RESOLUTIONS OF CONFERENCE.

1. That the Goulbourn Circuit be divided into two Circuits; one to embrace the townships of Emsley, Drummond, and Bathurst, (to be called the Drummond Circuit,) and that the other embrace all the remaining part of the original Circuit, (to be called the Goulbourn Circuit.)

2. This Conference is of opinion that the resolution of the Annual Conference of 1840, with reference to Brother Trueman Cole, casts no reflection upon his moral or religious character, as it only expresses a desire that he should give the Circuit more of his labours as a Local Minister.

3. That all presents given to our Preachers for baptisms and burials, shall not be accounted for as part of their salary.

4. That all our Preachers who have families shall be allowed horse feed, house-rent, and firewood, exclusive of their salary.

5. That every Minister on probation write an original article for the *Messenger*, at least every six months, and that such be submitted to the inspection of the General Superintendent, who shall judge as to its fitness for publication.

6. That it is highly necessary some better plan be adopted in reference to the statistics of the Members of our Church.

7. That the families of our Church Members be inserted in the Minutes of our Conference in one column, and that the Members themselves be inserted in another column; and that in future all our Ministers make their returns accordingly.

8. That the attention of our Ministers be especially directed to the rules of our discipline regarding Class Meetings, and that they be particularly requested to inspect the Class Books or Papers, and to visit the absent Members. Each Class should be met by the Preacher at least once or twice a quarter. The Delegates will do well to pay some attention to this resolution.

9. That in future the *Messenger* be paid for in advance.

11. That the thanks of this Conference be presented to the Editor of the *Christian Messenger*, for the very able manner in which he has conducted the paper, and that he be requested to continue his services as Editor for the coming year.

12. That as the conversion of the French Canadians in this Province must be effected by the efforts of a distinct Society, embracing all evangelical bodies of Christians, this Conference learns with great pleasure that such a Society has been formed in Montreal, which, for six years, has been labouring very efficiently in striving to bring the French Canadians to a knowledge of the truth; and this Conference would earnestly recommend the French Canadian Missionary Society to the sympathies and prayers of the Members of our Church.

13. That the columns of the *Christian Messenger* be opened to the French Canadian Missionary Society, for the insertion of articles connected with its operations.

14. That the resolution of Conference, 1844, respecting the entering of Baptismal Registers into one general Conference Book be rescinded, and that each Circuit be required to provide a Registry Book for itself, and that all Baptisms be duly entered therein.

15. That the Annual Committee be empowered to call a District Meeting for the accommodation of the Eastern Townships in Canada East for the present year.

16. That the General Superintendant be empowered to call a Preacher from any Station to assist at the Missionary Meetings, with the understanding that no Preacher be taken away for more than two Sabbaths.

17. That the Goods from England for the Bazaar be forwarded to Hamilton, and be sold under the superintendence of the Annual Committee.

18. That the Paternal Fund Subscriptions for the present year be published in the Minutes, and that the Preachers during the coming year be more particular in bringing the details of these accounts to the Conference.

19. That the thanks of this Conference be given to the Rev. J. Addyman, for his valuable and untiring efforts to promote the best interests of the Connexion in Canada; and this Conference also desires to express the high estimation in which we hold our dear brother as a man, a Christian, and a minister—the deep sorrow we feel at his

removal, and hope that should his life be spared, it may be in the providence of God that he be returned amongst us, to occupy his former station.

20. That the Annual Committee for Canada West, be composed of the following brethren :—Rev. J. Wilkinson, *President of the Conference* ; and Rev. Edward Morris, with Michael Aikman, Esq., Messrs. Thomas Lotridge and J. Cummins. And that the following brethren form the Committee for Canada East :—Revds. L. P. Adams, and T. T. Howard, with Messrs. L. F. Leach, O. Peasly, and T. Appleton. Rev. H. O. Crofts, *General Superintendent*, the Corresponding Member of both Committees.

21. That after the year 1846, the Conference be held alternately in the upper and the lower Districts.

22. That the thanks of this Conference be given to those liberal friends in England, who sent books by Brother Jackson to assist in forming a Preachers' Library in Canada.

23. That the thanks of this Conference be presented to James Hughston, Esq., for his valuable services as Treasurer of the Connexion for the past year, and that he be requested to continue his services as Treasurer for the ensuing year.

24. That the next Conference be held at the Lake Chapel on the Hamilton Station, to commence on the second Monday in June 1846.

ADDRESS

Of the Seventeenth Annual Conference to the Members of
the Canadian Wesleyan Methodist New Connexion Church.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,—Through the goodness of our kind and gracious Father, we are permitted again to meet in our Annual Conference. Since we last assembled, one of our dear ministers, brother James Jolliff, has been removed from the Church, militant to the Church triumphant. Our loss is his infinite, eternal gain.

We are happy to state to our brethren that our Conference has been one of peace and harmony. The spirit manifested by the Ministers and Delegates in all their deliberations and discussions, went to shew that their great object was to advance the glory of God and the best interests of his cause.

Very encouraging reports have been received from many of the Circuits; but we are sorry to say that from some others the reverse has been the case. We are gratified in having to record a cheering increase in the number of our members. We rejoice that in all our difficulties the Lord has been with us, and the God of Jacob has been our refuge. Looking back on the past, and considering the trials through which the Lord has brought us, we regard the success which has attended our labours as an especial mark of the Divine approbation on our efforts to promote his glory and the salvation of souls.

We are happy in stating that several of our Circuits have made great progress during the past year in erecting suitable places for the worship of God, and we desire to express our gratitude to those liberal friends who have nobly come to our assistance in this great matter. May God richly reward them with grace in this world and glory everlasting in that to come.

It is with pleasure we advert to the fact, that the Conference is using every possible means to secure an efficient ministry for our people; to this end a regular course of study is enjoined, and the Conference has deeply impressed upon the minds of all our preachers, the absolute necessity of enforcing the various rules of our excellent discipline, to maintain themselves an unblemished reputation, and to be punctual in their attendance to all their appointments.

There is great credit due to many of our Circuits for their zeal in raising means to support our missionary operations; and considering the infancy of the institution, their success has fully met our utmost expectations. At the same time we would express our hope that other Circuits will emulate the zeal and experience the same success in their efforts: for the harvest truly is great and the labourers still are few.

It is painful to the Conference to listen to the many calls for help from many Districts, whilst it is not in its power to respond to those calls by providing for their spiritual necessities. It is equally painful, also, to know that many of our devoted missionaries have fallen far short of the small allowance made for them by the discipline of our Church. We would therefore strongly impress upon the minds of our brethren and friends generally, the absolute necessity of supporting their ministers to the extent of their ability; it cannot be

Dearly beloved, permit us also to impress upon your minds the necessity of attending upon all your Christian duties,—such as the ministration of the word of God and all the ordinances appointed by God in his Church. Encourage your ministers by your constant attendance on the prayer meetings, and your leaders by a regular attendance on the class meetings. Let all our members discharge their duty to God, the Church, and their fellowmen, and we shall see our Church rising in her might—growing and flourishing like a willow planted by the water courses. May God bless you, and cause his face to shine upon you, that his way may be known in the earth and his saving health among all nations.

And, now, brethren, we commend you to God and to the word of his grace, which is able to build you up and to give you an inheritance among all them that are sanctified, and may you be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation. Amen.

ADDRESS

Of the Seventeenth Annual Conference of the Canadian Wesleyan Methodist New Connexion Church, to the Methodist New Connexion Conference in England.

DEAR BRETHREN.—Christian love, awakened by real excellency, intimate relationship, and oneness of sentiment and feeling, is not of transitory endurance. From year to year it lasts and lives. Another twelve months have rolled away since our last Address to you, but to you and to all who love the Lord Jesus Christ, we feel ourselves to be bound by the same strong and indissoluble ties as ever.

We should rejoice in being united to the lovers of truth and freedom the world over. We feel thankful that we *are* united to *one* body of men of this description, and would pray that speedily we may fill the whole earth.

Turning our attention to the nearly insuperable difficulties with which you have had to contend—the depression of commerce—the unprincipled conduct of men of talent and influence, in connection with accumulated and oppressive debts; looking at your present standing, the efforts you have used, and are at present employing to promote the cause of Christ, our respect for you rises into strong admiration—we feel ourselves honoured in being identified with such a body, and would wish that its enterprising and unyielding spirit, like an angel of strength and vigour, could be sent on wings swifter than the wind, to animate and quicken us.

But at home we should be glad to hear of more abundant success—of more souls being converted to God, and the Church being extensively enlarged. Revivals in England would gladden and quicken us in Canada. Distance would not destroy our sympathy with your movements. Our hearts would be in your

revival meetings, and a flame enkindled would be carried by us to large and populous districts, as well as through swamps, beaver meadows, and nearly impassable roads, to the distant and destitute settlers of the woods.

For the liberal support you have rendered us, we tender you our grateful acknowledgments; and we are happy to state that our labours, (as you may discover from the Minutes,) have not been in vain. Good, extensive good, has been done. Hundreds of souls sunk in ignorance, degraded by sin, and the miserable slaves of their own corrupt habits, have been enlightened, raised to excellency, blessed with the peace of justification, and the happiness of a regenerated nature, and a reformed life.

But whilst much has been effected, much more remains to be done. And never did the Canadian Mission need more the prayers and sympathies and support of the English Conference than at present. Many are the calls we have in different directions to preach the Word of Life. And now, if ever, strenuous exertions should be used to take our stand in places where, as yet, we have no interest. These places many of them are new, yet they are rising into importance, and will soon be thickly populated towns and settlements. Chapels might be raised, and Societies gathered with little difficulty and little expense. In a few years all efforts in these places would probably be futile. If as a body then we are to be extensively useful in Canada in promoting the cause of religious liberty and holiness, we are called upon both in England and Canada to do what we can now. Now is the acceptable time—now is the day of salvation. We hope, therefore, that nothing except a want of means will ever induce you to lessen the allowance to this Mission. If anything is done, we hope the amount will be increased; for through a want of management in some of our Circuits, and through poverty, or a destitution of liberality on others, many of our Preachers do not receive above half their salary. Their houses many of them are most miserable places, their conveniences extremely few, and their

means of educating their children exceedingly limited, whilst their labours to promote the welfare of the Church are toilsome and arduous. Take into consideration the situation of our Preachers in this country—the prospects that stretch before us of future usefulness—the abundant harvest that is likely to be reaped from amply supported and persevering effort, and you will see that this field of Missionary enterprize, of all others, has the first, and the most urgent claim on your attention, prayers, and resources. “Brethren pray for us.”

Whilst we thank God for our prosperity in the salvation of souls, we rejoice that our principles of Church government are becoming more perfectly understood, and generally adopted. Despotism in all its forms, and amongst all bodies, civil or religious, meets with decided disapprobation, and freedom in Church government is warmly contended for, as the right of every follower of Christ.

We feel ourselves under obligations to the English Conference for the valuable and efficient assistance in men and means afforded us during the last year. The parties sent have been actively employed in the Missionary work, have been useful in the conversion of souls; and are well received by the people.

Your Superintendants, as in years past, have been engaged heart and soul in the work devolving upon them. The welfare of the Mission is near to their hearts, and few plans are unthought of by them that will render the employment of our resources and efforts the most beneficial.

When your resolution respecting Mr. Addyman's return to England, was read in Conference, a gloomy melancholy overspread every countenance—it was deeply felt by every individual; and sorry, exceedingly sorry, shall we be to part with our beloved Brother Addyman. Our prayers and our best wishes will follow him wherever he goes. He is endeared to every heart, and especially to the hearts of the Ministers. Gladly would we present him with some token of our affection, would means permit. But silver and gold we

Whilst we express our regret at Mr. Addyman's departure, at the same time we cannot but deeply sympathize with our dear Brother Crofts, who, in consequence of his having the whole Mission under his superintendence, and his being also deprived, as he must be in a great measure, of domestic comfort, will have to endure an amount of anxiety, labour, and responsibility, which we fear will be too much for him to bear. However, we are happy to say that he enjoys our confidence, and we will endeavour to support him by our prayers, and all other help we can render him.

Convinced of the necessity of persevering effort, we feel determined to devote ourselves with fresh energy, and stronger determinations to the cause of Christ, and the salvation of souls. We crave an interest in your earnest prayers, whilst we remain your fellow-labourers in the Vineyard of the Lord Jesus Christ.

REPORT

*Of the Canadian Wesleyan Methodist New Connexion
Missionary Society, Auxiliary to the Methodist New
Connexion Missionary Society in England.*

READ AT THE GENERAL MISSIONARY MEETING OF THE CONNEXION,
HELD AT THE CONFERENCE IN NORTH PORT, JUNE 13, 1845.

Your Committee, in presenting their second Report of the operations of the Canadian Methodist New Connexion Auxiliary Missionary Society, would congratulate the subscribers and friends on the success which has accompanied the labours of our agents during the past year. On several of the Stations we have been favoured with a very gracious outpouring of the Spirit, and hence numbers of people have been brought out of darkness into light, and have been added to the Church. On some of the Stations the ground occupied was so extensive, that it has been with difficulty that the Missionaries have supplied the different appointments to which they have been called to attend. Our Mission Stations are by far too extensive for the number of Missionaries employed, and we are continually presented with new openings.

Your Committee have to record, with sorrow, that one of the Missionaries left his Station, (on which there were two,) in the early part of the year, and the Mission having to be worked by only one agent, it of course suffered proportionably. Another of the Missionaries has come to the conclusion of locating for the present; and owing to the afflictions and wants of his family demanding so much of his attention, there has not been such prosperity on his Station as otherwise

your Committee would be authorised to expect. On the whole we have great reason to thank God, and take courage. There is yet very much land to be possessed. New settlements are springing up and enlarging on every hand, and most of the important cities and towns present ample fields for cultivation, which we are incapable of entering, not because the labourers at our command are few, but because our means are still too scanty to warrant our employing more. We are, notwithstanding, encouraged to hope, that from the increasing fervour of the Missionary Spirit which is amongst us, that the time is not far distant when we shall go through the length and breadth of the land, and take full possession. And whilst your Committee feel thankful for the means placed at their disposal during the past year, which has exceeded by £55 18 9½ those of the preceding, they would earnestly call, with the voices of souls sinking into hell, sounding in their ears, upon all of you who love the souls of men, and the interests of our Mission, to redouble your efforts, and come up to the help of the Lord—to the help of the Lord against the mighty.

The Report of the Parent Society, which has reached this country, breathes a spirit of hallowed affection for our land, and calls most pathetically and energetically on all the lovers of our Zion in England, to increase their efforts, that every moral waste and desert place may be made to bud and blossom as the rose. It sets forth largely, and at great length, the state of our various Mission Stations and Circuits; and presents the country generally as a proper field for Missionary exertions, and shows that from its peculiar features, as a vast territory, it has powerful and imperative claims upon British liberality and enterprize.

The Report refers to the visit of our dear Brother Jackson to England in the past year, stating that he visited almost every Circuit in the community—that the information he gave of the various operations in this country was attended with the most blessed results, afforded much satisfaction, and awakened increasing interest in the good cause. It refers with great satisfaction to the fact of Brother Jackson's appeal on behalf of Grantham Chapel being responded to by many of the friends, so that the incumbrances on the Chapel might be removed, and the Chapel secured to the Connexion.

The efforts of the Parent Society are still, according to the Report, directed towards Ireland, with all the vigour it can put forth, and with that wisdom which is evinced in all the operations of the Society.

The Report concludes with the following powerful and eloquent prayer—"Give ear, O Shepherd of Israel, thou that leadest Joseph like a flock, thou that dwellest between the Cherubims shine forth—before Ephraim, and Benjamin, and Manassah, stir up thy strength, and come and save us. God be merciful unto us, and bless us, and cause thy face to shine upon us. Let thy way be known upon the earth, thy saving health among all nations. Let the people praise thee, O God, let all the people praise thee. Then shall the earth yield her increase, and God, even our own God, shall bless us, and all the ends of the earth shall see his salvation. Even so, Lord Jesus, let thy Kingdom come—let thy will be done on earth, as it is done in heaven; for thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory. Amen and amen.
