Thrilling Stunts of the British Cavalry, Mounted and on Foot. Make One of Finest Stories of Great Struggle.

With the British Army in France, Sunday, April 7.—No finer chapter has been provided from the story of the British defence since the German offensive began than that furnished by the

Never during the present war had horsemen been given the chance which they had in this more or less open warfare, and they made the most of it. They have been here, there and everywhere filling in gaps, strengthening the lines and covering the retirement of infantry. Their work has been brilliant and they thoroughly enjoyed every minute, despite the gruelling engagements.

The correspondent saw long lines of cavalry on the roads. They were battle worn and plainly showed the marks of hard fighting. More than one trooper led a riderless horse. But the men' heads were up, and their lances de wilbed defiant circles, while the horses cavorted as though they, too, were ready for more trouble.

Cut Through Foe Lines.

In the first three days of the German drive the cavalry fought mostly on foot, and did valuable work. It was dismounted cavalry that held the Ollezy-Ham line on March 22, while the infanry withdrew. There was terrific fighting here. One party of dragoons was cut off all night, during which they were out in the open battling for their lives. Finally, they cut their way through the

Step by step the Germans gave way pefore the onslaught until the western part of the wood had been cleared beween Moreuil and Demuin. The cavalry held it until next morning, when the inantry took over the position. On the the Germans again attacked in force, and once more the British infantry, although fighting gallantly and stubbornly was compelled to pull back because of the overwhelming weight of the numbers opposed to them. During the afternoon the cavalry again attacked here, and drove most of the German back somewhat, but the enemy still clung to the high ground and kept send-ing forward supporting infantry.

Another London boy has fallen on the field of honor in France in the person of Sergt. Frank W. Nickle, M.M., son of Detective Thomas Nickle, who was killed in action on March 28th. A telegram from the records office, Ottawa, was received by Detective Nickle this morning. Beyond conveying the information that his son had been killed in action no other details were given.

# GERMANS INTENSIFY BATTERY ATTACKS ON BRITISH FRONT; HAIG GAINS A LITTLE GROUND

RESERVES KEEP **POURING** ENTENTE LINES

Every Day Finds the Front in **Better Position To Stop** 

SOMME RUSH FAILED

Huns Used 25 Divisions On a Narrow Salient, But Could Not Get Through.

Washington, D. C., April 8 .- Every day finds the Allies in a better position to resist with definite success the great German offensive, according to an officlal review today by the British mititary attache here. The French, British and American reserves are pouring in daily to help check the German drive: "The opening of the third week of fighting east of Amiens," says the review, "finds the position of the Allies

steadily improving. "A very strong effort by the enemy to drive down the Somme to Amiens during which he used about twenty-five divisions on a front of a few miles was stopped last week with complete success. Only in one place was the German line advanced and then only to a depth of less than a mile on a marrow front.

"North of Albert the British advance, beat off repeated and vicious attack Enemy Discomfitted. "Near Montdidier, the French with-drew a short distance to strong posi-tions. The enemy is nowhere within nine miles of Amiens. He is still three miles distant at his farthest point of ad way, the cutting of which would bring him no real victory. The best proof of his discomfiture is the use that he is making of minor incidents for window-

dressing purposes. ressing purposes.

"A short time ago in the course of the steady advance of the British army n Palestine a small force was thrown cross the Jordan to cut the Herjas railway. This retirement was advertised by the Germans as a triumph for the Turks, who are alleged to have thrown the British force back over the Jordan. "Similarly, the Germans are glosting today."





# BACKYARD GARDEN HINTS

uld be carried would be better. It should be stirred easons. First slightly after every watering or rain, the surface of the soil rough so as to prevent the evaporation of the moisture from it. The best implement for cultivation is the hoe, and a narrow-bladed one is the handlest. This work of stirring the soil should commence in the vegetable garden even before the seeds have appeared above ground. For this reason the rows in which the seed is sown should be carefully marked, so that the young seeds may not be disturbed by the hoeing. In the case of slowly-germinating seeds, such as lettuce or radish, may be sown along with the other seed to act as a row marker so that cultivation may commence early. At first the cultivation may be deep, but as the season advances and the roots are spreading, cultivation should become shallow, so that the roots are not broken as disturbed. Two inches is the usual depth. A rake may be used during the summer months.
