Speedy termination of the transportation tie-up, wrought by e unauthorized strikes of railroad workers throughout the nited States seemed assured today.

Switchmen, yardmen and other employees of the Pennsylnia, Reading and Baltimore and Ohio lines in the Philadelphia strict, were returning to work this morning under orders of eir strike leaders.

The work order affects strikers on all lines between Boston d Washington, including those in the New York, as the Pennvania strike committee had been authorized to negotiate for strikers in the east.

In the New York district, railroad officials declared the men ere returning rapidly, and reports from all sections of the coun also indicated that the swing back to work was fast gaining mentum. This was reflected both in the increased amount of raffic handled by the lines and the loss of enthusiasm for the strike apparent in the attitude of many of the strikers.

Military Experts Will Be Called by the Supreme Council.

ARMENIA'S PORTION

Will Be Given Territory Giving Outlet To Black

San Remo, April 17.—Allied nations would be called upon to maintain a force of 300,000 men in Turkey to insure execution of the terms of the treaty with that country which was framed at London recently, it is understood. This treaty will be considered by the supreme Allied council when it opens its sessions here early next Monday, and announcements that Marshal Foch of France and Field Marshal Wilson of Great Britain would be present at the meeting, are regarded as indicating that military experts will be called upon by the council before it decides finally on the terms to be submitted to the sultan.

Armenia, under the treaty as it stands at present, would be given the territory comprised within the boundary roughly outlined by the towns of Erzerum, Biths, Van and Mush, and the corridor leading to the Black Sea.

Other features of the treaty which will be given consideration will be the origin of Allied supervision at Constantinople, and the formation of a commission to control the Dardanelles, It is expected proposals will be made to admit Balkan States, including Bul-


"TENDERLOIN" CAFE IS RAIDED: POLICE SAY LIQUOR WAS SEIZED

AFTER YEARS OF CLIMBING

Dead Bodies of Russians Are Found Aboard Stranded Yacht

Bucharest, April 17.-The discovery on the yacht Ostara, stranded at Sulina, on one of the mouths of the Danube, of the dead bodies of eleven noted Russian men and women, each shot through the head, and not a living soul on board, has presented to the Rumanian authorities one of the most mysterious tragedies of Bolshevism in the Black Sea. The bodies have been identified as those of members of the noted Russian

The discovery was made by soldiers, who, when they went aboard the helpless yacht, found the cabin half-filled with water and the eleven bodies floating around. On board the yacht were 14,000,000 rubles in gold

Densham had not spent a day in active ser-

vice.

CANADIAN IRISHMEN TO MEET IN MONSTER **CONVENTION IN MAY**

All Societies Will Join in Huge April 18 to 24. Movement.

Winnipeg, April 16 .- Canadian Irishmen will probably assemble at Ottawa or Toronto during May to hold an Irish race convention, P. J. Henry, provisional president of the Friends of Irish freedom, which was organized in Winnipeg last Sunday, announced to-Winnipeg last Sunday, announced to-day.

Mr. Henry predicted that the organ-izations of Irishmen which were now springing up in various parts of Can-ada would be amalgamated under a common name, and with a common platform definitely stated.

The credit for stamping out many diseases with the different troops became affected, he said, was due to this service.

Typhoid Pever, the greatest curse to armies of the past, entirely disappeared during the later years of the past war. He compared the records of the South African war, when one out of every five men who served became infected, and one out of every six who became sick died, to the records of the Canadian troops in this war. A statement by the British pension board to parliament on December 19 last showed that the Canadian pensions were more liberal than, those of Canadian pensions were more liberal than those of any other country. The total disability pension (weekly rate) given by the different countries was:







Winnipeg, was tabled in the House of Commons today.

The correspondence ranged from July, 1919, to March, 1920, during which time Reithdorf, who, in the meantime had legally changed his name to Frederick Edwards, was striving unsuccessfully to secure full Canadian citizenship. He was naturalized as a British subject in 1915 at Woodstock, when he came into Canada from the United States.

Professor Reithdorf, whose father was a Saxon and anti-Prussian, sought to change his name as a protection to his wife and children, and also because his employment, as a secret service agent of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police in Western Canada, made possession of an English name important.

Loyalty and Service.

He had been in the Royal Northwest Mounted Police service since 1917, it was stated in the correspondence, and Col. W A. McLean, comptroller, in letters, spoke highly of his loyalty and good service to Canada during the war, and afterwards. Reithdorf, in his letters on the change of name, declared his sympathies were entirely with the Allies, and he believed the war had

ters on the change of name, declared his sympathles were entirely with the Allies, and he believed the war had been instigated by his native country—Germany. In July, 1919, he sought to secure full citizenship, after changing his name to Edwards, that he might use the ballot in the best interests of Canada. His application for full naturalization hung fire for some months, however, despite numerous letters on the subject which passed back and forth between Ottawa and Winnipeg, and on January 11 of this year he wrote to Hon. Newton Wesley Rowell, complaining of the delay and objecting to being placed in the same class as pro-Germans in naturalization matters. He said he asked no favors, but "could not and should not live in a country as a man with a just griev-

frisk gally around the more serious
theme of the pipe, have contributed
greatly to the celebrity which this
movement enjoys all the world over.
What follows is simple. There is a call
to arms, and then begins the triumphant quickstep, which to have heard
once is to forget never. The determination expressed in its stronglyimpetuous rhythm, the wonderful way
in which climax after climax is hurled
at the listener, the fire and brilliancy of
the whole produce an effect which not
even pedants have been known to resist.
