



CAMPAIGN SUGGESTIONS.

The Best Means to Win the Election

The following suggestions may be of service in the coming election: "In close constituencies particularly, the very best scrutineers possible should be secured and they should be on hand when the polls are opened, as questionable votes are often hurried in before the arrival of the scrutineers so as to avoid the 'swearing' process." If a voter is challenged by the opposite side do not allow him to be 'bluffed' if he had a proper right to vote. Elections have been lost through men who had a legal vote being bluffed out of it. Liberal voters should not pair off unless they have the very best reasons for bloing so. It sometimes happens that a Liberal will be paired by a canvasser on the other side with a man who has no vote. Voters, particularly in the rural municipalities, should find out before the polling day where they have to cast their votes. It has happened that many votes have been lost because people have gone to the wrong polling sub-division and then found it was too late in the day to go to the right one Alberals should cast their votes early in the day, and if they own a conveyance of any kind offer it to the local committee or go after some voters who may be a distance from the poll. Many votes are usually hurried in between 4:30 and 5 p.m. that might just as well be in much earlier. All who are in sympathy with the Liberal platform but may have personal differences with the candidate who may be running or some member of the party should not allow those to stand in the way of their voting for the platform that is for the benefit of the country. Guard strictly against doing anything of an illegal nature, but use every legitimate means to further the interests of Liberals. Watch the ballot box closely, and when the votes are being counted be particularly careful to see that counted be p closely, and when the votes are being counted be particularly careful to see that no ballot which should be counted is re-jected. Do not take for granted that because those on the other side are well known they will not resort to any tricks by which votes can be improperly secured. 'Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty,' and this is particularly true in an election."

158,774 149,546 2,194 11,422 Of the above 77 towns, 21 show a gain in ten years of 2,194, while 56 show a loss of 11,422, and the net loss of population in the ten years is 9,228. But it has been in reality very much greater, for population increases by the excess of births over deaths at the rate of 22½ per 1,000 every year, which is the rate of natural increase. On the total population of 158,774 in 1879 the natural increase in ten years should therefore be 40,000; but it is shown to be 3,228 less in 1889 than in 1879, so that the aggregate loss of population in the 77 towns has been very nearly 50,000. And this appears without any account being taken

FARM MORTGAGES IN DALTON M'CARTHY'S COUNTY.

Speaking in North Simcoe a few days ago Dalton McCarthy said that only 9 per cent. of the farms in Canada were mortgaged, and he gave figures to show that in Ohio and other States of the American Union the percentage was much higher. Mr. Mc-Carthy did not give the source of his information as regards farm mortgages in the United States; but as regards Canada, he possesses no information, because none has been gathered. His statement, however, has led to an inquiry being made in the county of Simcoe, and for this purpose the three richest and most populous townships in the whole county have been selected, viz., Tecumseh, Nottawasaga and Oro. Here are the facts concerning these town-

ships: Tecumseh is divided into 647 parcels or lots as held under patents from the Crown, and of these 432 are mortgaged, being nearly 67 per cent. of the whole

Nottawasaga is divided into 623 patented parcels, of which 490 are mortgaged, or 78 per cent. of the whole. Oro is divided into 569 patented lots, and 399 of them are mortgaged, being 70 per cent. of the whole.

So it appears that in the three richest and most populous townships in Mr. McCarthy's own county, out of a total of 1,839 farm lets as patented from the Crown, 1,321 are mortgaged, being at the rate of 72 out of every 100. And this is what the Old Policy has done for Canada.



The Reason: Too Limited a Market in Canada for Them.

I would like to give the citizens of London a few facts concerning the duties on this particular line:

During the year 1889 a large quantity of American wall paper was imported into this country at a cost of 4 cents per roll, and duty was charged on same at the rate of 9 cents per roll, or 225 per cent. By persistent efforts of dealers the Government were persuaded to reduce the duty to 6 cents per roll, or 150 per cent., which is the present rate. The duty on the cheapest grade of paper made in the United States which is at present 3½ cents per roll, or about 93 per cent.

Now, sir, the fact is that there are three manufacturers of wall paper in this country, and notwithstanding the enormous rate at which they are protected, one of them, I understand, has lately experienced financial difficulties. Not content with this large rate of protection, these same manufacturers actually want the same, and in many cases more for their goods than what they cost—duty paid—from the United States, and offer the same old patterns year after year, whereas the American manufacturers offer new designs every year. When asked why they do not make more new designs and sell at a price which will shut out the American paper, they say that the market is not large enough to enable them to do so; and, furthermore they tell us that the high tariff was put on the cheap goods not so much to keep out the American papers but to keep out the CHEAP ENGLISH GOODS. This I think clearly shows that a larger market is wanted and would be advantageous not only to the manufacturers, but to the consumers as well. Thanking you Mr. Editor for the space I have taken up. Two strikers were wounded—John Hobday and John Trainer—the former fatally.
