PAPAL AGGRESSIONS.—THE ESTABLISHED CHURCH OF ENGLAND.—At a recent meeting of the Established Church, Synod of London and Tweeddale, the venerable body took up an occasion, signed by the Rev. Dr. Muir, and several other members, directing attention to the recent appointments by the Pope, and requesting the Synod to consider the subject, with the view of adopting resolutions protesting against the aggression of Romish power.

Dr. Muir commented at considerable length on the present movement of the Pope, which he looked upon as the necessary consequence of what took place in the country about twenty years ago. He said that the Romish power had been introduced into this country, and that it was now a matter of time when it would be established in its full power. THE SYNOD OF THE ESTABLISHED CHURCH OF ENGLAND.—The Synod adopted the Resolutions, and appointed a committee to prepare the portions to Her Majesty and both Houses of Parliament. The Rev. Dr. Muir, in a letter to Cardinal Wiseman, said: "I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your recent publication 'The Canon Law is inapplicable under vicars apostolic.' On this ground you argue in favor of a hierarchy. It is precisely on this ground that we object to it. You surely would not have advanced such an argument had you not supposed that the Romish hierarchy is extremely ignorant of the canon law, or extremely obtuse to the inevitable consequences of its application. Under the canon law, Romish jurisdiction in things spiritual becomes an engine of coercion and oppression in temporal things. Temporal authority is subordinated and whenever the power can be acquired—that is, whenever the canon law can be made really applicable, the civil sword becomes the mental executive of the supreme decrees of the spiritual court. I do not say that the establishment of a Popish hierarchy in England would be a matter of expediency, but it would make it our duty to try to do so, in a sense and to an extent which has not hitherto been the case, because 'the canon law is inapplicable under vicars apostolic.' I trust the British public will imbibe a wholesome horror of the canon law; and communicate the same to the very sceptical shape to the British Parliament."

THE QUEEN ON THE LATE PAPAL AGGRESSIONS.—Nothing can be more satisfactory than the steady progress of the great Anti-Romish movement in England. So far from expending its strength in rant and uproar, and wailing like a burnt out conflagration, it every hour gains in volume, fervor, and expansion. But inappreciable as is the popular element in guiding the Protestantism of England, a piece of evidence was elicited on Monday evening, at the meeting of the inhabitants of St. Mary-le-Strand, respecting an influence which exerts an equally powerful, and at the same time a far more immediate pressure upon the conduct of the Government. We mean the indignant resolution of the Queen herself to resist the invasion of the Pope. The Rev. Dr. Jeff, who made the following disclosure, is principal of King's College, and from his respectable position and the Whig connections of the institution over which he presides, have certain to be well informed upon so serious a topic, even should a public statement at once so momentous and so sure of obtaining a publicity nearly universal. "Her Majesty (said the Rev. Doctor) had been first to denounce the invasion of the Pope upon her authority. (Hear.) When she heard of it she at once sent for Sir George Grey, the Home Secretary, who, on obeying her summons, found her Majesty walking up and down the drawing-room in a state of great excitement. "George Grey," said her Majesty, "I am Queen of England, and I will not bear this." We
