GENERAL NEWS SUMMARY. There are eight Scott Act offenders in gaol at London. The water was let out of the Lacaine Canal on the 30th ult. The ocean shipping at the port of Montreal shows an increase over last year of 61,074 tons. Supporters of the Scott Act in Renfrew are raising \$1,000 to resist the repeal movement. The strained relations between Germany and Russia continue. The Russian press is very bitter against Germany.

A Washington despatch says that the Fisheries Commissioners are making very slow progress in their negotiations. There were great rejoicings in Sault Ste Marie on the 1st inst. in honor of the completion of the Sault Branch of the C. P. R. The Salvation Army is about to open a training home in Montreal, where officers will be trained for work among the French Canadians.

Commanders of French army corps have received sealed instructions as to their course in the event of a political outbreak over the Presidential election. The first Christian church in the Congo Free State was organized less than a year ago. There are to-day 1,062 converts in the Congo Mission. The Salvation Army of England sent fifty missionaries at once to India. Twenty-five dollars is all that is allotted to each one for support after arrival on the field.

Notwithstanding the strongest police surveillance, United Ireland and other papers which print reports of suppressed branches of the National League are freely circulated. Mr. John F. Wood, M. P., Mr. Jas. Hall, of the Ontario Glove Works, and Mr. C. Jones, contractor, all of Brockville, have started on a trip to British Honduras. Miss Jones accompanies the party.

Henry B. Saven, President of the Panama Canal Dredging Company, says the canal is more than half done, that the ridge will be temporarily overcome by means of locks, and that there is \$35,000,000 in the treasury to complete the work. On Thursday, President Gey made an attempt to back out of the position he had taken, being encouraged by some popular demonstrations in his favor. Votes of the Chambers soon undid him, and he authorized the announcement of his resignation.

In all there have been ninety three Scott Act contests throughout the Dominion. Of these seventy-two were won by the friends of Temperance. There have been nine attempts to repeal the Act, and all were unsuccessful. The net majority for the Act is now fifty thousand. The election on the 1st inst. in the Dulwich division of Camberwell, an English Conservative stronghold, resulted in a considerable cutting down of the Conservative majority. The Gladstonians are satisfied with the result, as showing the popular growth of Liberal principles.

There promises to be a lively competition here and at Lyndhurst on the 23rd and 24th insts., between the rival poultry buyers, Arnold & Berney, and Brown & Co. have already advertised to be at Lyndhurst on the 23rd and some eight or ten of the old buyers at the same place on the following day.
