



Tenants in Gotham Draw Blanks in Moving Shuffle

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—All packed up and no place to go—that was the plight yesterday of hundreds of New York families who attempted to participate with some 100,000 of their fellows in the annual game of swapping apartments.

Many of them gave up their old homes and got as far as the front doors of apartments they expected to occupy before they found the prior occupants refused to get out. Others learned of their misfortune in time to avoid having their belongings piled on the sidewalk

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—All packed up and no place to go—that was the policy of the citics there by passing woe on to those who had counted on succeeding them.

But this was only one feature of an October 1 described by seasoned movers as the most chaotic in the history of the city. Other features, according to city officials, were:

There, were 69,797 families for whom there weren't any homes at all.

Even if there had been homes for all, there were but 2,500 moving vans available for the joint use of more than 100,000 would-be movers.





The Ottawa correspondent of the Financial Post, which paper is favorable to the present administration, points out that "Meighen failed to secure big cabinet men. It contains," continues the Post, "two or three men who might be put in the average class; but there is lacking any outstanding personality which would appeal to the country as a whole at a critical time like the present. It was hoped that Mr. Meighen would succeed in inducing some men of first-class business ability to strengthen his cabinet; but the big men of the business world in both parties seem very re luctant to enter politics."

The Post goes on with the suggestion that a number of outstanding men might be engaged in an advisory capacity, on the same plan that has been followed in Brit ain and United States.

This may work well in some cases but in others it simply adds to the deluge of commissions and of ordersin-council, and of legislation suggested or framed by men who have no mandate from the people.

The old idea of politics was that a Government set up its policy and was ready to stand or fall by it. There was something far more definite in that method than in the political merry-go-round on which


