Brig.-Gen. Ross Tells of Prevention of Man-Power Wastage.

Because of the efficient service rendered by the Canadian Medical Corps on the battlefields of France, the Canadian troops were the best fitted to form the spearhead of the two great drives which broke the German lines and won the war...

TOWN PLANNING LEGISLATION CONSIDERED BY COMMITTEE

Gordon Philip Clears Up Mystery Surrounding Bill. Town planning legislation formulated by the Town-Planning Association for submission to the Government was considered by the town-planning committee last night. It is now, however, an unnecessary ordinance loomed up which killed it, and that quickly.

Mystery concerning this proposed legislation was somewhat cleared up by Gordon Philip, a member of the committee, and secretary of the Town-Planning Association. At a previous meeting of the committee City Clerk Baker stated that he had been visited by Dr. H. A. Stevenson, member for London, who stated that he had received a copy of town-planning legislation from some person in London. Mr. Philip stated that this was evidently the measure proposed by the Town-Planning Association which had been drafted in legal form. It was not a Government measure. This it was designed as a general bill, it would have been brought in by each municipality which wished to take advantage of it, amended to suit its particular need so long as it conformed with the general provisions laid down by the Government.

It was learned that legislation being introduced by Dr. Stevenson was a private bill to amend the act, so that the city council would control all expenditures of the town-planning commission. City Clerk Baker stated that he did not understand Dr. Stevenson's statement to relate to one particular clause, but to a whole town-planning bill.

Mr. Philip said the measure before the committee was the city council's own bill, and if the members did not recognize it that was not his fault. City Clerk Baker termed it "joke legislation" and claimed that it should be submitted to a vote of the ratepayers.

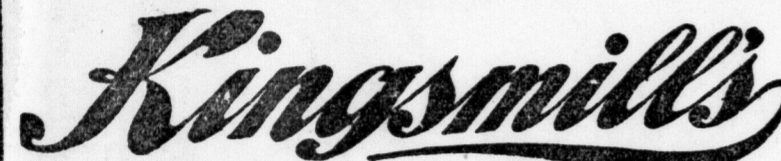

DEALERS PAY BONUS TO GET COAL SUPPLY

St. Thomas Coal Merchant Blames Bonus and Embargo For Shortage.

ST. THOMAS, April 16.—According to the admission of a local coal dealer, premiums are now paid for the shipment of coal to St. Thomas, and this bonus and, incidentally, the embargo placed upon railway transportation are blamed for the sudden rise of coal to \$15 a ton. The stock of coal in the city, the dealers say, is getting down to hard pan, and the scarcity is not confined alone to anthracite. No assurance would be given when normal conditions would return. Many of the dealers show, however, that with the spring season in sight, enough coal may be got together to keep the furnace from freezing before the bonus of the bonus is cleared off.

BIG CHATHAM SUGAR REFINERY CLOSED FOR LACK OF MATERIAL. Railroad Strike in U. S. A. Holds Up Large Supplies.

CHATHAM, April 16.—The mammoth sugar refinery of the Dominion Sugar Company here had to close down today as a result of shortage of raw sugar, large quantities of which are tied up by the strike of railroad workers in the United States. Other local factories are also commencing to feel the effects of the strike.

POTATO DEALERS ARE PANICSTRICKEN AT RESULT OF BOYCOTT

Price Tumbles From \$7.50 Bushel To \$4 With No Buyers. RICE TAKES PLACE. Food Value of Potatoes Is Exaggerated, Say Chefs.

DETROIT, Mich., April 16.—Club women of Detroit have successfully demonstrated that it is wholly possible to effectively squelch the profiteer by co-operation. On Monday and Tuesday last the price of potatoes was inflated, the women claim, artificially, to an unprecedented high level, from \$3.25 and \$3.50 a bushel. The tubers were rushed up until as much as \$7.50 was demanded for them.

Within 24 hours the wholesalers, with huge stocks, had begun bringing the price down. Yesterday they were begging at \$5 a bushel, and today the price had fallen to \$4 with practically no demand. Panic-stricken, the dealers late this afternoon began shipping their trucks to Cleveland and Toledo, where the price is said to be high enough to allow them to get out with a profit.

Will Not Reopen Question of Cash Gratuity, Decision Ottawa Committee Decides To Deal With Suggestions.

OTTAWA, April 16.—(By Canadian Press.)—The matter of a further general cash gratuity to returned soldiers will not be reopened by the parliamentary committee on pensions, but the committee is prepared to deal with all suggestions on the subject of re-establishment, including those which involve the payment of money under certain circumstances. This was the decision reached at the conclusion of today's sitting.

Sonora To Appeal To United States For Recognition. Announcement Made That New State Will Ask It.

AGUA PRIETA, Sonora, Mexico, April 16.—The State of Sonora will appeal to the United States for recognition as a belligerent. Announcement of the proposed appeal was made here today by Francisco Elias, a leader in the Sonora revolt against the Carranza Government of Mexico.

Tory Party Plans Ontario Convention For October Next. Toronto, April 16.—A provincial convention of the Conservative party will be held in this city the last week in October. At this convention a permanent leader of the party in Ontario will be appointed, and the party will be laid down. The date of the convention was decided today at a gathering of prominent conservatives at the Albany Club here, and a committee was named to make complete arrangements for the convention.

Strikers Are No Longer In Service. Columbus, Ohio, April 16.—Railroad officials today declared that they regard the striking switchmen as no longer in the service of the company, and will refuse to deal with them as strikers, it was said. Big Four railway officials, however, declared that they are "permanently out of the service," and are proceeding to fill up the ranks by advertising for switchmen. On several lines today yardmasters and assistants refused to perform switchmen's duties, but the ports were left by other officials, and passenger service was not interfered with.

Industries Close Up. Toledo, Ohio, April 16.—Toledo industries continued to close down today because of a lack of fuel due to the railroad strike. The Toledo Shipbuilding Company is preparing to suspend. The downtown section is practically without light, and other regulations are in effect. The food situation continues acute.

Guests were present from London, Chatham, Bielsheim, Comber and Ruthven.

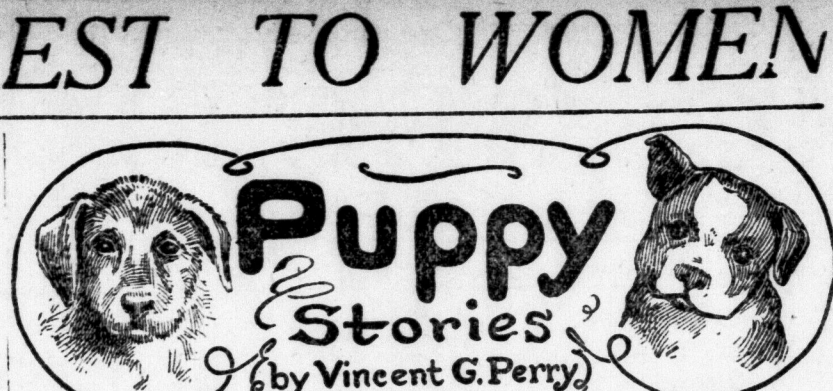

LIBERAL LEADER DEMANDS RIGHTS FOR G.T. R. MEN

liberal Leader Insists On Settlement With Employees.

CRITICISES BARGAIN

I. D. McKenzie Says Government Railways' Record Against State Ownership.

OTTAWA, April 15.—The House spent the day on the Grand Trunk bill. Discussion both on second reading and in committee was protracted. In committee Hon. W. S. Fielding had an amendment which sought to strike the clause out of the bill ratifying the corrected agreement for acquisition of the Grand Trunk. Mr. Fielding wanted to define the bill to ratifying any errors made in the act of last session. So far as Parliament had made a mistake, it would have it corrected; so far as mistakes had been made at the meeting of Grand Trunk shareholders—that was a question for the company to determine. After considerable debate Mr. Fielding's amendment was declared lost without a division.

Hon. W. S. Fielding then brought up the way in which the Grand Trunk Railway Company had treated its employees following the strike of 1910. At the time of the strike, Mr. Fielding was minister of labor in the Laurier Government; and he told of promises made at reconciliation and promises given by the company to restate strikers who had not broken the law.

"I want to ask Parliament," he declared, "to take such action as will make absolutely certain that the employees receive what is their rightful due from the company before the agreement is finally settled."

During the evening there was a division on a point of order. The first of the present session, it came on an appeal. In committee, Mr. McMaster of Bromo had been reading a report of a London Daily Times report of the meeting of Grand Trunk shareholders. E. V. Nesbitt, who was presiding, ruled Mr. McMaster out of order, on the ground that this citation from the Times was not relevant to the clause. Mr. McMaster immediately appealed. Mr. Deputy Speaker Bolvin submitted the point to the House.

In the subsequent division, Mr. Nesbitt's ruling was upheld in the following vote: For, 72; against, 69; majority, 3.

Government members all voted for; Liberal Opposition members against; the National Progressives (farmers) split. Messrs. Maharg, Caldwell, Knox, Reid (MacKenzie), Thomson and MacSutt voted in the affirmative. Messrs. Bould and Johnson (East Mountain) voted in the negative.

When the consideration of the bill was resumed in committee, Mr. McMaster continued to read from the Times report.

Criticizes Bargain.

Mr. D. D. McKenzie, however, proceeded to criticize the bargain. It was early to be expected, he said, that the members of the Opposition, who had opposed the acquisition of the Grand Trunk from its inception, were going to turn around now and support it. Nothing had transpired since his last session to change their opinion. In fact, the record of the Government Railways was such as to strengthen their opposition to public ownership.

The question of public ownership was one of which the members were far from being unanimous. Speaking for himself, Mr. McKenzie declared his opposition to it. He felt that the brain and capital of the country could better be used by private organizations than by the Government.

Mr. McKenzie said that he was not convinced that the legality of the agreement was above question. The main object of the present bill, said Mr. McKenzie, was ratification of the agreement. He questioned very much if Parliament had power to ratify the agreement.

Replying to W. C. Middleboro, Greyforth, Mr. McKenzie did not agree that the stock was merely a statement of deed of property in this country. Nothing had been done right in making this agreement, and the Government was now in the position of sending money to itself from itself and upon rate of interest fixed by itself.

The Grand Trunk did not pay its way, three years ago it was estimated that \$50,000,000 would be needed to put it into decent shape. Three times that amount would be needed now. Its acquisition was a bad bargain. Every man with the most interests of the country at heart would have the Grand Trunk to its own salvation.

Hon. W. S. Fielding said it was unfortunate for the people that, whenever the Grand Trunk came before the Government was in a tremendous hurry. Now, the Government had discovered that it was paying for a railway it had not acquired.

Agree To Help.

Dr. Reid had spoken of the necessity of correcting two errors in the schedule to the act of last session.

"If that is all that is necessary," Mr. Fielding declared, "we can agree to help the Government to correct its mistakes." But if that was all, why should it have been necessary to open up the whole question again by asking Parliament to ratify the agreement. Such an action on the part of the Government gave rise to a suspicion—a suspicion that there was more behind the bill than the minister said.

There was a meeting of the Grand Trunk shareholders advertised for April 19. Why could the matter not come up then? It should not have been necessary to trouble Parliament in view of this announcement of that meeting already having been made in the Canada Gazette. Mr. Fielding said the agreement was not strictly in accordance with the act, despite the promises given to Parliament last session. Parliament had struck out a clause providing for loans by the Government to the board of management of the Grand Trunk. However, there was a provision in the agreement which was very similar to that clause in the bill. If correction of a couple of errors was all that was desired, there would be no difficulty in securing a unanimous vote.

Inspired By Suspicion.

Hon. J. C. Doherty thought there was a disposition to attach too much significance to this particular bill. It appeared to be inspired by the suspicion that there must be something behind apparently innocent explanation. In reference to the legality of the Grand Trunk shareholders' meeting, so long as Canada had decided to acquire the stock, it was important that there should be no question as to her title to that property. The bill now before the House would remove any doubt of irregularity.

Mr. Doherty declared that the particular shareholders, who claimed they had not been given sufficient notice, had no right to vote under the Grand Trunk provisions. They had not been given legal notice through an advertisement in the Canada Gazette.

Discovered E. Lists.

The minister of justice said it had been claimed that there was a divergence between the agreement and the clause in the agreement empowering the board of management to borrow money from the Government. The clause in the Grand Trunk acquisition bill, authorizing the Government to lend money to the board of management, had not been passed at the last session. The clause in the agreement was different. It authorized the board of management to borrow from the Government if the Government agreed to lend. There was no obligation on the Government to lend money to the board.

The former Government had indulged in railway building of dubious character, and he would like to ask the Liberal party which he had formerly supported, what had become of the \$88,000,000 over and above the cost of construction which had been spent in connection with the National Transcontinental project.

Grand Trunk Being Taken Over to be Handled by Mackenzie & Mann.

The motion for second reading was carried.

J. A. Robb (Huntingdon) asked if the committee of management was running the road, or the minister of railways, charging that W. P. Hinton of the Grand Trunk, according to railwaymen whose information was reliable, had been pushed out of control to make way for A. E. Warren of the Canadian National Railways.

Mr. Reid said the committee would be appointed as soon as the agreement was through the House. The report of Mr. Hinton being pushed out must have come from Mr. Hinton himself, or Mr. Kelly, president of the Grand Trunk. "So far as I am concerned, I am not trying to force out anybody, but what will happen is that when the Grand Trunk Pacific and Canadian National Railways are joined together they will have to be joined together and operated together at the earliest possible moment."

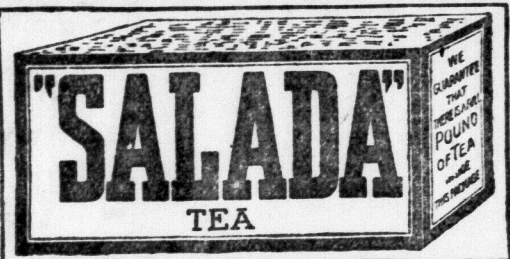
This was the only way to avoid loss, and Mr. Warren, being regarded as one of the ablest and youngest operating men in the Canadian railway world, would naturally be the man expected to take over the operation. He, the minister, would be sorry to see Mr. Hinton or anybody else leave the service, though he may have to retire from the management.

D. D. McKenzie wanted details of all the smaller roads acquired, saying: "There are 100 or more of them, but this is a start on getting the details in connection with the whole of them."

It is felt that the women, who make up 90 per cent of the buyers, can do a great deal to mould the future industrial standing of Canada.
