LONDON, May 25 .- Morley, in a speech delivered at Huddersfield, said he certain that the Parliamentary elections would begin before the end of the first week in July. He accused Lord Salisbury of trying to promulgate "vicious, pestilential tariff doctrines." If Lord Salisbury was insincere he was hoodwinking the cople, and if sincere, he intended, in the event of his return to power, to make tariff reprisals on other countries, a proceeding which would inflict the greatest injury on the country's industries. He could not escape country's industries. He could not escape the charge of political incendiarism by say-ing that his plea for Ulster, made in a recent speech, was merely a warning. The case in question was one where to prophesy was to incite and to warn was to provoke.

Gladstone on the Irish Question.

LONDON, May 24 .- The discussion of the Irish Local Government Bill was resumed in the House of Commons to-day. Mr. Gladstonesaid the House was in the singular position of discussing a bill that it was probable would not be proceeded with. In 1886 would not be proceeded with. In 1886 both Mr. Chamberlain and the Duke of Devonshire had promised Ireland everything short of an independent parliament. They spoke of provincial assemblies and of radically reconstructing the whole administrative system. They also spoke of a large devolution of national power to an Irish assembly. (Cries of "Hear, hear.") Now, all these promises were dissolved in the present meagre bill, which stamped Ireland with inequality as compared with England and Scotland, and ralisified rolics of those engagements which were taken by the country as the basis of the commission intrusted to the present Government in 1886. Ireland, Mr. Gladstone said, had not been sighing during the last six years for a local government bill, nor would she regret the loss of the measure now presented. The leader of the Government had warned the Irish members of Parliament that if they did not take this bill instead of the larger measure promised—if they prosecuted the object nearest their heart—it would be at the cost of civil war. Lord Salisbury's language distinctly encouraged civil war. If Lord Salisbury's language meant anything it was a plain incitement of a few misguided persons to resort to violence.

to 247.

Lord Salisbury's language, Mr. Glad-Lord Salisbury's language, Mr. Gladstone said, distinctly encouraged civil war. Definite explanations ought to be given the House, and to some others who desired to know whether the Cabinet were generally of the same opinion as Lord Salisbury. Did the Ministers believe, he asked, that the people of Uister would rebel against the decision of Parliament or that the employment of the forces of the Crown to suppress such a rebellion would be such an outrage as would rend society in two? (Cries of "Hear, hear.") besien would be such an outrage as would rend society in two? (Cries of "Hear, hear.")
Mr. Gladstone analyzed the joint committee's proposal showing that it was destitute of the popular element and favored the landlords, helping them to nullify all the acts of the county councils. The bill conferred on the Liberals one great advantage as tending to a clear issue. It gave the people power to measure and determine exactly the value of the splendid Conservate promises of absolute equality with the laws of Great Britain. It was the one great compensation promised Ireland at the time of the union for the loss of her own Parliament. Where was the equality in this bill? (Cheers.) If the people of the country were misled concerning the treatment of Ireland with such evidence before them it would be their own fault. Was Ireland wrong, Mr. Gladstone saked, in rejecting the measure? No, the stamp of inequality was the brand of degradation. (Cheers.) If Ireland was capable of accepting a measure so stamped she was unworthy of the great rend society in two? (Cries of "Hear, hear.")

Mr. Baffour, the Government leader, referred to Lerd Salisbury's apeech concerning Ulster, and agreed with his Irish Propositions. He noticed the Liberals conceived that they would shortly be sent back to power for the purpose of passing the Home Rule Bill they contemplated. It was possible that Ulster might be coereed into submission. (Cheers.)

Mr. Gladstone here interrupted Mr. Balfour, saying that he had not uttered a syllable to that effect. He believed that a

few foolish people might act upon the opinion of Lord Salisbury.

Mr. Dillon described the bill as a mockery and a violation of pledges tending to confirm the Irish in their placing no trust in British faith.

Mr. Gladstone spoke for an hour. In his speech there were some fine passages, which awoke admiration on both sides. The Irish members cheered for several minutes after

members cheered for several minutes after Mr. Gladstone resumed his seat.

Edison Gets the Society of Arts Prize. LONDON, May 25 .- The Society of Arts rize, consisting of a medal-the prize having been founded in memory of the Prince Consort—has been awarded to Thomas A. Edison. The medal had been previously awarded to Faraday De Lesseps and most of the great scientists.

Monster Petitions. LONDON, May 25 .- Two huge petitions have been wheeled into the House of Comhave been wheeled into the House of Com-mons. They bore the signatures of 138,-395 members of the Loyal Protestant League and others, praying for the ap-pointment of a committee to inquire into the condition of convents and monasteries in the United Kingdom.

Davitt on Salisbury's Speech London, May 25.—In speaking at Brad-ford Michael Davitt reviewed Lord Salisbury's Primrose speech on Ulster. He himself had dabbled in rebellion, and he number had dabbled in rebellion, and he would be sorry to see even his worst enemy in the piebald convict's costume. Lord Salisbury's language, however, justified every illegal act which he (Davitt) committed.

SIR ALEXANDER CAMPBELL. Death of the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario-His Probable Successor.

The deceased experienced a severe attack of paralysis about three months ago, but contrary to expectations he regained strength so much until a few days ago that his death was not expected to result therefrom. BETTER THAN OIL.

A New Method of Subduing the Waves of the Occan.

Much interest is at present being mani-fested in England and France in an inven-tion which has been submitted to the French Salvage Society by Baron d'Alessandro. It consists in covering the surface of the sea with a specially prepared insubmergible and imputrescible thin netting. This reticular fabric does not rise sensibly above the surface, and does not offer resistance to the wind; and it plays, it is claimed, the part of a bed of oil in that it has the effect of

of a bed of oil in that it has the effect of stilling the waves and rendering navigation safer and less difficult.

Baron d'Alessandro's idea is born of the circumstance: that sailors have frequently observed the caim produced by the floating seaweed, technically known as filum, which is met with in various parts of the North Sea. His netting is said to imitate exactly the nature and observed risk in order to the same that the same of is met with in various parts of the North Sea. His netting is said to imitate exactly the nature and characteristics of this marine plant of the Algae class. Experiments with the new wave-stiller have been conducted outside the breakwaters of the Quiberon Peninsula. A netting 1,000 yards square, with a mesh of five centimetres, and edged with a strong bolt-rope, was used, and the results obtained are stated to have been so satisfactory that the French Minister of Marine has appointed a special commission to investigate and report on the invention.

We live in a Christian community, whose laws are founded upon the Bible, and whose Government, by repeated deliverances of its high judiciaries, has been declared a Christian Government, which will not tolerate, for example, the use of its public halls for the propagation of infidel doctrines, and which claims the right to prevent the introduction of immoral or other objectionable books, like those of Bradlaugh and Ingersoll, through its mails and custom houses. It is true, no doubt, that truth and morality would triumph, but that is no reason why we should help error and evil. Ours is a civilized country, and, no doubt, civilization will prevail, but that is no reason why we should help those who do not accept oursanitary standards in opposing or obstructing reforms demanded by "the greatest good of the greatest number." If they won help us to fight dirt and disease, they shall not hinder. Even more important is it, in the moral and mental world, that a high standard should be maintained, and in this I am sure the Ministerial Association would not wish to reflect against the workingmen or their societies indiscriminately. 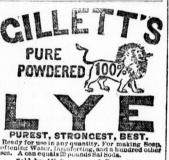

It is understood that Sir Oliver Mowat has been knighted, at the direct instance of the Imperial Power in recognition of his eminent services to his native Province, of which, on 1st October next, he will have been Premier for the extraordinary period of twenty years.

So long as imperial titles are offered to and accepted by Canadians, such a distribution as that now made could scarcely be caviled at, though many Canadians entertain the view that it is more appropriate for our public men to look for honors at the hands of the people of this country rather than to the imperial authorities who know comparatively little about our public men. The misfortune is that favoritism at Ottawa, from which the granting of nearly all the titles is engineered, is in far too many cases the passport to distinction.

DEATH OF SIR A. CAMPBELL.

The death of Sir Alexander Campbell Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, at the age of 71, removes one of the few links that bind the pre-Confederation race of politicians with the present. At one time, he was a prominent member of the Dominion Government, and as a Senator managed affairs in the chamber of the Fifth Wheel for Sir John Macdonald. In later years he has almost dropped out of sight. As Lieutenant-Governor of this Province, he had little to do but spend his salary in a social way, and while he remained in health he kept at his post. Latterly, however, he was stricken with disease, and now, just as his term was about to close, he finally rests from his labors. He was not a man of strong personalty, but he made few enemies.

"THE GENTENNIAL

The Corner Stone of the New Methodist Church

Formally Placed in Position by Miss E. E. Bowman.

The Contents of the Stone-Addresses by Thos. McCormick, Rev. J. V. Smith, Rev. B. Clement, Rev. Geo. Boyd and Mr. C. H. Ivey—Financial Statement, Showing Cost of Church—The Evening

Threatening weather, basebail matches, horse races and excursions did not prevent a large crowd of London's citizens from spending a portion of the Queen's Birthday in witnessing the laying of the corner stone of the Centennial Methodist Church, which is being built in East London, a complete description of which was published in yesterday's Advertiser. Rev. B. Clement, president of the London Conference, opened the ceremony by reading hymn 669, which the choir of the church and the congregation song. Rev. Stephen Bond led in prayer and Rev. A. C. Lightning Speed at Which London Excursionists Travelod to Detroit.

ACCIDENT TO THE CASPIAN.

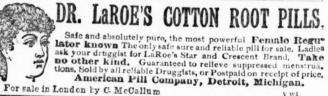

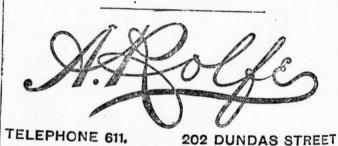

The same kind of a story has been told long enough about Ontario even in some of our Provincial papers, but to a great extent in papers elsewhere. Interested parties impose on accommodating or dishonest publishers, and away goes a story that is entirely untrue. If a Patron wants a paragraph inserted, the charge will be so much a line, but these fiery paragraphs go in the papers free. The order has, however, been imposed upon long enough.

The membership in Outario has never decreased, but has always steadily increased and is larger now than that of any previous organization of farmers in the Dominion. 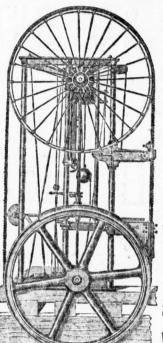

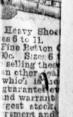
