The details of the recent stage robbery in California reveal the daring of highwaymen in that section. They had gone but a short distance when four men suddenly stepped out from among the rocks of bushes, each wearing a black mask and levelling a double-barrelled shot-gun at the driver. Each was observed to carry a revolver in addition to his gun. The driver at first demurred to the proposition to dismount, but he was assured by one of the robbers that they meant business, and that there was no time to waste in parleying. He con-cluded to dismount from his seat, and cluded to dismount from his seat, and two of the men stood at the horses' heads and the other two paid their respects to the passengers. At the suggestion of the other highwayman and through the persuasive power of a shotgun on each side of the stage the passengers all vacated the stage. A Suitor Stabs his Sweetheart Eight | FOREIGN FIRE PROSPECTUS Times and then Attempts to Kill Himself.

NEW YORK, Aug. 11. Last night William Anderson, an ice ender, stabbed Miss Annie Cunningham eight times in the back with a jack knife at South Fifth and First streets, Williamsburgh. Anderson is 21 years old, Miss Cunningham is 18. They have been lovers, having become acquainted a year ago. The girl's parents disliked Anderson, and forbade Annie associating with him. She and her father and mother reside at the corner where Anderson stabbed her. Anderson is a tall young man; is described as industrious, quiet, and sober. Frequently since his acquaintance with Annie he has spoken to his fellow workingmen about their troubles by the intermeddling of her parents. Whenever he had an opportunity he visited Annie, and had an opportunity he visited Annie, and owing to the ill feeling of her parents she has met with him clandestinely. as met with him clandestinely.

Miss Annie is a stout blonde. Her hai

falls in heavy tresses over her shoulders. She was infatuated with Anderson, but dreaded the anger of her parents. Her sister ill-treated and abused her. "She never," says a friend of hers, Miss Russell, "had a moment's rest on his account." Two weeks ago Anderson propose marriage. She refused, and since that time Anderson has endeavored to mee' her. After his day's labor he repaired to the corner where she lived, but she re-fused to see him.

used to see him. Last night Anderson repaired to his accustomed corner. He had been around the neighborhood all day, frequently call-ing into liquor stores. At 8 o'clock he saw Annie step from her house with Miss Russell. As they crossed the street he approached them. Miss Russell, after

saluting him, withdrew one side. Annie stood, and after taking his proffered hand started toward Miss Russell. Anderson asked her where she was going, and before she made a reply he drew a large pocket-knife and made a lunge at her. She turned and received the blow on her shoulder. While screaming, Anderson caught her by the hair and struck her eight times. At each blow the knife went through her dress and cut ugly gashes on her back. sell. Anderson started toward Miss Russ gashes on her back.

The girl's cries attracted attention, and
Officer James Hallett tore the infuriated man from the girl, and she fell to the walk, covered with blood.

Anderson saw her fall, and he drew the bloody knife and quickly plunged it into his breast. As he made the fourth stroke the officer tore it from his hand.

The escape of three young Chinese girls from the low life to which this court had condemned them resulted in the exposure and arrest of some of the leading spirits. The institution was started a number of years since, mainly for the purpose of looking after Chinese women, but it has since extended its powers, until it has grown into a formidable organization, which exercises a sort of judicial office among the Celestials.
