Eastern Baptist Association of Nova Scotia.

s ve bobleaus in ARTICLE 1st. This body shall be called the Eastern Baptist Association of Nova Scotia, and shall consist of Delegates representing the Churches of which it is composed, each of whom shall be a member of one those churches, together with Delegates from Corresponding Associations, not exceeding five from any one Association and such others as may, by the Association, be invited to sit in Council, none but delegates being entitled to vote, and such only as represent churches being elligible to office, or to vote for officers.

ART. 2nd .- Each church connected with the body may send five Delegates besides its Pastor.

Ant 3rd .- The object of this Association being the cultivation of Christian Union, the promotion of individual Godliness, and by mutual consultation, to seek, in the use of Scriptural measures, the extension of the Redeemer's Kingdom, it disclaims all authority over the churches, and shall in no case interfere with their internal concerns, or their entire scriptural independency. Yet it may dissolve its connection with any Church that, upon sufficient examination, shall be judged by the Association to have departed essentially from Scripture principles or Baptist faith and practices.

ART. 4th. This Association shall meet at such time and place as it may appoint, and the meetings shall be opened with devotional

ART. 5th. The Officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, who shall preside at all the meetings, nonmate all the Committees not otherwise provided for, and perform all the duties naturally connected with such office; a Clerk who shall keep a record of all the business transacted, prepare the Minutes for the press, and attend to their distribution; and a Tressurer, who shall receive all the moneys contributed for the nurposes of the Association, and dispose of them according to its direction, All the officers shall remain in office until their successors are chosen.

ART 6th.—The religious sentiments of this body are those expressed in the Articles of the Ratifi and Practice of the Baptist Churches in Nova Scotial

Ast, 7th.—The Association may receive any Church which, by lotter, shall apply for admission, and shall give satisfactory evidence of its faith and order, in agreement with the religious sentiments of this body; and each Church belonging to this body

shall send annually a letter, containing an account of its history for the year preceding, particularly of its additions and diminutions, with its number then in fellowship,—also, money to assist in publishing the Minutes. Any Church that for that three successive years omits sending any Letter, Delegates, or money, shall be considered withdrawn from the Association, and shall be discontinued from the Minutes unless sufficient reason may appear to account for the omission, or provided it may appear desirable make some inquiry, by committee or otherwise, and report at the next meeting of the Association.

ART, 8.—This Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members at any annual meeting of the Association.

RULE 1st.—At each annual meeting the Letters from the Churches shall be handed to the clerk, who shall retire and make out a list of the delegates—the Moderator meanwhile shall conduct devotional exercises.

2nd.—From the list so prepared the Moderator shall be chosen by ballot—no brother shall be chosen two years in succession.

3rd.—The first letter read shall be from the Church with which the Association is assembled.

4th.—No subject shall be discussed without a motion first made and seconded, and no person shall speak on any subject more than twice unless by consent of the Association.

5th.—When any Church is received, the Moderator shall gives to one of its delegates the right hand of fellowship.

6th.—At the commencement of each sitting the Minutes of the preceding one shall be read and approved and of the last before the final adjournment.

7th.—Motions made and lost shall not be recorded on the Minutes except so ordered by the Association.

8th,—All resolutions shall be presented in writing.

9th.—Each meeting for business shall be commenced and conclud-

10th.—The Committee of Arrangement shall, in addition to the povision for the "order of business," provide also for the discussion of the more prominent topics, Education and Missions, by appointing one or more persons to speak upon them. Said Committee shall further recommend the place for the succeeding Association, the preacher of the Associational Sermon, and the writer of the Circular Letter.

Circular Letter.

"GO FORWARD."

THE CIRCULAR LETTER OF THE N. S. EASTERN ASSOCIA-TION TO THE CHURCHES OF WHICH IT IS COMPOSED.

Dear Brethren .-

There was a time when our people might with propriety cry: "Doubtless thou art our Father, though Abraham be ignorant of us, and Israel acknowledge us not." Through the patient efforts and prevailing prayers of those who compose our churches, our progress has been great. To the student of our history a steady growth is visible. The Holy One has attested His truth, and baptized believers in these Provinces, are numbered by tens of thousands. Now, the Baptists are acknowledged and respected. If denominational position be anything, we have it. But suppose that we were first in numbers, influence, and wealth, that we were far ahead of all other bodies, we should not dream of standing The salvation of the world, not denominational distinction, must be our chief desire. No matter what our position, recognized, or unrecognized, loved, or feared, or hated, it is ours to "preach the gospel to every creature," to baptize those who believe it, and to teach "them to observe all things whatsoever." the Anointed One "has commanded." As heretofore, we must go on to fill the waste places, to preach the gospel to the poor, to set forth the distinctive doctrines of the New Testament. We hear a voice loud and clear, "SPEAK UNTO THE CHILDREN OF ISRAEL THAT THEY GO FORWARD."

But in order to do this, we must survey our position, and see what our agencies are. We must question ourselves as

to the means by which we are to flourish.

First, We must have more men. It is an alarming fact that many of our churches are destitute of pastors. Evangelists can scarcely be obtained. Students for the ministry are few,—not enough to supply the vacancies caused by death and removals. We should make this a matter of prayerful

consideration. Is there not a cause? Are not parents desirous of seeing their sons enter more lucrative callings? Are they not deterring their children from the ministry by their negative influence? One may not positively condemn a thing, but may manifest his indifference or distaste by not referring to it. A man may entertain great respect for those who give themselves to the ministry, yet may give his sons to understand that he does not wish to see them there, or he may speak of the ministry in such a way before his boys, that they will regard the preaching of the gospel as the most unenviable work in the world Or is it because of the low tone of spiritual life? Did we view this matter aright, we should vie with one another for the honor of having children wholly devoted to the service of Christ. Sacrifices undreamed of could be made by our families, in order, if necessary, to give one of its members a fitting education. Or are the pastors themselves to blame? Have they encouraged their young men to look forward to the ministry, and kept before their people the necessity of constant prayer that the supply of preachers may be kept up? From whatever cause, there is a paucity of workmen, and we ought at once to offer the supplication taught us by the Saviour, "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that He would send forth laborers into His harvest."

Second, We must raise more money. If any great enterprise is on foot, the tunnelling of the Alps, the building of a Pacific railroad, or the laying of a submarine cable, men of capital step up and say "Put our names down," for \$500, \$1,000, \$10,000 as the case may be. But when the grandest enterprise ever planned, with its dividends surer and larger than any other, asks for capital, we reply by putting cents into a collection-box! In our business arrangements we are explicit and particular. We know to a dollar how much we have made, how much we have lost, and how much goes into our business. But our religious affairs scarcely ever receive any serious attention. How few of our churchmembers know when their minister's salary becomes due! How many in all our wide membership pretends to have any system with regard to his religious business matters? From lack of a little planning, our souls are robbed of one of the greatest enjoyments, and God's kingdom deprived of its just revenues, while we never see the good of the money with-

th ful held. We have in this Eastern Association about 3,500 members. Suppose now, that for purely benevolent purposes, i. e., objects outside of our own congregations, Missions, College, &c., &c., one thousand members were to give twenty cents per week, that is \$200; one thousand to give the cents per week, that is \$100; one thousand to give five cents per week, that is \$50; five hundred to give two cents per week. that is \$10. Three hundred and sixty dollars [\$360], would thus be raised in a single week, making \$18,720 raised by the Association for benevolent purposes in a college year. This seemingly great sum is nothing more than we may fairly demand from ourselves, and would involve no sacrifice on our part. Our College, Missions, and other objects would thus be amply provided for.

Is this but a dream? and shall it remain a mere scheme on paper. Let every pastor urge upon his members the necessity of system in giving, and let heads of families try the experiment for the coming year. "The world lieth in the arms of the wicked one," and it is to be won to Christ, not only by our prayers and tears, but also by our dollars and cents. The world will yet be the Lord's; let not the glorious consummation be delayed by the lack of systematic energy on the part of the Lord's people. We will close this part of our subject by the pertinent inquiry, "How much

owest thou to my Lord?"

Third, We must have more individual effort. Ministers cannot do everything. If we are to advance,—nay, if we are to hold our own,—the young people must be trained to work. Let it be every where inculcated that every Baptist is expected to take a share in church labor. The great argument for the Resurrection is closed up by an exhortation to universal diligence: "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord."

Lastly, Let us have more holy living. The image of Jesus should be seen in his followers. If "Christ is in us the hope of glory," we should live differently from those who make no such profession. We are to "walk uprightly, and work righteousness," to "present our bodies a living sacrifice," to be "not conformed to this world," to "abhor that which is evil," to put away from us "all bitterness, and

wrath, and anger, and clamour, and evil speaking, and all malice," in short to be "followers of God, as dear children," and to " set our affections on things above." Ancient saints, we are informed, "confessed that they were strangers and pilgrims on the earth," and declared plainly that they were seeking a country." Such a declaration needs to be more manifest in this present time. There is evidently a strong regard for the ways of the world, and in some quarters a concession to its maxims which is not becoming. We are trying too much to be like other people instead of trying to be like christians. If we would recommend the simple Christianity of the New Testament, it must be our earnest endeavor to follow in all things the example of Jesus Christ. He is our pattern. He is our lawgiver. APPENDIX.

(A)

EDUCATION.

Your Committee desire that this Association should again place on its records a declaration of the great value of public education, and of the importance of properly guarding and preserving in its integrity the system of public instruction which has thus far proved to be so valuable and

effective for the general education of the young.

Our denominational Academy at Horton, under the successful direction of Rev. T. A. Higgins, continues to deserve the patronage of our people to a much larger extent. Pastors of churches, and laymen interested in education, should exert themselves to send there at least one representative for every church and congregation. The higher departments of our system of education cannot be properly supplied with students unless the Academy has a large number constantly in attendance.

The number of students in College for the past year has been forty-two. A large part of these are studying with the purpose of entering the ministry. We trust that the general management of the College is such as still to command the confidence and cordial support of the Denom-

ination.

At the last meeting of the Governors arrangements were made for a year of Theological study subsequent to the completion of the College course. This will give opportunity for much more extensive and thorough research than was possible on the previous plan. The Committee would also call special attention to the fact that the Faculty of the College invite young men, who propose to labor in the ministry, but, who, for any reason are not able to take the full course, to remain for any period that may be convenient and pursue such studies as they may choose. We cannot doubt that there are many who ought to avail themselves of this arrangement.

In conclusion, your Committee would urge on the attention of the churches the importance of making the annual contribution for the support of the College more general, as the work

is one in which all should share.

ON MISSIONS.

As the annual meeting of the Home Missionary Society is to be held during this session of the Association, the Committee do not think it necessary to enter into details respecting that department of Christian labour, and will only observe that there is increasing demand for missionaries in many parts of our province, while the funds supplied are by no means adequate to the necessities of the case. Baptists of Nova Soctia have for many years past directed their attention to the home field, with encouraging results. The calls for help are becoming louder and louder: let the

response be prompt, hearty, and liberal.

The Foreign Mission commands the sympathies of the Churches in every part of the land. God has greatly blessed the labours of the native preachers who have been engaged in the work, and whose instrumentality is doubtless admirably adapted to the state and circumstances of their fellowcountrymen. Indeed, it seems scarcely possible to evangelize Burmah, or any other heathen country, otherwise than by the employment of the gifts which the Lord bestows on the converts, all which are intended for use and profit. Your Committee were therefore surprised and distressed at the announcement which the Board felt it necessary to make, to the effect that ten of the preachers were to be dismissed. They cannot but indulge the assurance that the churches will forthwith so replenish the treasury that the entire staff of preachers may be re-engaged, and their number, if possible,

The Committee are deeply interested in the department

of Female Agency. It is clear that the women of Burmah can be much more effectually reached by missionaries of their own sex than in any other way. Miss DeWolfe will soon be capable of full action as a female missionary. Miss Norris, of Cape Canso, the Committee learn, is so impressed by a sense of duty to labor for the benefit of heathen women, that she is anxious to be sent out in the autumn of this year, if funds can be raised. Her qualifications for the work are admitted by all who know her. It is unquestionably desirable that she should be enabled to accomplish the purpose The Committee recommend that she be enof her heart. couraged and sanctioned in her endeavors to excite the sympathy and active benevolence of the Baptist females of these provinces. By the formation of Female Missionary Aid Societies, as has been recently proposed, sufficient funds may be collected to warrant the appointment of Miss Norris, and her departure for the field of labour ere the close of the present year. The Committee trust that the Foreign Missionary Board will take this matter into serious consideration, and that by their recommendation the action of the Convention will be prompt and decisive.

If Popery were Christianity, as represented and taught in the New Testament, there would be no need of our French Mission. But believing that it is the Apostacy, the departure from the faith which the Apostle Paul foretold, and which is tremendously injurious to the souls of men, and even to their temporal interests, the Committee hold that it is the bounden duty of the Christians of Nova Scotia to do all in their power to lessen its influence, and thus deliver their fellow-countrymen from "the snare of the devil." The success which has already attended the labours of the French Missionary demands our thankful acknowledgements to Almighty God, by whose blessing on the "manifestation of the truth" souls have been enlightened, converted, and

saved.

The Committee commend Brother Normonday's fervent appeal to the Churches, by the authority of the French Mission Board, to the benevolent regards of the brethren resident within the limits of this Association.

EXTRACTS FROM THE LETTERS TO THE EAS-TERN ASSOCIATION.

Advocate Harbor. Pastor, D. McKeen. The attendance at meeting is large and solemn, but our members live so far apart that it is hard to keep the church in working order. Still our prayer is that God will revive His work and add to Zion such as shall be saved.

Amherst. Pastor, D. A. Steele. Our stated meetings have been regularly kept up, and largely attended during the year. There are three outstations in connection with the church, which enjoy the labors of our pastor alternately, and a large and prosperous Sabbath School.

Antigonishe. It has pleased the great head of the church to come graciously near us with his reviving influences, and stir up his children to more earnest prayer and labor, which have been blest to the salvation of souls. As a result 24 have been added to our membership. Our Conference and prayer meetings are well sustained, also a young people's prayer meeting, which is intensely interesting.

Brookfield. We are without a pastor at present. We keep up our prayer meetings as usual, 2 prayer meetings and 2 Sabbath Schools each week.

Cape Canso. Pastor, A. W. Barss. The labors of our pastor have been greatly blessed. We have rejoiced in the accession to our membership of twenty-four by baptism, while many others have been quickened to renewed diligence in the Master's service.

The drooping spirits of church members have been revived, and the prayer and Conference meetings which have been sadly neglected, will, we hope, be renewed with fresh vigor. THIRTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Board of Managers of the N. S. Baptist Home Missionary Society, beg to present the Thirteenth Annual Statement of Mission work in the Home Field.

During the year twelve missionaries have been laboring under the direction of the Board, in the Eastern and Central portions of the Province. Two of whom have been engaged during the entire year, five about one-fourth of the year, and eight for shorter periods of time.

The whole number of weeks service (214) is equivalent

to rather more than four missionaries for the year.

The returns sent in shew an increase in Family Visitation, but it is to be regretted that the Prayer and Conference meetings had not received the attention which their importance demands. The Board regard organizing and sustaining meetings for social worship as a very essential part of the

A marked improvement is observed in Tract distribution, about one hundred per cent over last year.

There have been added by Baptism 81, being an increase of forty over the past year.

Truly " the Lord has made bare His arm " and abundantly blessed the labors of his servants, in the mission field, particularly on the Island of Cape Breton.

It is encouraging also to notice that three Churches, three Sabbath Schools, and two Bible Classes, have been organized by your missionaries. A number of the conversions reported have been among the young people in the Sabbath School.

The Treasurer's report shews a decrease in receipts as compared with the preceeding year of one hundred dollars, while there has been an increase in collections by the missionaries of one hundred and fifty-six dollars. The total amount received from all sources being thirteen hundred dollars, which is less than seven cents for each member of the several churches, in the Central and Eastern Associations, comprising a membership of about nine thousand.

The Board feel compelled again to urge the claims of this Society upon every member of the respective churches under whose direction they have been endeavouring to send the

Word of Life to the destitute in this Province. Instead of having but two labours permanently in the field, there should be at least three times that number.

The Board have been recently compelled to decline several applications received from those who desire, and should have, the Word of Life sent to them, and at other times they have granted missious for a few weeks only, when, unquestionably more extended labor was needed, and would have been given if the state of the funds had warranted such action.

One of the Missionaries in writing to the Board of those among whom he labored says, "the triends here are willing to do their part financially." Another says "our churches would be more efficient and vigorous if they had more of a missionary spirit." Another represents his field as "demand-

ing the constant labors of a missionary."

The question arises, how is the principle of Christian liberality to be worked in our various churches and congregations? In what way are our people to be stirred up to a sense of the duty which they owe to God? The various schemes which have been tried, seem all to have failed in producing such results as have been looked for, and ought reasonably to be expected. Are our ministers doing their duty in teaching and enforcing what Scripture says on this topic? If they neglect this part they cannot say they have declared the whole counsel of God. Men must be taught the scriptural principle of giving; to give, not merely because they are asked, but because God requires it at their hands. on the same ground as he requires worship and a holy life. It is a privilege to give, as much as it is a privilege to receive temporal and spiritual benefits. To talk about religion and not give of our substance, as we can afford, to its cause, is as unscriptural as it is unproductive of any result. Christianity is as far removed from selfishness on the one hand, as it is from a false sentiment of charity on the other.

Of course on this subject no definite rule can he laid down, different circumstances call for different methods. The great object to be aimed at is, that every man, woman and child should feel his or her individual obligation; that the amount given is nothing, the question being, am I giving in proportion to my income. And in this respect the poor man is not to be ashamed of his poverty, for his five cents or even

less, counts as much in heaven's ledger as the hundred or thousand dollars of him that hardly misses that amount. this principle were acted on, there would be much more done for Christ, and above all there would be a far deeper intensity of spiritual life in the hearts of the members of our

Our charity should not depend upon the impulse of the moment. We believe that it should receive a thoughtful and prayerful review of the whole field, and of our individual ability to supply its wants, and not be dependant upon the fancied abundance or poverty of the hour, or be wrung from us to supply a treasury about exhausted. Every christian ought systematically to arrange for the demands which our Lord presents, and expects to have honored.

There are but few duties we feel assured, which are more neglected than this, and none which would bring a greater

blessing, if faithfully put into practice.

The Board have observed with more than ordinary interest, the readiness with which the response has been given to appeals for aid to sustain native teachers in the Foreign field, and would claim for our missionary operations at home, an equal amount of consideration and individual effort. many of our brethren are ready to say, I will undertake, either wholly or in part, to supply the funds required to sustain a missionary for one year in the destitute parts of

Who can estimate the amount of good which would be accomplished, or the joy that would follow a decision arrived at, in answer to this question, made in the fear of God and with a full realization of the fact that "the silver and the gold are the Lord's." "The cattle upon a thousand hills are His also." "All that we have and are belong to God."

CONDENSED STATEMENT OF MISSIONARY LABOR PERFORMED DURING THE YEAR.

Halifax and Hants Counties.

Rev. John Miller received an appointment of 13 weeks at Sackville and vicinity.

Preached 26 sermons, attended 2 Conference Meetings, made 78 family visits, Collected \$52. One half of the expenses of this mission were paid by those among whom Bro. Miller labored.

Bro. John Crawley was appointed on a mission of 4 weeks among the coloured people of the County of Halifax, which extended over a period of six months.

Preached 10 sermons, visited 60 familes, travelled 280 miles.
Collected \$8.80.

Rev. Alfred Chipman having been appointed on a mission of 6 months at Renfrew and Musquodoboit in November 1868, twenty-one weeks of which were reported as having been performed last year. The remaining four weeks were completed as follows:

Extracts from Bro. C's letter dated 7 Sept. 1869.

"Renfrew, like most other gold digging places, must ever be regarded as a field for temporary or present labor, and only partial immediate results. The residents change almost daily, and the whole population is liable at any time, through apparent or real failure of the gold, to disappear by emigration. In this place I enjoyed visiting from house to house, during such visits I found a few seriously although secretly enquiring the way of salvation."

As a result of my experience and observation at Renfrew, I cannot well forbear expressing the belief that so far as the funds of our Board and a proportionate regard to the wants of other places admit. it is very desirable to send Missionaries to our Gold Diggings.

The population of such places consists largely of young men and women, in itself a sufficient necessity and inducement. But additional motive is afforded in the fearful fact that the avenues to iniquity and moral ruin are many, broad, and sloping. If also, as in the case of this appointment to Renfrew, feeble churches in adjacent places can thus be aided towards securing a pastor, assuredly such expenditure of the funds of the Board is wise.

In respect to Musquodoboit, the congregations, and other prospects for Baptist labor in that field were never so good as at the present time. This is the impression on more minds than one. Some of them are laboring actively in the cause of Education, Temperance, and Sabbath Schools. But best of all encouragements in that field, is the fact that there are a few praying and anxiously enquiring souls. Tenderness during our Sabbath services has not been an uncommon thing for sometime past.

Lunenburg County.

Brother Atwood Cohoon performed a mission of six weeks at Lahave under the direction of Revds. S. March and W. E. Hall. burn

Preached 16 sermons, attended 7 conference and prayer meetings, made 63 family visits, and 23 to other persons, travelled 85 miles, distributed 1797 pages of tracts, organized a Sabbath School and Bible Class. Collected \$7.52.

Bro. Cohoon reports the church in this place in a very dark state. They had not enjoyed the ministrations of the word of God for nearly two years. The prayer meetings and Sabbath School had ceased to exist, and there had been but one Conference meeting held during this time.

A few were still trying to hold on their way heavenward, and seemed glad when they learned that I had come to labor among them: Though the Baptists are few in number, yet the meetings were well attended, and the people seemed eager to hear the truth. A Sabbath School was set in operation. I had also a Bible Class of about twenty every Saturday evening during my stay with them. I am happy to state that the brethren have resolved to make an effort to secure the services of Rev. S. Marchone quarter of his time. I am encouraged to hope that the night of trial has passed, and that they may soon enjoy the sunshine of God's presence.

Bio. Geo. N. Ballentine labored 6 weeks on Tancook Island, under the direction of Rev. I. J. Skinner.

Preached 9 sermons, attended 21 Conference and prayer meetings, made 76 family visits, and 7 other persons travelled 101 miles, distributed 4884 pages of tracts. Collected \$42.941.

Bro. Ballentine says: "I found the church in a cold and barren state. They are the most of the time destitute of the ministrations of God's word. They need and should have a permanent pastor. I enjoyed my stay among them very much. They are a warm hearted people, glad to receive the truth, and willing to do their part financially.

When I left the Island, the Sabbath School which I organized was quite flourishing, averaging about sixty (60) pupils for the summer. They gave me the money, and I procured for the Sabbath School a library containing 140 volumes."

Bro. Rufus Sanford spent 6 weeks in the service of the Board at New Ross and Waterville.

Preached 22 sermons, attended 4 Conference and prayer meetings, made 100 family visits, travelled 204 miles, distributed 1155 pages of tracts. 2 persons baptized, (by Rev. James Parker), collected \$14.48, visited Sabbath Schools 6 times, one Sabbath School organized.

Bro. Sanford wrote to the Board as follows:—"In performing the mission assigned me I first visited New Ross. Here I was received with every token of kindness. My message also was well accepted, and I trust had its desired effect in the hearts of some. Meetings were well attended. An increase of interest was manifest from the first.

The church at New Ross has been destitute of ministerial labor for some time past. Conferences have not been regulaely kept up. I found a Sabbath School in operation. We also had the pleasure of organizing a new School in another section, and ordered for each books and papers calculated to promote general interest.

Colchester County.

Bro. H. E. Morrow, by appointment, spent 6 weeks at New Annan, Westchester Lake, and Folly Lake, and reports as follows:—"At the two last mentioned places quite an interest has been awakened. The congregations have been large and attentive, and I have reason to believe some good has been done to the souls of the hearers.

At Westchester Lake the church has been reorganized, and they are making an effort to obtain the services of a pastor for a portion of the time.

At Folly Lake I enjoyed a pleasant, and I trust a profitable visit.

There have been a few Baptists in that locality for a number of years. but have never had any preaching till this spring. The railroad passes through it, and it seems destined to be a very important

Preached 14 sermons, reorganized one church, attended 5 Conference and prayer meetings, made 40 family visits, travelled 190 miles distributed 1000 pages of tracts. Collected \$8.84.

Guysborough County.

Bro. W F. Armstroug performed a mission of 6 weeks in destitute parts of this County.

The following extracts are taken from Bro. A.'s report:—"Two weeks were spent at New Harbour where there is a small church. I was not without encouragement in my work here. I had not the pleasure of seeing any come out and take a decided stand for God, yet I believe that several were awakened to an interest in the 'one thing needful."

At Coddle's Harbour I tarried a few days, preaching publicly and from house to house. Here there is a feeble church. The people are poor and therefore unable to give much towards the support of the m ssion, but seemed thankful to the Board for remembering them

One week was spent at Sand Point, where a small church was organized a few years ago. Here is a large field for Missionary labor. Before I left this place I had the pleasure of seeing God's arm made bare in the salvation of singers.

The remaining time was spent at Guysborough and surroundings, and Crow Harbour. Great destitution prevails all along these shores. Oh, may our highly favored churches hear their cry 'Come over and

The last week of the mission granted me I spent at Sand Point, Strait of Canso. The Lord blessed the truth spoken in much weakness—backsliders returned, and sinners were converted. I felt that I must remain for a little while longer. I accordingly spent four weeks here after my mission had expired. The meetings increased in attendance and interest nightly. The whole community seemed to be interested. Bro. Philp came from Guysborough and baptized five rejoicing converts. Others whose wish it was to come forward were prevented from various causes. Many were anxiously enquiring the way to Zion, among whom were several Roman Catholics who attended our meetings in the face of opposition.

Preached 16 sermons, attended 16 Conference and prayer meetings, made 125 family visits, travelled 790 miles, distributed 1000 pages of tracts. The ordinance of baptism was administered to 5 persons. Collected \$22.41

Rev. A. W. Barss performed a mission of 5 weeks to Guysborough County, and writes as follows:—"The church that once existed at Crow Harbour is very much scattered, and the state of vital religion is extremely low. In Coal Harbour there never was any Baptist preaching before my visit there. The people received me very

kindly, and some appeared to be laboring under conviction of sin. There were no cases of conversion brought to my knowledge, but I trust that some fruit will yet appear.

Preached 20 sermons, made 9 family visits, and distributed 170

pages of tracts. Collected \$8.04.

Rev. R. R. Philp spent 13 weeks in the service of the Board in the above County.

Bro. Philp says:—"Your appointment enabled me not only to continue my pastoral relations to the Guysborough Church, but also to visit monthly the church at Antigonishe, which resulted in a very precious season of revival in that place. The whole of Guysborough County may be considered as missionary ground. There is a great deal of spiritual destitution. They need help and ought to be assisted, and there is not the least doubt our churches would be far more vigorous and efficient if they cultivated more of a missionary spirit. "How shall they hear without a preacher?" "And how shall they preach except they be sent?"

I visited Red Head and Sand Pant, where I had the pleasure of hostiging for constants.

I visited Red Head and Sand Point, where I had the pleasure of baptizing five young persons, the result of Bro. W. F. Armstrong's labors while performing his mission in that place. I held some very interesting services at New Harbour. The church there was very grateful to the Board for remembering them. I also visited Isaac's Harbour and Tracadie. One young man at Tracadie on my first visit professed to have been awakened under my ministry, and a few weeks after, with some others, was baptized by Rev. M. A. Bigelow.

Preached 46 sermons, attended 10 Conference and prayer meetings, made 50 family visits, travelled 320 miles. Collected \$20.96.

Rev. W. B. Boggs laboured in the service of the Board 13 weeks at destitute places in Cape Breton County. Preached in the following places, Little Glace Bay, Caledonia Mines, Grand Mira, Hillville, Point Edward and Boularderie.

Bro. Boggs reports "several of the above mentioned places are interesting fields for christian labor, especially Glace Bay. This place has not hitherto received the attention due to it, for it is an important field, and one that ought to be constantly occupied. Fruit has been gathered which has cheered my heart exceedingly, and I believe that the principles and doctrines of God's word (unobscured by tradition), have taken deep root, and will be manifest more and more in days to come. I think a church will shortly be organized here. The erection of a meeting house as soon as practicable is contemplated.

In other localities visited by me, good attention has been given to the word. Seed has been sown by preaching, family visiting and tract distribution, which I trust will bring forth an abundant harvest in the future. Preached 37 sermons, attended 6 Conference and prayer meetings, made 79 family visits, travelled 734 miles, distrib-

uted 1000 pages of tracts, baptisms 2. Collected \$37.00

Bro. J. B. McQuillan spent 10 weeks in the service of the Board at Cow Bay Mines during the temporary absence from that field of Rev. E. C. Spinney.

Bro. McQuillan says:-"I preached as far as I was able Christ and Him crucified as the only hope of the guilty sinner. Many were interested, some expressed a desire to seek Christ, yet I am not privileged to report any cases of conversions during my mission. At Gowrie Mines I was much encouraged by large and attentive congregations. I feel that God has great things in store for this place. Prejudice has in many instances given way to esteem. Bro. Spinney's labors in this field have been peculiarly blessed. I hope he may soon be enabled to return to it.

Rev. Mr. McPhee received an appointment of 8 weeks at West Bay and Port Hood, in the Spring of 1869, subsequently the Board secured his services for twelve months in the above places, and at

The following extracts from the Missionary reports shew that the Lord has abundantly blessed the labours of his servant, particularly in West Bay.

September 24th, 1869.—"The Lord is doing great things for us in this place (West Bay) for which we are glad. Twenty-four have been baptized, and still they are coming. I expect to baptize next Lord's day. Last Saturday and Lord's day were days'never to be for gotten with us at West Bay. Brethren Kempton and Porter were here, and several of the brethren and sisters from the Strait of Canso church. We met on Saturday afternoon in Conference, and on the Sabbath the church was organized, after which the Lord's Supper

Oh how good the Lord is, what darkness covered this Bay when I came hither in April, and now what a change. Blessed be the name

of the Lord. What a power there is in the Gospel.

January 4th, 1870.—" The revival at West Bay from the first was characterized by a deep anxiety to know the mind of the Lord in his Holy Word. The result is, many have been baptized and the work goes on. West Bay with its surroundings is to be a great field. The Baptists have fairly taken possession.

I made a tour last week to Big Brook, between River Inhabitants I made a tour last week to Big Brook, between River Inhabitants and River St. Dennis. It was my first visit. There is no doubt but the Lord has a work for us to do in that place. Big Brook will be a key to River Inhabitants and St. Dennis. The Lord is doing woundrous things in our day. The whole of the Island is more hopeful than I ever saw it."

March 7th.—"I left West Bay in January, have labored since at St. Ann's and Baddeck River. I met with great encouragement in these places, as at this time the Holy Spirit is evidently working among the people. Baptist (or rather Biblical), principles, are fast

among the people. Baptist (or rather Biblical), principles, are fast

gaining ground here. Men must be born again, though convinced that our doctrines are scriptural, they will remain our enemies, because they are enemies to God until this change takes place. Hence they must hear the declaration of Christ, "Ye must be born again." Blessed be the Lord, the conviction of the necessity of the new birth is growing more general. Truth is working its way in spite of the enmity of the human heart

No. of weeks services performed, 47, sermons preached 197, prayer and conference meetings held 46, family visits 379, baptized 36. organized 1 church, travelled 2850 miles. Collected 355 62.

Rev. Joseph F. Kempton has been retained in the service of the Board for another year in connection with the churches at Margaree and Mabou.

The closing account of last years labor did not come to hand in time to be included in the statement presented at the last Annual Meeting, hence it was included in this report.

The following particulars are gleaned from letters received.

June 22nd, 1869.— The church in Mabou has been doubled in number during the past year, I have spent about one quarter of the time with them, and they have contributed nearly missionary pay for what time I have spent there. A Bible class has been started among them, taught by one who was converted there last spring. are quite a number of hopeful cases on this field. Some are anxious to know the Lord, others who I think have already believed, but are not decided as to their own condition and duty.

I have baptized in all, during the year 14, four of these were included in last years statistics. Three of these were in Mira, four in

Margaree, and eight in Mabou.

December 31st.—"I have had the privilege of immersing five per sons during this quarter. Others have been enabled to trust in Christ, and I hope soon to be called upon to lead them and more beside into the baptismal waters. I know of several whom I believe are being "led by the Spirit of God."

My soul has been more than ordinarily exercised of late in reference to the cause, both in Margaree and Mabou, and I think the state of things is more promising just now in both of these places than usual. The Quarterly meeting took place in Mabou two weeks ago. Brethren Porter, Boggs and McQuillan were there, besides several lay brethren from Magaree church. It was a solemn, and I believe a profitable season. The congregations were unusually large and I hope fruits may soon appear."

March 31st, 1870.—" Two have been immersed during this quarter, one in Magaree, and one in Mabou. Besides this, others have been hopefully converted to God. I expect to baptize next Lord's day. The most of these are persons in connection with the Sabbath School. God is blessing the efforts made by the Sabbath School for the conversion of souls. Some of those converted do not belong to Baptist families; but still they possess Baptist sentiments, and have already expressed a desire to be immersed and unite with the church,

Week services 52, sermons preached 113, Prayer and Conference meetings attended 130, family visits 210, baptized 24, miles travelled 2928. Collected \$237.541.

Rev. E. C. Spinney has continued his labors at Cow Bay Mines and vicinity, under the direction of the Board, since last Annual report was presented, with the exception of about four months absence, when he was soliciting aid towards completion of the meeting house at the Mines.

On the 22nd February Bro. Spinney addressed the Board as follows:

"I arrived here in December last, and since that my time has been devoted to my Master's cause. During my absence, difficulties crept into the church which seemed for a time almost insurmountable. We have reason however to ascribe great power to the Grace of God which wins the attention and melts the heart when argument utterly fails Old grievances have been healed and our brethren are now working harmoniously, advancing in one line against the foe. There are several of the young of both sexes deeply concerned about the welfare of their souls. Some have professed conversion whom we trust will soon make public their faith in Christ. We need more of the manifest presence of Jesus. Our Sabbath Schools, Prayer and Conference meetings are well sustained.

At Cow Bay Mines our distinctive principles are rapidly gaining ground. There has been a great revolution of mind within the last twelve months. Our meetings there are especially well attended. We have moved from the hall formerly occupied by us, into our new place of worship, and are therefore more comfortably situated.

We have abundant reason to thank the Father of all mercies for continued support from Bro. D. R. De Wolf of New York.,

March 28th .- " Since my last report to you at Cow Bay Mines, a Baptist Church has been organized, and a Sabbath school gathered. The former having a membership of 16, and the latter 40. In both cases the prospects of increase are encouraging.

April 26th.—"The good work of the Lord has been prospering amongst us. God has been pleased to bless the means used in the conversion of many souls, and still we are encouraged to labor on.

Eleven have been added to the recently organized church at Cow

Bay. By baptism 8, letter 1, experience 2.
Our special services are well attended. This seems to be a ses time to favor Zion. Our Sabbath School, like the meetings, is

gradually increasing in numbers and interest.

Weeks service 23, sermons preached 67, Prayer and Conference Meetings attended 119, family visits 469, travelled 600 miles, distributed 1000 pages of tracts, baptized 12. 1 Church and 1 Sabbath uted 1000 pages of tracts, baptized 12. 1 Cauren and School organized.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

N. S. BAPTIST HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

I. This Society shall be called "The Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Society."

II. The object of this Society shall be the preaching of the Gospel throughout Nova Scotia, and Newfoundland, the assistance of feeble Churches, and the planting of new ones.

III. Any person may become a member of this Society by contributing five shillings and upwards annually, to its funds. Any person contributing five pounds at one time shall be a Life Member. Any person contributing twenty pounds at one time, or whose contributions shall amount to that sum, shall be a Life Director. Every shall be entitled to be represented by one Delegate for every five pounds so contributed; and every Baptist Church contributing annually to the funds of the Society, shall have the privilege of sending a delegate. Should the funds so contributed exceed five pounds, such church shall be entitled to send one delegate for every five pounds contributed,—Provided: That no Association, Auxiliay, or Church, shall be entitled to send more than five Delegates at one time.

IV. The officers of this Society shall be a President, Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, and Auditor, who shall be annually appointed by the Society from among its members.

V. The Society shall annually appoint a Board of Management, consisting of twenty-four members, members of Baptist Churches, seven of whom shall reside in the place designated, from year to year, as the location of the Board, or in its neighborhood, and five shall constitute a quorum. The officers above named shall be exofficio members of the Board. The following shall be the duties of the Board, viz.—To meet from time to time for the despatch of business, due notice of such meeting being given; to appoint Missionaries, and assign their respective spheres of labor; to expend the funds for the objects of the Society, provided that all amounts contributed for any specific purpose shall be faithfully applied, as far as possible in accordance with the wishes of the donors; to employ agents for the collection of funds, and for the general advancement of the interests of the Society; and to furnish a report of the proceedings of the past-year at the Annual meeting.

VI. Every Auxiliary Society which shall agree to commit all its funds to the direction of this Society, shall be entitled to receive

Missionary labor in such field as it may designate, to an amount at least equal to its contribution; provided that such designation be intimated at the time of payment.

VII. The members of Auxiliary Societies shall be members of this Society. Life Directors shall be entitled to attend and vote at meetings of the Board.

VIII. The Annual meeting of the Society shall be held at such time and place as shall be determined upon at a previous Annual meeting. At that meeting, the officers of the Society for the ensuing year shall be appointed, and such other business transacted as the members then present deem expedient.

IX. No alteration of this Constitution shall be made without an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members present at an Annual meeting.

BYE LAWS

OF THE

NOVA SCOTIA BAPTIST HOME MISSION BOARD.

ARTICLE 1.—This Board shall meet for the dispatch of business at 4 o'clock, P. M., on the 1st Wednesday of each month,—Also at such other times as dely called by the Chairman, or Secretary, or two other members of the Board.

ARTICLE 2.—Each meeting of the Board shall be opened and closed with prayer, and the minutes of preceding meetings read and approved.

ARTICLE 3.—None but Licentiates from regular Baptist Churches and ordained Ministers, recognized as such by a regular Baptist Association, shall be employed as Missionaries for the Society.

ARTICLE 4.—No Missionary shall be at liberty to change his field of labor or to extend the time of his service beyond appointment without consent of the Board.

ARTICLE 5.—The compensation allowed, generally, for married, and ordained Missionaries shall be eight dollars per week, for married licentiates and unmarried ordained Missionaries seven dollars, for unmarried licentiates six dollars, in each case exclusive of travelling expenses.

ARTICLE 6.—All Missionaries or pastors, serving under the Board are empowered and expected to make all reasonable effort during the time, and in the localities of such service, to collect funds in aid of the Treasury, to be transmitted forthwith to the same, or reported to the Board, credited towards labor performed.

ARTICLE 7.—On the expiration of Missions, reports shall be promptly made to the Board, by Missionaries, stating definitely, the number of weeks' service, number of sermons preached, visits made, miles travelled, pages of tracts distributed, baptisms performed Sabbath Schools visited, other meetings attended, Churches, Sabbath Schools, Temperance Societies and prayer meetings organized; moneys and other contributions, with the names of the donors; and such other facts connected with their labors likely to be of general interest.

ARTICLE 8 .- No moneys shall be paid by the Treasurer, except

on an order signed by the Chairman and Secretary.

ARTICLE 9.—The Chairman and Secretary shall sign no orders for moneys from the Treasury unless for accounts checked by the Auditors.

ARTICLE 10 .- No accounts shall be audited until ordered by the

ARTICLE 11 .- The Board shall not accept and submit accounts to the Auditors, unless presenting full particulars of debits and

credits, &c., as specified in Article 7.

Article 12.—The Secretary of this Board, with the consent of the Editor of the Christian Messenger, shall furnish, monthly, for publication in that paper, the following items, viz:—Letters received [during the month], appointments made, amount of funds in the Treasury, amounts due Missionaries, the names of Missionaries and their fields of labor, members of the Beard present at least meeting. their fields of labor, members of the Board present at last meeting, and such other particulars as may be ordered by the Board.
