HUNDREDS REPORTED LOST IN WRECK OF FRENCH SHIP

Goes on the Rocks Off the Coast of Uruguay and Many of Passengers and Crew Perish.

BUENOS AYRES, MAY 7.-A DISPATCH FROM MONTEVIDEO PUB-LISHED HERE TODAY SAYS THAT THE FRENCH TRANSPORT MARITIME'S STEAMER POITOU, FROM MARSEILLES APRIL 6 FOR THIS PORT, HAS BEEN WRECKED OFF THE COAST OF URUGUAY. ONE HUNDRED OF HER PASSENGERS AND CREW ARE SAID TO HAVE PERISHED.

MONTEVIDEO, URUGUAY, MAY 8.-THE FRENCH STEAMER POI-TOU, FROM ALGIERS, IS AGROUND OFF SAN JOSE, IGNACIO. IT IS FEARED THAT THERE HAS BEEN SERIOUS LOSS OF LIFE. IT IS UNDERSTOOD THAT THERE ARE 200 PASSENGERS ON BOARD THE VESSEL. AND THAT HER CARGO WILL PROVE A TOTAL LOSS. NO FURTHER PARTICULARS ARE OBTAINABLE AT PRESENT.

THE POITOU STRUCK 300 YARDS FROM SHORE AT RINCTON DE HERRO. PANIC ENSUED, AND MANY TERROR-STRICKEN PERSONS JUMPED OVERBOARD. SOME OF THEM SWAM ASHORE, BUT MANY WERE DROWNED. CUSTOMS OFFICERS AT RINCTON DE HERRO SAVED 50 OUT OF THE 300 PASSENGERS, WHO ARE SAID TO HAVE BEEN ON BOARD. HOW MANY OTHERS HAVE BEEN SAVED IS NOT KNOWN.

Fifteen Die in Riot at Sea.

San Diego, California, May 8. - It was reported late last night that two sailors, who have escaped from the British steamer Maori King, which arrived here yesterday, from Shanghai, make sensational charges of brutality against the captain and officers of the ship. Rumors are in circulation to the effect that fifteen Chinese were killed during the riot on board and their bodies cast into the sea.

International complications are likely to result, and it is belleved that most part of the charges remain yet to be told.



Toronto, May 7.-It is understood that Hon. J. J. Foy, the attorneygeneral, may be appointed to represent Ontario at the imperial conference of education to be held in London this summer. It is believed to be the intention of the Provincial Government to take an advanced stand in educational matters, and the conference may be of much importance to Ontario.

The conference will comprise representatives from the educational departments of all the British dependencies. It will have for its premier object the general desire for uniformity in educational training throughout the empire. It is the first conference of the kind which has ever been held, the plan being formed about two years ago in England with the imperial league and being carried out under the auspices

of the Imperial Government. Among the matters to be dealt with are two which will be of especial interest to Ontario at the present time. An effort will be made to secure some standard of uniformity in the qualifications for teachers, and the subject matter and mechanical character of text books and their grading will also be discussed.




