ENGLAND'S CHANCERY COURT.

Another striking instance of the miscarriage of justice, which has made the English Court of Chancery a crying disgrace to civilization, went upon record last week. A thrifty mechanic married a young lady two or three years ago who was a ward in chancery, her little fortune amounting to \$2,000. The costs of the court in settling that sum upon her, by the way, were \$500. A few months ago sine became ill of a pulmonary affection, and her physician ordered her to a warmer climate as the only means of saving her life. Her husband was poor, and applied to the court for permission to use a portion of her funds for the purpose of obeying the doctor's orders. The court occupied six months in considering the matter and last week denied the application, charging the dwindling estate \$400 for its judgment. Meantime the poor woman had died, as the doctor said she would.

The reverend gentleman explained to the congregation that he had forbidden the ap-pearance of the singer, and he added that those who had come to church simply to listen to the vocalist would have an opportunity to retire before the collection was taken up. This is rather an extreme case, but it gives point to the discussion which every now and again crops up as to whether or not leaders in church singing should be professing Christians and in full communion with the church. Opinions on the question are at present divided.

THE CURE FOR CONSUMPTION When two years ago Dr. Robert Koch, of Berlin, gave to the medical world some particulars of his famous lymph, as the result of his discovery of the bacillus of tuberculosis, many people rushed to the conclusion that a complete cure had at length been discovered for the disease that has caused more deaths in the human race than cholera and war combined. This assumption was not assented to by Koch himself. While modestly claiming that his lymph had been proved to ameliorate the condition of consumptives under certain condition of consumptives under certain conditions, he never gave out that it was to be a cure-all. Rather, he warned his fellow-investigators that he had made but a beginning in the field of research. What he did claim to discover was the germ, and ever since he gave it to the world he and thousands of other medical men have been engaged in devising some means of destroying this germ, or of rendering it innocuous after its entrance into the human body. The distinguished German pursued his investigation upon the hypothesis that the bacillus itself produces during its development, either in its own organism or from the tissues in which it resides, a poison which ultimately destroys it. This is much after the fact that the yeast plant in a fermenting liquid creates alcohol finally in such quantity as to inhibit its growth, or that the germs of putrefaction are self-limited through the deleterious substances to which their activity gives Koch's lymph, as given to the profession

in 1890, was the product of the growth and

life of the bacillus of consumption, and the

analyses made of it showed that it was composed of a number of organic sub-stances, the chief of which seems to be an albuminous material, to which the name albumose is given. When the bacilli develop in the body this active principle causes a species of death of surrounding tissues known as coagulation-necrosis, and the necrosic tissue thus formed is so unfavorable. orable for the existence of the germs that they die. The lymph did not prove to be that universal cure that many expected it to be, and the majority of people have doubtless reached the conclusion that it has proved a total failure. But many experiments with the lymph have taken place, and it is now believed that it has been improved in remarks. been improved in remedial power while possessing less deleterious effect upon the The original lymph when in jected into the body of a tubercular patient caused malaise and fever. But an English physician named Hunter and a German pathologist named Klebs have each independently analyzed the Koch lymph and eliminated from it substances which seemed to be foreign to the true remedial principle, and have for some time been using in hospitals and in their practice the active ingredient of the lymph, to which Klebs the foreign and unnecessary elements of the lymph which gave origin to the fever and other disagreeable symptoms. as given the name tuberculocidin. It was other disagreeable symptoms. Tuber-culocidin is an albumose which Hunter thinks is derived from the plasma of the bacilli themselves. Klebs also considers it a secretion of the germs. In experiments upon animals, fully developed tubercles were found to be entirely reduced by tuberculocidin, while in man over 18 per cent. of 75 cases of marked pulmonary tuberculosis treated by Klebs were cured. The purified lymph causes no fever, and treatment with it does not interfere with the daily occupation of the patient. Tuber-culocidin has been for some time in the hands of the medical profession, and is therefore within the reach of every one who applies to his family physician for treatment with it, although none of the usual precautions as although none of the usual precautions as regards diet, change of climate, hydrother-apy, and the employment of other drugs found to be valuable in consumption are neglected by him.

But it is questionable if an effective cure, thus easily obtained, would be wholly a blessing. There are—men and women who can only be made careful of the bodies with which they have been provided by the fear of the consequences of irregularities within their power to avoid. Nature has provided that the laws of health cannot be broken with impunity, and it seems to be impossible, for even the or nearth cannot be erosen with impunity, and it seems to be impossible, for even the most skilled physician, to completely repair the human mechanism once it has been broken down. When the public fully broken down. When the public hard appreciate this, there will be less consump-tion, either acquired or hereditary, there will be fower proventible diseases of every description, and the happiness of the race witt be much augmented.

DAVID MILLS AND RECI-

Hon. David Mills was interviewed by a New York Sun correspondent in this city recently on the question of the interna tional relations between Canada and the United States. The following is published as the honorable gentleman's views on the

trade negotiations:

"'Is there a large emigation to the United States from Bothwell?' asked the correspondent.

"'There used to be, and now and then I hear of persons going; but I regret to say that nearly the whole of the emigrating class has already gone.'

"Among those who remain there is a feeling of unrest?"

"Yes, public opinion is unsettled. I ascribe the unrest to the depression in trade resulting from the loss of the American market through the McKiuley tariff, from the low price of products, which means a contracted income for the farmer, from the exorbitant taxation under the Canadian tariff, and from the wasteful expenditure of public money on enterprises which have not added to the permanent wealth of the country.'

"Reciprocity with the United States would revive things?"

"Of course. I favor a very liberal measure of reciprocity, one that would admit into Canada free of duty as large a quantity in value of American goods as the United States might take from us on like terms. Such an arrangement would be mutually advantageous. I don't think political union has got a deep hold on our people yet. The extreme dissatisfaction with the policy of the Government and the financial and commercial distress it has occasioned are responsible for the annexation sentiment which undoubtedly exists, but probably that sentiment would disappear with the hard times. Besides a large measure of reciprocity, we should aim at a general reduction of the Canadian tariff, making it a tariff for revenue only. Were the United States to refuse us reciprocity with a view of influencing our political action, the effect might be the very opposite of that which they had in mind. In that event we could reduce our tariff on certain classes of British goods which would be purchased just as readily by the Americans along the border as by ourselves. I take it to be a sound principle in political philosophy that if a people are pessessed of honesty and public spirit no other people can shut them out of the path of prosperity. However,



4. Because if you are a friend of the early closing movement you ought to give the bartender a chance to close up early!

5. Because healthy men do not need liquor, and the sick man who prescribes it for himself has a fool for a patient. Indeed he ought to be prosecuted for practicing medicine without a diploma!

6. Because beer only makes the constant drinker appear well when his bones are like sticks in a bag of water. It's all "beer bloat!"

7. Because a large proportion of the liquor sold under high sounding names, is fraudulent and absolutely poisonous. Hon. Geo. Gifford, American consul, La Rochelle, France, wrote in 1882: "All French brandy might properly, and perhaps ought to be, excluded from the United States on sanitary grounds," simply because such a thing as pure brandy is almost, if not entirely, unknown even in France, and what is true of brandy is true of so-called foreign wines.

8.
