



Editor of London Truth Literally Pours Vitril Into House of Lords Fight.

London, Oct. 21 .- "A dissolute nobility. descended from a tainted ancestry," is the terrible indictment brought against the bulk of the English peerage by Henry Labouchere, the fearless editor and critic.
