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Town Council.

WINDING UP MEETING OF OLD AND FIRST MEETING OF NEW COUNCIL. As is customary at the regular time of holding the February meeting of the Council the old Board convened at the appointed time for the winding up of the affairs under their jurisdiction.

The Finance Committee presented the report for the month showing expenditures \$1992.67 and receipts \$905.07. The credit bank balance Jan. 31st was \$145.66.

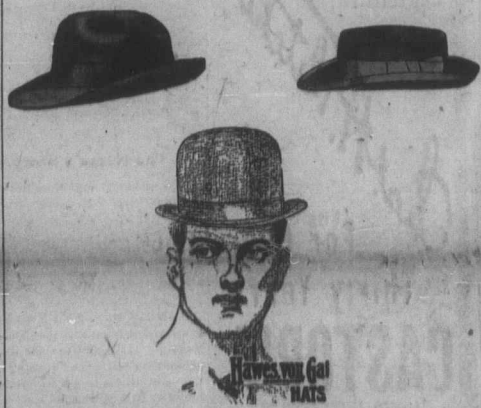

Brilliant Literary Career of Dr. Benjamin Rand.

Dr. Benjamin Rand's literary career at Harvard University for the past twenty years has been so brilliant that it has reflected great credit upon his native province. The extended account of his career printed in THE HERALD some months ago, showed that he had accomplished more as an educationist than any other student that has attended that famous university from the maritime provinces, and that he had permanently placed himself on record as a noted literary scholar by the many works he has already published.

Schooner Ashore.

The Man on the Street.

Appropos your remarks of last week regarding Wolfville's method of electing a mayor in past years I am rejoiced that on one occasion, at least, the wise course you suggest was not followed. The best man the town ever had to occupy the position was foolishly turned down, because he had the timidity to suggest to the citizens who he would like to have to assist him at the council board when an important work was to be undertaken. The people paid dearly, however, for this little exhibition of childishness, and learned a lesson probably. Experience is often an expensive teacher, but a good one nevertheless.

There is one position in the appointment of the town council that has figured large in our civic elections since it was created a few years ago. Not very important in itself, as a factor in our municipal contests it fills altogether too much place. One has but to watch carefully to note how the strings are being pulled. It would often appear that the whole point at issue was to whom this position, which is necessarily confined to a limited number of applicants, should be given. This state of affairs should not be allowed to continue. The best qualified man should always be selected for any position in the service of the town, no matter who are elected to the council. This suggestion is made in perfect good faith and wholly in the interests of the good government of the town.

The 'man on the street' has, through THE ACADIAN, received a courteous note from Mayor Black concerning the reference made to him last week. I am very grateful to him for the interest shown, and will be glad to have suggestions from his worship or any other citizen at any time. In the present instance I would say that the paragraph was not written for the purpose of criticizing the Mayor and reference was only incidentally made to his letter. My real object was merely to point out what in my opinion is the most serious need of our town, and since Mayor Black acknowledged my diagnosis it would not be the correct one who will not quarrel over what he wrote to the Herald.

The 'man on the street' has been hearing a great deal during the past few weeks about the amount of intoxicating liquor that has been imported into our town. It is said that during the past three months an unusually large amount has been imported. Some have come to Wolfville station and a still greater amount to Grand Pre. The present law is strictly against such practices, and it is up to the town authorities to look carefully into the matter. We have an energetic Scott Act inspector, who, if properly supported, would no doubt do efficient work. The Mayor and council may be assured that they will have the respect and sympathy of the best of our citizens in their endeavors to enforce the law. Let it be understood that no matter at what cost Wolfville people are not going to stand for law breaking and drunkenness.

While on the matter of lawlessness the 'man on the street' must not omit to refer to the disorderly conduct on our streets on Sunday evenings. Surely the 'city fathers,' as well as ordinary citizens, must have noticed this with regret. Now, gentlemen, for a remedy. It may be impossible for one policeman to grapple successfully with this difficulty, but I believe one lesson, properly applied, would be sufficient to put a stop to this nuisance. Possibly the boys who congregate in groups on the sidewalks and indulge in vile language while citizens are on their way home from church do not realize that they are doing anything out of the way. If so it is time they were taught better.

To the 'Man on the Street.'

Sir—We were greatly interested in your last week's comments. They might have been stronger and fuller. For instance, you did not refer to the coming week of prayer of that goodly society the W. C. T. U. During all this week they have been meeting daily in Temperance Hall for edification and prayer—a most praiseworthy, faithful, thoughtful series of exercises, but we would have suggested, I think, that you should have suggested to this excellent body of ladies, that they devote at least one hour of the time, set apart for prayer, in making stockings, socks, dresses, pants, skirts and warm underwear, mitts, caps, etc., for the large number of poor little children in town who are awfully in need of these articles of wear at this season of year. Also to outline a prompt scheme for providing relief for the hardy, hardy pressed mothers. Do these good ladies know that in our county there are many children not half clothed, many mothers nearly dead because they know that their dear ones are dying for the need of clothes, food, fuel. Do these dear W. C. T. U. ladies know that there is great and crying need even on Main street within our town. Many of us have seen clothing, good food, warm coats, but Mr. 'man on the street' why don't you bring to the notice of our citizens, if the ladies will not, the fact that dozens within this town are deprived, by poverty, of enjoying even sufficient comfort to keep death from the doors.

If the Mayor does not know of the facts related, he should. If the W. C. T. U. does not know of the facts they should. Drop some of the exercises that don't cost a cent and get down and do something that costs a little pride, dignity and less chattering. Our good God will be more likely to help and answer prayer after these things have been attended to.

I. S. Brown, '10, who has been ill at his home in Havelock, Digby county, for the past fortnight, returned to Wolfville on Wednesday.

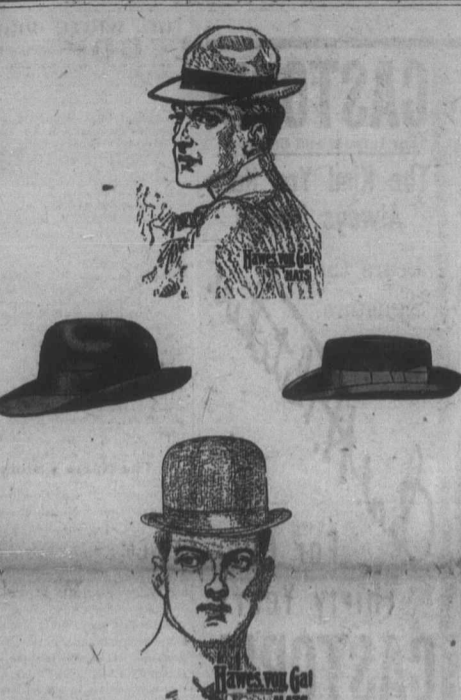
The lecture committee is endeavoring to get a good public speaker here some time in the near future.
