The warrant charges that the men "did conspire with one another, and with another, by deceit and other fraudulent means, to defraud Gennard Gorrasi of the sum of \$2,300 in money, his property." Gorrasi lives here and paid the money in at the local office of the "bank" in July. It is said to have been sent to New York, but cannot be shown to have been sent further.

ployed by the consignors, the Pluto Powder Co., testified that the dynamite was properly manufactured. Superintendent Adams of the Michigan Central admitted that the car was not handled as it should have been, but he would not admit the explosion was due to that.

The jury were out 20 minutes before returning the verdict. Crown Attorney Rodd would not make a statement as to whether he would institute criminal proceedings or not.

The verdict against the railway company caused no surprise, particularly in view of the fact that claims agents of the Michigan Central have been on the ground ever since the explosion, quietly making what arrangements for settlement were possible with those whose property was destroyed or damaged. Claims amounting to over \$20,000 have already been settled in this way, and it is expected that practically a full settlement will be reached without recourse to the courts.

Wilkesbarra, Pa., Aug. 24.—Four of the miners who were Thursday caught in a cave-in in No. 14 tunnel of the Pennsylvania Coal Co., near here, are still entombed, and it is believed they are dead. The voice of James Boyle, one of the entombed men, was heard at 2 o'clock yesterday morning, but since then silence has reigned in the vicinity of the cave-in. Boyle's companions are Peter Flynn, John Koening and Joseph Koening. The cave-in was caused by a heavy fall of rock. Six men were entombed, but two of them crawled from under some of the debris after several hour's effort. Of these Michael Naghton was badly injured, but the other man escaped unhurt. Rescuing parties working in shifts labored all night to free the men still in the mine.

Steamer Imperial's Steering Gear Went Wrong.

Montreal, Aug. 24.—The steamer Imperial, belonging to the St. Lawrence Navigation Co., rammed and sank a barge yesterday afternoon in the St. Lawrence River. The Imperial was leaving for Quebec on her regular trip, and had just got nicely started when her steering gear went wrong and she headed at full speed for the dock. Her engines were reversed too late, and she crashed into the barge, which was unloading brick, and sank her. There were six people on board which was unloading brick, and sank her. There were six people on board the barge, but they escaped in time. The barge lies 35 feet under water, with 60,000 bricks on board. The Im-perial backed off and proceeded on her way to Quebee, as if nothing hap-pened.

Three Years for Forgery.

Tanner had been convicted before on a similar charge in the west, and spent two years, in the Regins Penitentiary, being let out on parole.

Hon. G. A. Cox's Views on New York Insurance Law.

Underwriters' Banquet Brings Convention to a Close-Senator Cox Says He Will Oppose Legislation for Canada Along New York Lines -Laws Should Not Be Too Drastic

—Laws Should Not Be Too Drastic
—Commission on Renewals.

Toronto, Aug. 24.—"It is immaterial, gentlemen, whether we live north or south of some imaginary border line, whether we be subjects of King Edward or citizens of the great republic, we will all of us, I know, most heartily follow the customs of our hosts and begin our proceedings tonight by a toast to the King."

Thus did Charles W. Scovell of Pittsburg, U. S. A., toastmaster at the National Underwriters' Association banquet, open the speechmaking last night. Fully 300 guests were assembled, principally delegates and their wives and daughters from the United States. They rose at once and joined in singing "God Save the King." They fell down, however, in an effort to sing the "Star Spangled Banner" when the President's health was next proposed. It is not usual te drink the President's health in his own country and few Americans ever attempt to sing their National Anthem.

Senator George W. Ross was to respond to the toast of Canada, but in his absence, owing to indisposition, Rev. Canon Cody responded. He greeted the underwriters as "propograndists of thrift." He admired thrift and opposed old-age pensions as calculated to destroy thrift. The canon briefly traced the history of Canada. The country had passed from the crown of France to the crown of Great Britain, and he believed that it was destined to remain permanently a British country. At the same time the Government was free and democratic Canada, if daughter in her mother's house was mistres in her own.

He gave an address on the topic "The Value of Life Insurance to the Country at Large," and began by admitting that insurance was one of the greatest factors for the upbuilding of a man's savings and the protection of his heirs.

Sale.

From time to time most interesting historical relics come before the public through the medium of the anctioneer. The latest example of this is Queen Mary's house in Jedburgh and some old tapestry which it has contained.

Jedburgh has many points of interesting old abbey, and some of the Jethart pear trees, which are believed to have stood from a period before the Reformation. According to Mr. James Tate, it has a strong castle at the highest part of the town, and some of the mansions were in the form of bastile houses, the defensive character being requisite as a protection against English invaders. Of these houses the most interesting specimen mow remaining is one in which Queen Mary lay sick for some time after her ride of fifty miles over moor and moss to visit Bothwell at Hermitage Castle, where he had been wounded by the banditti of Liddeedale. It is this house for which offers are being invited by Messrs. Romanes and Munro of Edinburgh.

The bed occupied by the queen at the time of her illness is now at Abbotsford, having been presented to Sir Walter Scott. There is a mass of corroborative evidence of the Queen's visit. In his "History of Scotland" Buchanan relates the incident commetted with Bothwell, as do many other authorities.

The tapestry which covered the walls of the room is said to have been worked by the court ladies while they waited for the recovery of their sowereign. a man's savings and the protection of his heirs.

"A Builder of Canada!" Thus it was that the toastmaster introduced Senator George A. Cox, who was greeted with cheers and a chorus proclaiming that "he was a jolly good fellow."

The Senator spoke of "fifty years of life insurance in Canada." He recalled with pride his hard work with the rate book as an insurance solicitor. In that capacity he believed that he had done more good for the country than in any other way, although he had been honored by many positions of power and trust. He had always a soft side for the men in the field. As a rule they were not paid enough. They were the men whe did the hard work and who brought in the money and they should get the lion's share of the profit.

The Senator advised the agents in making their contracts with the companies to stipulate for commissions on renewals. They counted far more than the initial commission. Personally he was still getting a commission on policies secured 46 years ago. The Senator denounced section 9 of the New York insurance code. They may try, he said, to pass a similar law in Canada. "Well, gentlemen, I promise you to fight such legislation in and out of Parliament. Any such law will certainly have one vote cast against it." Work of Half a Century.

Lady Baltimore Cake.

One cupful of butter, two of sugar, three and a half cupfuls of flour, one of sweet milk, the white of six eggs, two level teaspoonful of rosewater.

Butter and sugar gradually, beating continaodsly, adding the sugar as you go on, then the milk and the flavoring, next the flour, with which the baking powder has been sifted. Lastly, fold in lightly the stiffly beaten whites of the eggs with long, horizontal strokes of the beater; loaf and bake in three layer cake tins. The oven should be botter than for layer cake.

Filling.—Dissolves three cupfuls of granulated sugar in one of boiling water. Boil until the sirup "threads" and pour over the stiffened whites of three eggs, stirring constantly.

To this icing add a cupful of chopped raisins and the same of chopped nut meats—pecans are best—and five figs shred into thin strips. Ice the tops and sides of the cake with this after filling it between the layers.

Homemade Floor Polish.

A good floor polish of home manufacture can be made as follows: Cut up half a pound of beeswax finely, place in a pot and cover with turpentine. Let this stand on the stove until dissolved. Apply to the floor with a plece of flannel and thoroughly rub it in with a stiff brush.

THE FLOATING PIN.

Some Amusing Experiments With Bits of Metal and Water.

Let a drop of water fall upon glass

and it will spread, but a drop of mercury will not. This is because the water and the glass have an affinity for each other, so that the water wets the glass, but there is no affinity between mercury and glass. The same principle underlies a pretty experiment that may be made with water and a pin, Water will wet a pin, but not se

readily as it wets glass. Remembering this, we may make a pin, even a big one, float upon the surface of water. There are several ways of doing this, one of them being that shown in the accompanying illustration. Lay the



HOW TO PLOAT A PIN.

pin upon the prongs of a fork, and then, holding the fork at an angle of forty-five degrees, place it very gently upon the water, watching your opportunity to remove the support.

This may require a little practice

but you will soon be able to succeed, when you will see the water assume a convex form on each side of the pin, and as soon as the pin has replaced enough of the water to counterbalance its weight it will float like a little boat.

This experiment may be made with a needle, as well as a pin, it being necessary only to place it upon the water so carefully that the water cannot wet it. That may sound like an inconsistency, but it is possible, nevertheless, to so lay the pin or the needle upon the water that it shall not be

nade wet. nade wet.

If you find the experiment with the If you find the experiment with the fork only partially successful, try this simpler method: Lay a sheet of cigarette paper evenly upon the water, and upon the paper place a needle or a pin. As soon as the paper gets wet through it will sink below the surface, leaving the needle or the pin floating. By using great care you might perhaps succeed after awhile in floating a dimeor a gold dollar in the same way.

#### CANADA A HOAY

Dissatisfied Immigrant Relates His Experiences Out West.

Experiences Out West.

A resident of Huntingdonshire who came to Canada intending to settle, but returned to the Old Land dissatisfied, thus describes the Dominion: The country, he says, is "a hoax," and civilized people cannot live in it, at all events with comfort. Our friend relates his sad experiences. He traveled by colonist train as far west as Calgary, and found the journey long. The train proceeded by night as well as by day, and the sleeping accommodation in the cars was not first-class, owing to the growd and the absence of pillows and mattresses. Food was purchased at way stations and was dear—fivepence for an apple, two-pence half-penny for an orange, and the same por ter a box of matches.

two-pence half-penny for an orange, and the same per a box of matches.

At Calgary everything was wrong. There was no city employment to be had, and for laboring work elsewhere the pay offered war but \$18 a month, with all found. The homesteads are terrible places. The settler occupies a shack, a rough wooden structure, and his furnitune is rude and primitive. He lives on plain food, and often goes for days without a shave. In fact he is a worn-out and listless looking fellow, who has perforce to revert to a condition of life akin to that of the sarage. "I tell you," adds the critic of Canada, "there is not one man in a hundred who, like myself, goes out in entire ignorance of Canadian farming and gets on. He may tell you he does, in his letters, but that is due to his British pride." There is a disposition on the part of friends of Canada in England to attack this dissatisfied visitor, who returned by the next ship. But this attitude is scarcely fair, The fact is the wrong man went to the wrong place. We are not all built on the same plans, and persons who are educated for city life are not likely to find happiness on the homestead in its pioneer days. What this writer proves is that there must be care in the selection of settlers. Instead of inducing city people, or persons brought up without any knowledge of agricul-

is that there must be care in the selection of settlers. Instead of inducing city people, or persons brought up without any knowledge of agriculture; to emigrate, the Government must bend its efforts to the introduction of farmers or farm laborers with a little money to pull them through the preliminary difficulties. To such, life in a shack is no drawback, while the accompanying hardships, seeing that they point to something good in the future, are not matters of serious complaint.

All pioneer work is accompanied by drawbacks of the kind referred to, but these can be avoided if the settler has sufficient money with which to begin operations in better style. If the money is not at hand, it may be saved by "roughing it" for a few years. There can be no doubt that the newly-arrived western settler, if not well provided with means, has to put up with many things that are irksome. But his lot after all is smooth compared to that of the pioneer in older Canada who had to clear his land of trees and stumps before he could plant his corn. That the position of the settler calls for patience under difficulties, and for a readiness to bear hardships, there can be no question, but these qualities, thus invested, bear good fruit, as the many successes achieved on the prairies abundantly prove.

Ranchers and prospectors along the boundary have gone into the hills of Southern British Columbia to roundup several bands of wild horses which the Legislative Assembly of the province have branded as pirates, authorizing any one to shoot or capture them at stated periods of the year, after notifying horse owners so that tame animals may be claimed. Range riders say there are more than 2,000 wild animals in the bands.

The nucleus of the herd was formed in the fifties, veteran horsemen say, when explorers and prospectors rode on horseback from eastern to southern States. Many pioneers perished in the search for gold, but their horses survived. Round-Up Wild Horses.

The horses seen in the hills along the border little resemble the stock from which they sprang. They are long-haired, savage creatures, and show speed that would cause a sensation on a race course. They weigh not more than seven hundred pounds, all bone, muscle and sinew.

The ranchers have declared was against the pirates as a means of protecting their own animals which are frequently lured into the hills.

And then, on the very ragged edge of eternity, I came to a blessed full stop. I do not remember how I crawled back to life and sound ground, but I was dripping with perspiration, as if I had just come out of the hottest room in a Turkish bath.
