford, who has so far given every satisfaction.

Your Directors decided to accept the Bonds of 1882 in payment of subscriptions of members pending arrangements for a drawing in the ordinary course and a large proportion have been wiped out in this manner so that only \$570, now remain outstanding.

The Secretary, Mr. H. S. Tibbs has made arrangements so that members can have the option of paying their subscriptions either at the Club House during the regular hours (8.30 to 9.30 a.m., and 8 to 9 p.m.,) or at his office 91. St Francois Xavier St., between 10 a.m., and 4 p.m., except on Saturdays, which will no doubt prove a great convenience to many of our members. The retiring Directors strongly recommend the incoming Board to have the Building thoroughly overhauled and repaired this summer both inside and out, some of the brick work on the side wall needs attention and the gutters &c., are in a leaky condition. You have to vote on the changes in the Constitutions and By-Laws recommended by the Sub-Committee appointed for that purpose and if they are adopted you will have to elect the officers and six Directors for the coming year.

CHAIRMEN OF COMMITTEE'S REPORTS.

Montreal, May 14th, 1884.

To the President and Directors of the M. A. A. Association.

Gentlemen,

I have again the honor of presenting the report of the Gymnasium Department for the past season of 1883-4 which owing to the introduction of new methods and ideas may be considered one of special importance.

The attendance was maintained at a fair average during 'the opening and closing months of the season, but the exceptionally fine winter and the many outdoor attractions caused the Gymnasium to be almost deserted night after night while the snow was on the ground, though the hall was always kept lighted for the benefit of any one coming to exercise.

Agreeable to the recommendations offered in my report of last year a number of the more important pieces of Dr. Sargent's pulley weight apparatus were purchased and placed in position and an effort made to introduce and popularize his system of using them and in this connection arrangements were made with Dr. Gurd to conduct the physical examinations upon which the great value of the apparatus depends and which are the basis of the whole system. At your request Dr. Gurd visited Dr. Sargent at Cambridge personally inspecting the working of the system there and receiving from him useful hints and information concerning it, and on his return-gave a most interesting introductory lecture in the Gymnasium Hall, on the human frame and the results to be obtained by rational attempts to develop it, showing how this apparatus was peculiarly adapted for that purpose.

In order to induce as large a number as possible to use the apparatus the examination fee was placed at a minimum and two medals offered for the best developments reached by means of its use, the results of the competition being shown in Dr. Gurd's report herewith submitted.

DEAR SIR,-I have the following report to make regarding the examination recently held for the prizes offered by the association for the greatest physical improvement under the use of the new apparatus.

Owing to the craze for tobogganing and snew-shoeing this past winter, out of a class of about twenty who started, only four presented themselves for the final testing, and of these only two have attempted to do the work prescribed for them. These two show considerable improvement, though great increase in measurments is not seen, as they, as well as Mr. Ross, were all in pretty good i" form " at the beginning of the season,

The following is the order in which the competitors came out ;---

First, Mr. J. Allan, 24 points,

Second, Mr. P. Guy, 20 points,

Third, Mr, J. G. Ross, 18 points.

The fourth, Mr. A. Hamilton, should not have tried, as he had been ailing for some time and had lost weight and muscle rapidly latterly. Mr. Hamilton gave up doing the work ordered him by me and instead of which he so overworked himself at the parallel bars and ladders as to interfere with his health.

Dr. Sargent's system of exercising individuals, though lacking that spirit of emulation so facinating to young men is, nevertheless, I am convinced, the safest

Two of the twenty examined by me would have permanently injured themselves and best. by exercising with a class, all trying, the weak and the strong, to do the same work under the ordinary system.

The apparatus proved very popular with a large number who did not avail themselves of the examinations, but who used it steadily both in the afternoons and evenings with great satisfaction, everyone speaking very highly of it.

This competition though devoid of any special features in the way of great results is noteworthy from the fact of its being the first attempt here, that I am aware of, to encourage an athlete to show *directly in his own person*, the results of his training, rather than that he should be encouraged to train himself into such a condition as to be able to outstrip his competitors in the effort to accomplish a certain number of "feats," and secure a coveted "championship," even at the cost of overtaxed vitality.

The publication of Dr. Gurds report created considerable interest and some newspaper correspondence, the *Star* making it the subject of a leading article, in which the Association was congratulated and the opinion expressed " that a better and safer form of competition could not have been devised."

All our efforts should be made with this end in view and the members induced to use the Gymnasium for the benefits they may derive physically, and to look upon the exercises as a means to that end.

The question of having an instructor in the Gymnasium having been more or less discussed among the members, it may be in order to place on record my opinion on the matter which is this,---that while I am prepared to admit that a Gymnasium, simply as such, might be made a greater success by having at its head a thoroughly competent director. (who should be much more than a mere gymnastic, instructor.) the position ours occupies merely as a branch of the Association the many other attractions tending to draw members away, and the very heavy expense such a step would entail, (even if the proper man could be found,) with no prospect of an adequate return, should prevent the Directors taking any such financial risks, aside altogether from the expediency of such a step. With the continued co-operation of Dr. Gurd in his capacity of medical examiner, the hearty assistance of the older members who may still take an active part in the exercises, and the general equipment of Hall, apparatus, and dressing rooms, &c., maintained in the most efficient manner, there should be every reason to be satisfied, and the facilities offered to those disposed to use them, will be second to none in this country.

The arrangements for the boxing class, under Mr. Smith from New York, having proved very unsatisfactory I would recommend that no financial responsibility be assumed by the Association in such matters, but that should a class be formed and the teacher approved of, the terms be arranged directly between him and the members taking part.

The Sub-Committee appointed to look after matters of detail, classes, &c., fulfilled their part satisfactorily, and a Committee of say six of the most prominent and active members of the class should be appointed at the beginning of the season to relieve the Chairman of part of his duties in these respects.

I would also strongly recommend that the much needed repairs to the Gymnasium Hall be attended to this summer, the mattresses and clothes lockers, repaired where needed, and the dressing rooms made as comfortable and attractive as possible, also that a further expenditure be incurred for additional pulley weight apparatus, so that the two pieces now used as combinations may be divided and the additional parts ordered to complete them as separate machines, . as well as an additional "chest weight" with bridle and stirrup attachments for neck and leg developments, as I am convinced that a judicious expenditure in the directions indicated, rather than for the services of an instructor(?) is our true policy, and that, as, with the great number of other attractions in and outside the building during the season the Gymnasium cannot attain to any great prominence, it should at least be equipped in a manner second to none for the benefit of those who desire to use its appliances to obtain a rational physical development. and the rest of much and not more A Respectfully submitted.

To the President and Directors of the M. A. A. Association. Gentlemen,

As Chairman of the Club and Reading Room Committee, I have the honor to present you herewith my report for the year just terminated.

The subscriptions to the former list of papers and magazines, with some additions, were renewed for the present year, and comprises all the leading sporting and pictorial papers and magazines of America and Great Britain, and we think we may still claim that this branch of our Association is unequalled by any reading room in the City.

We regret to say that the efforts of your Committee to secure the books of the Mercantile Library Association, which have been stored in our building for several years past, have not so far been crowned with success, but we trust that desirable object will yet be attained and we commend our successors in office to give this matter their earnest attention, and not to relax their efforts until our Association becomes possessed of these books, so that they may again be put into circulation, and thus add another to the many attractions of our Association, and not as now lie useless on the shelves.

Early in the winter the Directors were presented for the second time with a petition largely signed, asking that the Club and Reading Rooms be kept open for two hours on Sunday evenings during the winter months, as some opposition was made to this petition, under the circumstances, the Directors thought it best to call a special meeting of the Association to consider the matter. This was accordingly done and after an animated discussion, it was put to the vote and carried that the prayer of the petitioners be granted; the privelege has been largely availed of by our members with we trust advantage to themselves.

Though it was apparent that our Club Rooms required redecorating and re-furnishing, the Directors with a due regard to economy, had not felt that they could at present grant the necessary funds to accomplish this object in a befitting manner, but with a commendable generosity, a number of members started a subscription among themselves for that purpose, it being understood that the Directors would supplement this by a grant from the funds of the Association of a like amount to that raised by private subscription, this liberality on the part of our members enabled us to make the marked improvements which can be observed in this part of your building, and by which the comfort of your members have been

increased to a considerable degree; and we trust as our Association prospers we will soon be enabled to re-decorate and re-furnish the entire building in a manner becoming such an institution as ours, and would commend this object to the attention of the incoming board.

During the past year the large grouped photograph of the Montreal S. S. Club in 1877, came into the Clubs possession as per agreement with Mr. Notman, and it now serves to decorate our Club Rooms; this picture is one of great value in a historical sense to The Bicycle Clubs our Club and becomes more so every year. picture which had been at the Boston Exhibition for some time past, is also again in our possession. A number of our old and valued members have presented their portraits to the Association and these assist in adorning our rooms and will keep their memories green, perhaps after the originals have made their final journey over Mount Royal, but this we trust may not be for many years yet to come. Your rooms have also been embellished by photographs of the Shamrock Lacrosse Club, (ex. Champions) presented by that Club, and the European Lacrosse Teams of 1883, presented by Dr. W. Geo. Beers, also by a magnificent Cariboo head and antlers, We would take the liberty of loaned by Mr. H. Wylie Becket. commending to our fellow members this generosity, and would assure them that a place will always be found for any contributions towards the decoration of our Club House, that they may choose to make. ANNUAL REPORT

-OF THE-

MONTREAL+LACROSSE+CLUB,

FOR THE SEASON OF 1883.

Montreal, 2nd April, 1884.

Gentlemen,

For the third time I have the pleasure of presenting the Report of your Committee on the past season's work.

Early in the spring a number of new dressing boxes were placed in the pavilion, and during the season some minor repairs were effected about the stands and fences.

You will notice by the Treasurer's statement, shortly to be read, that the income from Subscriptions is \$100. in excess of last year's.

The grounds were not so frequently rented as in some former years and the revenue from that source did not, as in some cases, cover the rent of the field. Our matches too were not a source of profit as we had exceptionally hard luck in our weather; the gate at three important fixtures being spoiled by rain, that account shews a deficit also.

The item of wages is rather higher this year as Marlin has been kept on all winter to look after our property which will reduce our ground expenses in the coming year by the amount necessary to repair damage done formerly during the winter. The item of general expenses is some \$120. less than last year, and there is a considerable reduction in the amount of the outlay for Uniforms for the Teams. The whole statement shows a deficit of \$311.90, which has to be made up out of the Association Funds, The season commenced with a return match between our Second Twelve and the Young Shamrocks, on the Shamrock Grounds, on the 19th May, which resulted in a defeat for our Boys by 3 games to 2.

The first match of the season on our grounds was, as usual fixed for the Queen's Birthday with the Caughnawaga Indians, but that day proving wet, it was postponed till the following Saturday (26th May,) when our Team won 4 games to 1.

On the same day a match was played between the Montreal Juniors and a Scratch Team of ours, who suffered a defeat by 3 games to 1,

It must not be forgotten that several of our best players were in Europe with the "Canadian" Team, in spite of which, on the 23rd June, our First Twelve defeated the Shamrocks in a return match on our own grounds in 3 straights in very quick time. The names of those who so nobly upheld the honor of the Old Club were, G. Aird, J. Crowley, F. Dillon, E. Elliot, R. Elliot, W. Hamilton, T. L. Paton, R. Whyte, T. F. Trihey, A. E. McNaughton, A. G. Grant, D. Paterson.-Reserve, J. Blacklock; Captain, *R. B. Ross*. The "Torontos" having arranged with the "Shamrocks" to play in Toronto on Dominion Day, we were forced to look out for some new spot to visit on tha occasion, and ultimately arranged for a "Mixed" Team Match with the "Cornwall Club" in Ottawa.

Your Committee would recommend that an effort be made by the players to attend morning practices more particularly as many find that the afternoon practice interferes too much with business. They would also suggest that the grounds be reserved as much as possible for our own use in which case no doubt a number of our lady friends would become members and make use of the grounds for purposes of recreation during the afternoons, which would no doubt have a refining and elevating tendency to the Club Membership as a whole.

Your Committee would recommend the continuation of the engagement of Marlin the Caretaker of the Grounds, his services having proved quite satisfactory in the past 2 years.

They would also recommend that the Field Captain make a written report of every match, giving Teams, Results. Time of Games and any other desirable information, so as to make the records of the Club more complete.

You are of course aware that the Grounds were rented to the Tuque Bleue Tobogan Club during the past winter for the purpose of erecting a slide which proved very popular with the fair sex, who have thus become accustomed to pay frequent visits to the grounds during the winter, and there is no reason why, if proper steps are taken the field should not be as popular with them in the summer.







ANNUAL REPORT

Montreal Snow Shoe Club,

FOR THE SEASON 1883-84.

Gentlemen,

Again it is my pleasing duty to lay before you the Annual Report of your Committee for the past season, it being the Forty-Second Annual Report of the Club's doings.

The past season was a very favorable one and the great impetus given to all out-door sports by the Winter Carnival added greatly to its success. It was also unsurpassed in interest in the Annals of the Club. Our membership has increased. The average attendance at Wednesday evening tramps has been greater than it ever was before. The average attendance on Saturday afternoons has been very fair, and our reputation on the race track has been well sustained.

Our Club now consists of 547 paying members and 90 life members, making in all a total membership of 637.

Our first tramp took place on Wednesday evening, the 21st of November, when seventy-two members walked out to Lumkin's by Côte des Neiges road and were entertained to the usual supper by the President Mr. G. R. Starke, and the two Vice Presidents Messrs. H. W. Becket and T. L. Paton.

Our first tramp on shoes took place on Wednesday evening the 5th of December, and the last Wednesday evening tramp, on the 19th of March.

During the winter we took 16 Wednesday evening tramps with an average attendance of 107, this being the best average attendance since the Club started and more than double the average attendance of last year.

The average number of trampers (on shoes) was 78, and the largest muster 326, on the evening of the Carnival Torchlight Procession, this being the largest muster by far that the Club has ever had.

Our first Saturday afternoon tramp took place on the 5th of January, at 3.30 p.m. thirty-six members headed by the President left the Tuque Bleue slide for a tramp to the Back River. Shoes were strapped on at the head of Durocher St. and in one hour and forty minutes Peloquin's was reached when the members had their usual three hours "do as you please." Our last Saturday afternoon tramp was taken on the 2nd of February. This early date for closing ou tramps was owing to the excitement of the race course, forming a greater attraction to the most of our members than our usual cross country tramps.

During the winter we had five Saturday afternoon tramps with an average attendance of 31. Average number of trampers 23, and largest muster 40, (Back River.) During the winter the following places were visited, viz:--Back River, twice; Lachine, Longue Pointe and St. Laurent, once. The total number of tramps taken during the past winter was 21.

On Wednesday evening the 2nd of January, the Annual Green Steeplechase took place. Ten competitors started, the race being won by Mr. W. McCaw, in 29 minutes. On the following Wednesday evening January 9th, the Annual Steeplechase took place. The race was run through a heavy snow storm. Seven members started, the race being won by Mr. J. G. Ross, in 24 min. 8 sec.

On Thursday evening the 17th of January, a friendly game of hockey took place in the Victoria Rink between a Team from the St. George S. S. C., and one from the Montreal S. S. C. The game resulted in a victory for the Montreal by 1 goal to nothing.

On Friday the 18th of January, the Club in response to an invitation from the good people of Granby, visited that town for the purpose of giving a concert in aid of the Mechanics Institute. At 4.45 p.m., 46 members left by train and arrived at Granby at 7.30 p.m., where they were met by Mr. J. McIntosh, President of the Mechanics Institute and escorted to the Town Hall, where they partook of light refreshments, after which they were introduced to the audience. After the concert the members were entertained to

a magnificient banquet after which the young people of Granby and the members of the Club had a little recreation in the hall before retiring to their respective billets.

The Club returned by train next morning all highly pleased with their trip.

On Wednesday evening the 23rd of January, the members of the Club entertained their lady friends. The night turned out very stormy but in spite of the weather about 100 ladies were present 50 of whom tramped over the mountain. Our President Mr. G. R. Starke, welcomed the ladies in the name of the Club and stated that this was the first event of the kind that had been attempted, and he hoped it would be the inauguration of an annual meeting of the same kind. Dancing was kept up with great spirit throughout the evening, although the new Club Room at Lumkin's was densely crowded, the party broke up about twelve o'clock.

On Saturday the 26th of January, the Lachine S. S. Club held their races, there being one open event which was won by a member of the Tuque Bleue, Mr. W. Kerr.

On Saturday the 2nd of February, the Argyle S. S. Club held their Annual Races. There were four open events of which the Montreal won two, the Emerald one and the St. George one.

On Saturday the 5th of February the Carnival Races took place. There were seven events of which the Mcntreal won two, the Emerald three, St. George one, and the Argyle one. At this meeting the Two Mile Race in the Merchants Cup series was run, the first, second and fourth places being won by members of the Tuque Bleue, and the third place, by a member of the Emerald. On Wednesday evening the 6th of February the Carnival Torchlight Procession took place The Procession was composed of the following Clubs :--Montreal (leading), St. George, Emerald, Le Canadien, Le Trappeur, Argyle, Maple Leaf, Wolseley, Albert, Beauharnois, St. Charles, Athletic, Victoria and Cowansville Snow Shoe Clubs.

About 1500 Snowshoers took part in the Procession, the Tuque Bleue turning out 326. The Snowshoers surrounded the Ice Palace, and at a given signal, a shower of colored balls of fire were fired into the Palace which were answered by rockets and colored (balls from the Palace. The attack and defence of the Ice Palace was one of the grandest sights ever witnessed in the city. After the Palace had capitulated, the Snowshoers formed into line and tramped over the mountain, the line being led by Mr. Angus Grant, Chairman, Carnival S. S. Committee. On the return of the Snowshoers an impromptu concert took place in the Gymnasium representing the manner in which the Clubs passed the evenings of their weekly tramps over the Mountain.

In the evening the Annual Dinner was held in the Windsor Hotel, 144 sitting down including guests. The Chair was occupied by Mr. G. R. Starke, and the Vice Chairs by Messrs H. W. Becket, T. L. Paton and R. D. McGibbon.

Among the guests present were :--U. S. Consul General Stearns, Lt. Col. E. A. Whitehead, Messrs Wm. Cassils, John Low, Angus Grant, H. Cameron, M.P., T. White, M.P., Dr. Hingston, C. P. Davidson and the Presidents of the different Snow Shoe Clubs. During the evening Mr. Hall of Boston, sang an original song composed for the occasion, and Mr. G. Iles, read an original poem, "The Ice Castle's Farewell," composed by Mr. James Hannay.

During the evening Mr. Angus Grant our Honory President, in a few well chosen words, described the origin and adoption of the "Tuque Bleue;" Mr. Grant then presented the Montreal Snow Shoe Club with the original Tuque Bleue which was made in the year 1867.

On Saturday the 16th of February, the St. George S. S. Club held their Annual Races on the M. L. C. Grounds. There were four open events including the 220 yards in the Merchants Cup series. In the 220 yards the Emerald won first place and the Montreal second, third and fourth places. In the other events the Tuque Bleue only succeeded in winning two second prizes, the Emerald winning one, the Argyle one and the Athletic one.

On the following Saturday, the Emerald S. S. Club held their Annual Races on the M. L. C. Grounds. There were four open events including the One Mile in the Merchants Cup series in which the first, second, third and fourth places fell to members of the Tuque Bleue, but we did not succeed in getting places in any of the other events, the Emerald winning one, the St. George one and the Argyle one.

On Saturday the 1st of March, the Annual Races of the Le Canadien S. S. Club took place on the M. L. C. Grounds. There were two open events including the Half Mile for the Merchants Cup-In the Half Mile the first, second, third and fourth places were won by members of the Montreal, the Emeralds won the other open event.

At this meeting the Merchants Cup series was concluded.

The first prize in this series was a Silver Cup valued at \$250.00 to be awarded to the competetor who would make the greatest number of points in five different races viz :—220 Yards, 440 Yards, 880 Yards, One Mile and Two Miles. The first place to count four points, second three points, third two points and fourth one point.

The following was the result :---

- 1st J. G. Ross, (M.) 18 Points, 1st in 2 Miles, 13 min. 18 sec., 1st in Mile, 5 min. 50 sec., 1st in Half Mile, 3 min. 6 sec., 1st in Quarter Mile, 1 min. 15 sec., and 3rd in 220 Yards.
- 2nd N. FLETCHER, (M.) 12 Points, 4th in 2 Miles, 2nd in Mile, 3rd in Half Mile, 2nd in Quarter Mile and 2nd in 220 Yards.
- 3rd J. BAIRD, (M.) 8 Points, 3rd in Mile, 2nd in Half Mile, 3rd in Quarter Mile and 4th in 220 Yards.
- 4th D. D. McTAGGART, (M.) 6 Points, 2nd in 2 Miles, 4th in Mile, 4th in Half Mile and 4th in Quarter Mile.

Thus it will be seen that out of a possible 20 points, Mr. J. G. Ross scored 18, a record which has never before been achieved by any person. Mr. Ross may well feel proud of his performance and the Club that in him they have one who will always strive to uphold its honor, be it on the race track or elsewhere.

In the evening a complimentary supper was given to the winners of prizes in the Merchants Cup series, in the Gymnasium. About 80 members sat down, the Chair being occupied by Mr. G. R. Starke and the Vice Chairs by Messrs H. W. Becket and T. L. Paton. After the banquet the floor was cleared for dancing and afterwards the meeting resolved itself into an impromptu concert.

On Wednesday afternoon the 12th of March, the much talked of Open Steeplechase took place. The race was started from the foot of McTavish St., instead of the usual place. The following competitors faced the starter Mr. G. R. Starke :---







THE

MONTREAL BICYCLE CLUB.

TO THE SIXTH ANNUAL MEETING, 10TH APRIL, 1884.

The retiring officers have much pleasure in presenting their Report for the season of 1883, to the Sixth Annual Meeting of the Montreal Bicycle Club, and they do so in the hope that the members will acknowledge that they have fulfilled the duties of their position to the best of their ability.

For the first time since the formation of the Club. the opening meet which was fixed for Saturday April 28th, came of on the day appointed, when 11 men road out to Blue Bonnets. Capt. Muirhead in his report of this ride states, that the roads were good. Let us hope that the same date this year may find us again in the saddle. The closing meet was held on Tuesday November 13th, when only two were found rash enough to face the blinding snow-storm that prevailed on that occasion.

Between these dates the Club turned out for 70 rides, 32 fixtures having been cancelled owing to unfavorable weather. The mileage for the season was 932 miles, (the biggest since our formation) and the runs were attended by a total of 757 members, or an average of nearly 11.

The events of the day were, the two open bicycle races and the bicycle race for the Club Cup and the half mile foot race. Both the open bicycle races, one and five miles, were won by W. G. Ross. The 3 mile race for the Club Cup was won by J. H. Low, Ross was entered for it but did not start, contenting himself with his other engagements. The half mile foot, brough out undoubtedly the two best men at that distance in the Dominion, namely, Norman Fletcher of the M. A. A. A., and C, W. Martin of Ottawa F. C. The band of the 6th Fusiliers contributed capital music to the programme.

CLUB BICYCLE RACES.

The first event on the programme was the one mile race, 4th class, open to those who never raced before, six entries, four starters, won by E. C. P. Guy in 3.53, J. T. Gnaedinger second.

- The next class event was an amusing one, being a 700 yards race for boys under fifteen, on 3 wheeled velocipedes, most of the competitors came to grief in one way or another before the race was over; won by John Parsons, with J. T. Kennedy second, 5 starters.
- The next race was two miles, 3rd. class, open to those who never won a prize except in 4th. class race, 7 entries, 6 starters, won by R. C. Holden, in 7.48, H. Macculloch second.
- Next came another 2 mile event, 2nd class, open to those who had never won a first prize from scratch except in a 3rd or 4th class race, 5 entries, all started, won by G. S. Low in 8.03, W. J. Farguharson second.
- The one mile for boys under 18, breught cut 5 starters and was won by G. Angus in 4.42.
- The event of the Club Races, however was the 3 mile contest for the Club Cup. Five started, H. S. Tibbs, A T. Lane, J. H. Low, G. H. Hill and R. Darling; Tibbs took the lead at the start and kept it for the first 2 miles and when passed by Low a good race ensued between him, Darling and Lane. Towards the close Darling spurted and took second place, beating Tibbs by about six inches, Lane in endeavoring to close up on the home stretch, got a nasty fall. Low won in 11,46.

THE OPEN BICYCLE RACES.

- The first of the open events was the one mile, which brought out 3 starters, W. G. Ross, Alan Arthur and R. Darling, Arthur took the lead, with Darling second, Ross third. This remained the order until on the last lap, when Darling passed Arthur, and when within about 50 yards of the finish Ross shot past the other two, winning in 3.47.
- The most exciting event of the day was the 5 mile race, only 3 started out of 5 entries, viz :--W. G. Ross, J. H. Low and G. S. Low. J. H. Low led at the start followed by Ross, G. S. Low acting as whipper in, but the pace soon got too hot for "Bunny" and he dropped out and left the race to the others. For 23 laps Low led, riding beautifully, and as Ross appeared to be labouring, it began to look as though his leader would keep ahead throughout, on the 25th and last lap however, the usual spurt came from Ross, and he shot ahead of Low and after a brief struggle drew rapidly ahead and won by 30 or 40 yards in 18.47. The time of each of the five miles respectively was, $3.48\frac{1}{2}$, $3.39\frac{1}{2}$, 3.45, 3.44 and 3.47.

THE FOOT RACES.

- The first of the foot races was the 100 yards dash, in heats. The only starters were W. R. Thompson, (M. A. A. A.,) and Geo. H. Wood, (Shamrocks,) Thompson won two straight heats in 10 sec. each.
- The next race was the half mile and was a splendid contest. The starters were Norman Fletcher, (M. A. A. A.,) and C. W. Martin, (Ottawa F. C.,) Fletcher won in 2.02½.
- The third race was the mile, won by D. D. McTaggart, (M.A.A.A.) in 4.46½, S. Edwards, (Pt. St. Charles,) second, S. D. Jones, (Athletic L. C.,) third
- The quarter mile dash was a gift to W. R. Thompson, who won in $1.02\frac{1}{2}$.

Our race meeting proved a success financially as well as in other respects and that it did so is largely owing to the generosity of the following gentlemen :--Messrs. P. S. Ross, W. G. Ross, Jno. Low, G. T. Bishop and your President, Vice-President and Hon. Secretary.

On the 29th June, Messrs. Ross, Low and Muirhead left for London, Ont., to compete in the first race meeting held by the C. W. Association. The races came off on Monday July 2nd, and Ross won the one mile, (2 straight heats,) and the five mile Championship of Canada. On Oct. 13th, Ross again won the one mile event, at the opening of the Toronto Athletic Grounds, in 3.13, (fastest Canadian record.) On October 20th, at Toronto Bicycle Club Races, Ross again came out ahead in the one mile, and made a dead heat with Westbrooke of Brantford. in the three miles. The time of this last event was 10.58, (being the fastest Canadian record.)

On Monday September 17th, some 23 of our Club accompanied by Messrs. Rideout and Roethers (of Port Elgin), and Hughes of Newmarket, and Dean of Belleville, left to attend the tournament at Springfield, Messrs. W. G. Ross and J. H. Low, had already gone there the Monday previous.

Of the good time spent there, the many laughable incidents, serenades, etc., it is not necessary to give details of here, suffice it to say then that if our racers, Ross, Low and Arthur, did not do as well as we would have liked yet considering everything their performance was very creditable. In the 10 miles Championship of America, ten starters, Ross came in fourth with Hendee, (Springfield,) Robinson, (England) and Corey, (Boston,) ahead of him. In the half mile dash, 15 starters, Ross was third with Robinson first, and Burnham second.

In the two miles, 9 starters, Ross was again fourth with Robinson, Corey and Vesey, (England,) ahead.

In the one mile, 7 starters, Ross was third in 2,52, with Corey first in 2.513/4, Robinson second, and Hendee fourth, (all breaking the previous record of 2.54.)

In the 25 miles, Low did some good work, finishing close to the leader, the final mile being done in 3.09.

At a special meeting, held 12th July, 1883, for the purpose, the Club resolved to join the C. W. Association as a body, which was done, and we are now the largest club in that organization. As some of you are doubtless aware, efforts are being made to have the Annual Meet of the C. W. A. held in Montreal this year, instead of Toronto, as it appears the Toronto Wheelmen cannot see their way clear to hold the Meet on the 1st July without incurring loss. If these efforts are successful, your Committee trust our members will turn out at the Meet in full force, to do honour to their club and their visitors, and make the occasion one long to be remembered in the annals of Cycling. On December 20th we celebrated our Fifth Anniversary, by a very successful entertainment held in our Gymnasium Hall. Your Committee regret they are unable to submit a statement of this entertainment as some members who received tickets to dispose off have not yet made their returns although more than three months have elapsed.

The drill squad was, last season, a most triumphant failure. This is to be regretted for more reasons than one, and it certainly does seem strange that out of our large list of members, 12 or 16 cannot be found with sufficient club spirit to enable them to turn out together for even one morning in the week for practice.

A well deserved tribute was paid to our Champion on 14th March, last, when W. G. Ross was presented with a "Rudge" Racer in token of the Clubs appreciation of his many victories last season. May he add many more to his list during the coming year.

As usual, a riding school has been established, in the large hall on Wednesday evenings, of which we trust you will all take advantage.

"Whom the Gods wish to destroy they first make mad" and it would seem that when the M. Bi. C. wish to get rid of any of their members they make him their Captain.





SEASON 1883,

Gentlemen,

It affords me much pleasure this evening to present to you a report of the work done by your club during the past season, the fourth in its history. It is very gratifying to me to be able to state that last season was the most successful one since the club was organized ; but I beg to take this opportunity of calling the attention of our members, as well as those of the Montreal club, to a heavy disadvantage under which we have heretofore been laboring and which threatens to do us considerable injury this season. I refer to the custom which has prevailed in former years of the latter club taking so many of our best men when in need of players. Now, although I am sure, I but express the opinion of this club, when I say that we consider it a high honor to have any of our members selected by the seniors for vacancies on the first twelve, yet at the same time we can hardly consider it such when they are transferred to their second twelve, who, are as you are aware, by the rules of lacrosse, (art. XXIX sec. 9.) are not entitled to play for any championship. I think the Montreal club, and we as well, should see that our ranks are not so much depleted by this process as to place us in such a position as to have little hope for the junior champion-I do not condemn the practice, but I should like very much ship. that it should be done in such a manner as to render both clubs efficient. This may be done by the senior club selecting only that member which they absolutely require. It seemed uncalled for, that

while some of our best men are placed on the second twelve of the seniors we at the same time should have a dearth or men. As you are aware we joined the National Lacrosse Association of Canada in July, so as to be able to compete for the local championships which have been offered by the said association, also to have a vote at their meetings. Our club played seven matches, six of which were first twelve, of which five were won and one lost. The second twelve played only one match, which they won. We played altogether 26 games and won 22 and lost 4. On June 9, we played our opening match with the second twelve of Montreal, and were successful in winning three games to our opponents one. On June 23, our 2nd twelve played and defeated the 2nd of the Athletics, in three straight games in a few minutes, the play being altogether in our favor. On July 2, our 1st twelve met the Sherbrooke team in that place and defeated them in three straight games, the play being mostly in our favor. On July 14, we crossed sticks with the st twelve of the Athletics on our grounds, and were again victorious, winning three straights. Our players were the same as in previous match in Sherbrooke. On August 11, we played and defeated Le Canadien in three strai ht games. On August 18, we again crossed sticks with the second twelve of Montreal, and defeated them in three straight games. The play was pretty even in this match. On September 25, we played the Junior Shamrocks on their grounds for the championship, but were defeated after a hard struggle, our opponents taking three games to our two. As you see, this was the only defeat we suffered during the season. We endeavored to arrange a return match, but they declined to meet us, although they had over a month until the close of the season. During the season, eighty-five members paid their subscription, showing an increase of thirty-five over the preceeding season.
