The outcome was that the British Columbia Southern railway withdrew its bill which, if adopted, would have confirmed its title to the water o these creeks. everal Cases Among Miners-160 Have Been Exposed to Contagion

Phoenix, B. C., March 19 .- (Special.) Disease, diagnosed to be varioloid or mild form of smallpox, has broken out in the Gramby bunkhouse, there being several cases. It is said to have been found first on a man named Pope, who came trom pokane about a month ago.

Dr. R. W. Jakes, provincial health fficer for the Boundary, has quarantine the building in which the cases were first discovered and is doing everything posible to prevent its spread. There about 160 men sleeping in the Granby bunkhouse. There is no varioloid what ever within the limits of the corporation of the city of Phoenix, the mine buildings being on the outside. The city coun cil is active, however, and with the city health officer, Dr. Gordon, is taking steps to prevent the spread of the disease. The ases thus far are of the mildest type. and it is not believed there will be any serious consequences.
