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WASHINGTON LETTER

(From our Regular Correspondent.)

Washington, July 13, 1896.

Political enthusiasm does not reign in official circles at Washington. The Republicans of the Government set are naturally timid about expressions of political enthusiasm, and their McKinley prizes are at best covertly sung. On the other hand the Democracy of the Government workshops teaper their expressed political misgivings with the essence of the Cleveland administration. As might have been supposed, there is a total absence of enthusiasm in the executive departments over the nomination of "the boy orator of the Platte" to the office of Secretary of the Navy. The officials, high and low, will have nothing to say on the subject, and it is impossible to learn from their own lips whether Secretaries Olney, Carlisle, Herbert and Smith and Postmaster General Wilson, the only members of the Cabinet now in the city, will or will not support the ticket either with their votes or their words. All of these gentlemen are working hard at their desks and evidently thinking a great deal harder. The "policy of silence" is strictly observed, even by the fountain-head of the administration. So far as can be ascertained, none of the Cabinet officers in the city have received any communication from Cleveland since the adoption of the free silver platform. But there runs a deep undercurrent of semi-official opinion that the President and all the members of his Cabinet will remain away from the polls in November next. There was probably

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
