### BRAKEMEN ON TOP OF MOVING RAINS

Railway Commission Decides Not to  
Interfere With Them

OTTAWA.—The Railway Commis-  
sion yesterday morning decided not to  
forbid the presence of brakemen on the  
top of moving trains. The propos-  
al was made for the purpose of allow-  
ing the reduction in the height of  
bridges and overhead crossings of  
railways. At present there has to be  
22 feet 6 inches between the rails and  
the bridges, so that on top of them  
for brakemen to stand on top of the  
cars without danger. If the  
height of the bridges could be reduced  
by keeping brakemen off the tops of  
freight trains the cost of overhead  
crossings would be greatly reduced.  
The proposal to remove the brakemen  
was opposed as impracticable by re-  
presentation of the Canadian Pacific  
and the Canadian Northern and other lines.  
They declared that even with the air  
brakes on all freight trains there was  
need for men on the tops of cars to  
give signals and to supplement the  
air on grades. The board decided not  
to interfere with the present condition

**LEGISLATURE MEETS FEBRUARY 17TH.**

Date Chosen at Meeting of Government at Fredericton Wednesday last  
 ANNOUNCEMENT SOON.

FREDERICTON, Jan. 6.—The provincial legislature will in all probability be called to meet here on Thursday, Feb. 17th.

The announcement as to the opening of the session has not as yet been made, however, but the 17th of next month will probably be the date finally selected.

The Provincial Government concluded its monthly meeting yesterday afternoon with a short session following the meeting of the Board of Education.

The Government will meet here again about the 24th inst. to make arrangements for the session of the Legislature.

**MANY FISHERMEN REPORTED MISSING.**

Disaster Meets Nova Scotia Fishing Fleet in Recent Storm.

**SOME HAVE RETURNED.**

HALIFAX, Jan. 5.—Prostrated by a calamity without a parallel in the history of Nova Scotia the little fishing village of Whitehead was the scene of a disaster today. Twelve fishing boats, manned by over thirty men, were overtaken by a furious blizzard last night and driven off shore in zero weather with a tempestuous sea running and driving snow storm prevailing.

From every point along the eastern coast of the province today steamers were being rushed in search of the missing men but it is feared that this aid will be too late. At least two boats containing fourteen men are known to have been lost with their crews and have scarcely hope of being recovered.

Altogether twenty five boats all manned by men from Whitehead or the immediate vicinity were travelling off Whitehead harbor mouth for had they last night when with scarcely any warning a furious blizzard swept down on them from off high land. Five of the boats succeeded in making camp during the night, and several more were heard from this morning.

The tragedy of last night's storm completely enveloped the storm beat on pieces of coast accustomed though it is to tragedies such as these.

HALIFAX, Jan. 6.—Some uncertainty still exists regarding some of the missing boats and a report that all were saved but Scourge Juniors, a party of men from Whitehead says: "Captain Harvey Munro reports he saw two boats yesterday. He saw the Juniors, Capt. Landon Munro, who had double reefed mainsail torn to the rag and the Scourge with small forecast. The Milo and Hazel had not yet returned."

Always has been received from Port Beckett that Capt. Landon Munro in the Juniors arrived there today all well.

Yesterday's gloom along the shore tempted to joy when hope arose of all missing fishermen being rescued. Early this morning it appeared that at least forty men but as the morning went on reports of rescues began to come in and it now appears that all the schooners but two with nine men are safe and there is every hope for the rest.

**GRAND GREVE**

There is quite a whaleboat on the coast of Gaspe Bay, some two years ago on the 23rd December, piloted off of Gaspe Harbor, the brigantine "John Rogers" started with a cargo of codfish for Brazil, shipped by Messrs. William Frang & Co., Ltd., and the season on the same date she was piloted off the S. S. "Byblos" laden with a cargo of lumber shipped by Gaspe Lumber & Trading Co. This is the latest date on record for sailings out of Gaspe Harbor, and Capt. Taylor of the S. S. "Byblos" stated to pilot that steamers could come to Gaspe even in January.

A very quiet wedding took place on the 22nd of December at the home of Mr. Moses Shinn, Indian Cove, where Miss Emily Withers of England and Mr. George Syrett of the Island of Jersey were joined in the holy bonds of matrimony.

Several of our men from this locality who were home for the Christmas holidays have left again for the lumber camps.

Delivers Eloquent Speech on 'Canada' at Toronto.

**CANADA A NATION.**

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 23.—On his arrival at Toronto today Sir Wilfrid Laurier was waited on by important delegation representing the Ontario Association of Architects, who emphasized the necessity of raising the standard of public architecture in the province.

The Premier attended the official opening of the Ontario Club this evening. Mr. J. Haney presided, and about 150 were present. Sir Wilfrid paid a high tribute to the spirit of Toronto grits and described how he himself thrived on attacks from the Tory press. "One thing, however, our producers," he said, "cannot do or deny or dispute that under our guidance the country has made strides, and history will attest that during these years the page has been turned in history of Canadian page with success and advancement. I know our producers say this is simply a matter of luck, a favor from the powers above. I don't dispute that. If it is so I am quite content. The surgeon upon being congratulated, rubbing in modesty, said 'I treated him, but God cured him.'"
