MARITIME FORCE OF HOLLAND.—According to the authentic statement of the maritime commission of the Netherlands during the year 1836, 5,175 vessels sailed from the ports of the Netherlands; of these 4,822 were laden with merchandise, and their tonnage amounted to 621,839, 373 entered in ballast, and measured together 23,069 tons. The number of vessels which made entries of their departures was 5,245, measuring in the aggregate 67,261 tons; 3,414 were laden with cargoes to the amount of 449,271 tons, and 1,831, measuring together 327,430 tons, sailed in ballast.
