

#### WHICH IS REPORTED IN FLAMES

Porte Fails to Carry Out Promises as to Dismissal of Guilty Officials.

Belgrade, Sept. 2.-An unconfirmed report is again published here that Adrianople is in flames.

Sofio, Sept. 2.—The Bulgarian agent at Uskub reports that notwithstanding the Porte's promises, on the occasion of the Russian demonstration in Iniada Bay, to dismiss 24 officials accused of malpractices by the Russian and Austrian consuls, only nine of them have been dismissed, while some of the others have been given higher posts. Constantinople, Sept. 2. - According to Government advices, Col. Jankoff, the insurgent leader, who, with a strong following is operating southwards of Demotyka, has been intrusted with the task of destroying the larger bridges of the railroad over the Maritza and Arda Rivers, so as to cut off communication with Adrianople from the south and delay the troops who are on their way to the threatened city. The Government believes it has taken measures which will bring about a speedy and, it is hoped, decisive battle with the insurgent forces commanded by Col. Jankoff. 
