#### Canada's Far North

Interesting Lecture Given by Inspector La Nauze of the R. M. C. P.

That was an interesting tale told a the Opera House last Friday afternoon by Inspector LaNauze, of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. The lecture was given under the auspices of the I. O. D. E. and was presided over by Rev. MacDonald, who introduced the speaker in a few well chosen remarks.

The Inspector, in a conversational way, described how in 1915 it was ereported at their headquarters in Regina that two Roman Catholic priests were missing in the Far North country, and the Bishop was anxious as to their safety. At twenty-four hours' notice the little exedition was formed and set out, Captain White, a corporal, one interpreter, and whole story as unfolded step by step as the photographic panorama of places, people and events passed on the screen, particularly when at last success crowned their efforts, and the great white chief's long arm of justice had reached the guilty Eskimos two years after the perpetration

of the outrage.

Not less interesting and instructive, too. were the various exhibits of the Eskimo primitive culinary aad sporting utensils and methods of living. They were de scribed as extremely hospitable people, especially kind to their children and to animals, subsisting entirely upon their own resources and not knowing enough

The children especially had a good time, and will thank the Daughters of the Empire for their thoughtful consideration of them. Rev. R. F. Dixon, in his characterway, moved, and Principal Ford seconded, the vote of thanks, which was given standing to Inspector LaNauze, and the College band, which rendered a number of selections outside the Opera House before the lecture and opened th program with "O, Canada," and closed the proceedings with the rendition of the National Anthem.

#### Notice

The By-laws of the Wolfville Electric Commission, as approved by the Pro-vincial Legislature of Nova Scotia, have been printed in pamphlet form, and those interested can now secure copies by apply ing at the Town Office

It will be noticed that these By-laws require that application shall be made, and permit secured, for any electric wiring, whether new work, extensions, or repairs, to be done within the Town of Wolfville. Forms of application for such permits can be secured by property owners recuiring electrical work done on their own premises, and by Electrical Contrac tors, at the Town Office. Permits will be issued for all properly filled in applications. unless the Commission find good and sufficient reason for refusing.

Also, by these By-laws, the Electrical Superintendent employed by the Com-mission is appointed Electrical Inspector for and in the interests of the Town of Wolfville. His services are free within the town, in all cases regularly requiring an inspector; but, if cases become frequent wherein improperly executed work ne cessitates more than one trip of inspection provision will be made for a charge for each trip of inspection necessitated after the first regular inspection. The regulations of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, which is the standard of the Nova Scotia Board of Fire Under writers, is the standard for the town of Wolfville, and all new work must strictly comply with them before being passed by



#### APPLE ADVERTISING

The following resume of an address de livered to New York apple growers will be read with interest here, particularly as the same general principles apply to

"You apple growers furnish one of the most striking examples in this country of intelligent men failing to make use of the one thing that could turn disaster into success.," George A. Cullen, vice-George A. Cullen, vicepresident of the North American Fruit Exchange, said a few days ago at a meeting of the New York Agricultural Society, at

"Why do California growers success fully invest \$750,000 in advertising to create an appetite for the citrus fruits, while New York growers invest practically not a cent to create an appet to for som of the fin st fru t produced on face of the ea th?

"Think of the Pacific Coast raising rowers investing \$500,000 a year in advertising, and the prune growers \$350,000, while the New York State farmers apparently try to keep it a secret that they produce the finest of seed potatoes maple syrup.

"There is a further and exceedingly important use for advertising by the grower. That is in constantly keeping the customer informed when his pro-ducts are available, or to be available, when they are abundant an when they are or should be relatively cheap at retail. This has real practical value in stimulating

consumption.
"Why then does not the grower keep his public informed daily of the sta e of the market? Why should the department stores use about one-third of the space in each day's papers to tell their public about their goods, while the grower leaves it to some Gov rnment agency or other belated crop report source to print the market quotations on perishable goods (of all things!) in some obscure corner of one page.

#### FIRST POSTAGE STAMP

April 23rd last was the seventieth anniversary of Canada's first postage stamp, designed by Sir Sanford Flemming and bearing the picture of the beaver was first put on sale for the benefit of Canadian letter writers on April 23rd, 1851. The first issue of Canadian stamps were this three-penny, a six penny with the Prince Consort's picture on it, and a twelve-penny bearing a portrait of Queen Victoria. The six-penny was put on sale in May, 1851, and the twelve-penny in June, of the same year. Only 1,500 copies of the latter stamp were put on sale at Post Offices, though the Government received over fifty thousand copies from the printers. Where the rest went to no one seems to know. The twelve-penny is Canada's scarcest stamp, good copies of it now selling at from four to five hundred



#### THE CITY MANAGER

The "city manager" idea in municipal administration has been given considerable thought in the past few years. It has been adopted by more than one hundred and fifty cities in the United States, and the general plan, with some variations, has been put into effect in a number of

Canadian Finance, a journal devoted to financial and public affairs, in an article headed "Are You Interested in The Reduction of Taxes?" review the history and results of the city manager plan on this continent; its conclusion is that this method of administration is an economical and efficient system of handling civic affairs for both large and small cities.
"The proof of the pudding," declares
Canadian Finance, "is in the eating thereof, and our American cousins have eaten enough of this particular pudding to know what it tastes like." Mr. H. S. Gilbertson, a well known ex-

ert on municipal affairs, writing in the Montreal Star on this subject describes what he calls "the Dayton way of city efficiency" as follows:

1. THE PEOPLE elect on a non-

2. THE COUNCIL, a representative body of citizens, usually five or seven in number, who serve without pay, or for merely nominal salaries, and give simply the time needed for council meetings. They hire, and have the power at any

3. CITY MANAGER, a non-political sub-executive, who is their agent and subordinate and who appoints and super-

DEPARTMENT HEADS, who in turn appoint and supervi

THE RANK AND FILE of the municipal administration, under the usual Civil Service rules.

Mr. Gilbertson adds that business men will be quick to see its likeness to a cor-

"It is the only way to organize anything, whether it be an afternoon picnic or a great industry. The feature of the plan is its straightforward simplicity. No lines criss-cross. Responsibility is clearcut and undivided."

The Calgary Herald, commenting on the city manager plan, says: "There are still some citizens who think that a city's business cannot be administered by a skeleton organization similar to that of a large industrial corporation. On the other hand, there is a growing conviction that the municipal methods so generally accepted in the past can be improved upon, with results which will prove highly satisfactory to the taxpayers.




