## Like a Mighty Tidal Wave German Invasion of Russian Soil Rolls On

## TEUTONS AND **ALLIES READY**

Both Sides Have Made Ex tensive Preparations Systematically.

**GERMANS WILL USE** MANY SHOCK TROOPS

United States Secretary of War Gives Outline of Situation.

**ENTENTE ALLIES ARE** SUPREMELY CONFIDENT

Bulk of Germany's Forces Are Now Assembled in the West.

Washington. Feb. 21.—Secretary Baker, in his weekly communique issued, regards the impending German offensive on the western battle line with confidence.

Both the Allies and the Germans, he says, after extensive preparations silently and systematically carried on, are ready for battle.

By massed attacks of shock troops, specially drilled and manouvered for weeks for the onslaught, Secretary Baker says, in agreement with expert military opinion, the German general staff hopes to smash through.

But the secretary of war points out that the German high command must realize that it will encounter far more difficult tactical obstacles than any other attacking army has hithered encountered. Apparently the secretary, with much information at his command which cannot be given to the public, shares the opinion of the Allied experts that the line will withstand any German shock against it.

"While there have been no outward change in the situation in the west during the period under review," says the communique, "yet it is apparent that both the enemy and the allies, after extensive preparations which have been silently and systematically earried on, are ready for battle. At three o'clock in the morn ing Beauchemin got up to kindle the fire in the stove. He returned to bed, and about an returned to bed, and about an hour later was awakened by the smell of smoke and the crackling of flames. He gave the alarm and tried to get his family safely out of the house, but the fire spread so rapidly that six out of the eleven children were caught before they could escape. The little victims of the disaster range in age from three years to thirteen. They are: Alphonse, aged thirteen years; Alma, ten years; Justine, nine years; Alfred, seven years; Paul, five years; Eugene, three years.

## CAN MILITARISM OF PRUSSIA WIN IN WORLD WAR?

Viscount Milner of War Cabinet Declares in Plymouth Address That It is No Longer Question of Destroying Prussian Militarism, But Whether Prussian Militarism Will Destroy the Allies and Dominate Europe and Part of Asia.

Lord Milner Has No Fear of Revolution in England and He Predicts That National Unity and the Co-operation of All the Free Nations of the World Will Assuredly Bring About an Enduring Peace.

London, Feb. 21-Viscount Milner, member of the war cabi net, speaking at Plymouth today, deprecated too much talk about

'Until peace negotiations are reached," he said, "we are fighting for our lives and the very existence of the free nations of western Europe. As a result of the collapse of Russia, the milit party of Germany is again firmly in the saddle. Doubtless mu of the people of Germany loathe the continuance of bloodshed aggression, but at present they are quite powerless."

Lord Milner contended that it was no longer a question of de

stroying Prussian militarism, but whether Prussian militarism would destroy the Allies and dominate Europe and part of Asia.

President Wilson and Premier Lloyd George have made it perfectly clear," he continued, "that we have no desire to dismen ber Germany, dictate her constitution, or exclude her from a fair share of the world's intercourse. There can be but one answer to Germany's challenge, and that answer may involve greater sacrifice and endurance than heretofore

Lord Milner then referred to the Versailles war council, which brought much nearer to real co-ordination the effort of the Allies and to concrete realization that the great conception of a single allied front. He had no fear of a revolution in England and he said. national unity and the co-operation of all the free nations of the world would assuredly bring an enduring peace.

## ARMY OF GERMANY **MOVING IN FORM** OF BIG CRESCENT

Teuton Invasion of Russia Rolls on Like Great Tidal Wave—From Leal, in Esthonia, on Gulf of Finland, to Rovno on the North, Germans Are Still Advancing, Occupying Cities, Towns and Villages and Capturing an Enormous Amount of War Material and Supplies.

Great City of Minsk Occupied by Advancing Horde and It is Probable There Will Be No Halting of Hun Forces Until Bolsheviki Surrender -French Win Important Victory in Lorraine British Marching on City of Jericho in Palestine.

Like a great tidal wave, the German invasion of Russia rolls forward. From Leal, in Esthonia, the Russian province on the south shore of the Gulf of Finland, on the north to Rovno, one of the famous triangles of fortresses, which stood as a Muscovite bul-wark in the early days of the war on the south, the Germans are still advancing.

The advance of the Teutons has taken the form of a crescent with its convex face toward the heart of Russia. Minsk, which was occupied yesterday by German troops, according to an official report from Berlin is at the extreme eastern curve of the wave.

The formal message of surrender sent to the German high command in Russia, after Berlin had refused to accept a capitulation by wireless, has not as yet been received, and it is probable that there will be no halting of the German invasion until Russia's abject acceptance of peace terms is in the hands of the German general staff-possibly not then.

From the official reports emanating from Berlin, it would seem that the Russians were not destitute of supplies with which to continue the war. Despatches received on Thursday were to the effect that the booty captured at Rovno is enormous. Among the items enumerated were 1,353 guns, 120 machine guns, 4,000 to 5,000 motor cars, and trains with about 1,000 carriages, many of which were laden with grain; airplanes and war material of an amount said to be "incalculable."

Regarding provisions, the resolution reads: "That on and after February 23, contracts for the purchase or sale of mess pork to be delivered in store during the menths of May and July shall not exceed the price of \$50.55 a barrel.

Contracts for the sale of lard to be delivered in store during May and

delivered in store during May and July shall not exceed the price of \$26.97 % for May and \$27.25 for July. That contracts for short ribs to be de-livered in store in May and July shall not exceed the price of \$26.20 per 100 pounds for May and \$26.55 per 100 pounds for July

Prices for mess pork, lard and short ribs beyond July shall not exceed \$50,44 per barrel-for pork, \$27.27 per 100 pounds for lard, and \$26,55 per 100 pounds for short ribs. 

# BOLSHEVIKI CLAIM THEY

Austrians Will Assist Germans in New Russian Campaign—Germans Move Along All Fronts Towards Vitebsk, Minsk, Pskoff and Reval-Much Heavy Artillery and Ammunitions Falls Into Hands of Invaders.

Petrograd, Web. 20.—Bolsheviki leaders declare that if the Germans advance continues they will defend Petrograd with the Red Guard and harass the German advance by guerilia warfare. No plans have been made for evacuation of the city.

The Bolsheviki say this is a new war, not the old war, and that they will present a united front against the Germans. They believe the proletariat of Russia will be able to continue the struggle.

Germans Take Towns.

London, Feb. 21.—German troops, having occupied Dvinsk, are advancing toward Pskoff, 180 miles southed toward Mohilev, the former grad, and their cavalry is pushing toward Mohilev, the former Russian general headquarters.

The Novala Viedomsty, the despatch adds, says the Germans have occupied Molodechno, an important rail-way junction morthwest of Minsk. According to the Pravda, the Austrians have begun an advance on the Ukrahlan front.

London, Feb. 21.—An intercepted German wireless message, according to a Reuter despatch from Petrograd, quotes Prince Leopold of Bavaria, the eastern front, as saying to his troops: "Russia is sick and is trying to contaminate all the countries in the world with a moral infection. We must fight against the disorder inoculated by Trotzky and defend outraged liberty. Germany is fortunate in being the incarnation of the sentiments of other order-loving peoples."






