To Commit Suicide Was Made This Morning By Captain William Thorburn.

The proportion of fine levied in cases originating out side the city is very smail-in deed, amouy there in the ing. Why, therefore, in the event of the organization of a municipality, this reven ae should be considered "territorial reve nue," is difficult to grasp.
Doubtless. the incorporation idea, as held by Gov. Ogilvie and tho Souncil, has its good points but they all point in one direc tion.
