Sir Robert Bond Favors Royal Commission.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Sir,—I have read your editorial in the Evening Telegram of date March 10th, 1911, suggesting that in view of my criticism of the Crown Lands Amendment Bill, now under the consideration of the House of Assembly, that a ROYAL COMMISSION should be appointed to enquire on oath into the whole business of the grant of Timber and Pulp Licenses with a view to discover all the facts concerning them, and the parties interested in the relief sought and facilities to be afforded by the proposed changes in the laws. This course I endorse fully. I have also read the editorial that appeared in the Evening Chronicle this evening, in which the editor said:—

"The Bondite newspapers have featured Sir Robert Bond's speech in the Assembly on Thursday last in criticisms of the amendments proposed to the Crown Lands Act, and have made the speech a basis for charges that the public heritage is being despoiled. The Telegram has, indeed, gone so far as to urge last night that a Royal Commission be appointed to take evidence on oath into the whole matter."

"We think the proposal one that is unobjectionable, provided the scope of the inquiry is extended to include the past ten years—in other words, the whole period since the passage of the 1901 contract, when 2,500,000 acres of land belonging to this Colony were taken back from Contractor Reid and he was paid the sum of \$650,000 therefor, which lands, it was charged subsequently, were then handed over to party supporters to speculate in."

"Charges are now being made against supporters of the Morris party, just as similar charges were made then against men connected with the Bond party. There may or there may not be any truth in them now, and there may or may not have been truth in them then, but we submit that the proper way to deal with the question is to have the whole of the operations of the Crown Lands

Department for the past ten years thoroughly probed. If Sir Robert Bond and his supporters are prepared to accept this suggestion, we see no reason why the Government should not adopt it. If the Bond party is so sure of itself that it is prepared to agree to this, then it will readily be admitted that the Telegram's proposal is made solely in the public interest. If the Bond party is not prepared to adopt this proposal, then the inevitable proposal must be that the call for a Royal Commission is simply a political war-cry. If the hands of the Bondite supporters are clean they should welcome this proposition, for they can suffer no harm from it."

"It will be interesting to see how this suggestion is received by the Opposition press, and pending that, we shall refrain from further comment to-day."

I assume that this statement was authorized by the Government, and I take the earliest opportunity afforded me of stating on behalf of myself and those associated with me that we court by a Royal Commission, impartially and therefore impartially appointed, the fullest inquiry, unrestricted in scope and untrammelled by artificial rules of evidence, not alone into the conduct of the Department of Agriculture and Mines, but into the conduct of every other department of my Government and the whole of my administration, without any restrictions whatever, from the time I took over the administration in 1900 until I handed it over to my successor in 1909.

I consider that this inquiry into the conduct of my administration has nothing to do with the investigation upon which you suggested a Royal Commission should engage, but I do not wish in any way to limit its scope, and I challenge the Government to an acceptance of a similar investigation, conducted by a Royal Commission constituted and unfettered as I have already mentioned.

Royal Commission.

We draw the attention of our readers to the letter of Sir Robert Bond which we publish in this issue. In it he endorses the suggestion we made that a Royal Commission be sought to inquire on oath into the whole matter of the granting of timber and pulp licenses by the present Government, the beneficiaries of the grants, and the persons affected by relief proposed to be granted by the amending bill now before the Assembly. He quotes the editorial of the Evening Chronicle of Saturday last and unequivocally accepts the suggestion that the scope be extended to 1900; and indeed goes further and courts inquiry into every act of every department and every act of the administration with which the latter was connected since 1900.

On Friday we advisedly suggested a Royal Commission, so that the appointment could be made by the Imperial authorities, and that its constitution, proceedings and finding would be absolutely impartial. We have now done our part in the premises and it is for the Government and the Legislature to take action on the matter. The acceptance of this course by the Government will of course mean the withdrawal of the Crown Lands Bill for the present session.

Terrible Weather on the Labrador.

Baine Johnston & Co. to-day had news from Mr. Lewis, their agent at Labrador. Up to the 1st February the weather was terrible. Snow storms were incessant, there were great falls of snow and the frost was terrible, the thermometer registering from 25 to 32 below zero. Furs are very plentiful owing to so much snow, but the Indian dogs suffered very much from the same cause and many of them died from starvation. All the harbors are covered with several feet of ice and the winter has been the most severe for many years.

The Ships Sailed.

Trough up to noon to-day no news had been received of the sailing of the wooden fleet of ships from Pool's Island, Westville and Greenspond, there cannot be any doubt but that they got away on time at 8 a.m. to-day, as the north side of Bonavista Bay is clear and the ships should not have much difficulty in getting out. The big ships—Florizel, Adventure, Bellaventure, Bonaventure and Beothic leave here at 6 p.m. for the fishery and we wish them a safe and speedy return with full fares of harps and hoods.

Train Notes.

The west bound express left Bishop's Falls at 9.30 a.m. to-day.

The Carboner train arrived here via Brigus at 12.40 p.m.

A freight special from the west is due at St. John's at 6 p.m.

EAGLE'S GOOD WORK.—The s.s. Eagle arrived at Westville at noon on Saturday and was the first ship to get down. She left two hours after the Neptune and Newfoundland.

BROUGHT TO ASYLUM.—Miss Pearce, of Heart's Content, arrived here by the express from Boston last evening, and was taken to the Insane Asylum. Two nurses accompanied her here.

GOING TO SEALFISHERY.—Mr. Theo. Fitzgerald, of Marshall Brook, dry goods store, is going to the sealfishery as an ordinary hand in the S. S. Beothic this evening. He is dressed as a sealer and looks the part.

BUYING COOPERS' PACKAGES.—It is rumoured that a local company has been formed to buy up all the fish packages made by the city coopers the past winter. They will keep up the business permanently.

BITTEN BY A DOG.—David Donnelly was bitten by a dog belonging to Martin's, of Casey Street, Saturday evening, when passing that way. The dog flew out and bit him in the leg. He is agitating to have the animal shot.

HAD HANDS CUT.—One of the sanitary men named Ivany had his hands badly cut to-day near Rawlin's Cross. He was taken to Dr. Macpherson's surgery and then driven home by Const. Furlong.

STILL POORLY.—Mr. Frank Baxton, dockmaster, who was taken ill Saturday, is still poorly and will not be able to get out for a long time.

SURVEYORS RETURNED.—Mr. Joyce and his party who were surveying the branch line of railway to Trepassay, arrived here by the Prospero yesterday. Some boarded the ship at Trepassay and others at Fernside.

BEOTHIC READY.—The Beothic replenished her bunkers at Morey & Co's. to-day and then halted down off Job's to be ready to make a run for the Narrows at 6 p.m. Capt. C. W. Green goes in the ship as navigating officer, and a capable man he is, having been in the Arctic several times with Capt. Bernier.

Marine Notes.

The barque Cordelia arrived at Barbadoes Saturday from Pernambuco to load molasses for Bowring Bros.

The Nellie Louise arrived at Pernambuco Saturday after a run of 37 days.

The s.s. Rossland sails Wednesday for Halifax and New York, taking several passengers.

Rev. Dr. Whelan, of Bay Roberts, arrived in town to-day's train.

Reward for Officers.

The capture of the man Thos. Evans who committed such a series of larcenies was important as the man being a quiet laborer he would not be suspected and might have gone unwhipt of justice for a lengthy period. The breaking of the window in the Bank of Montreal a few months ago led to his capture. The officers who took part in his capture were recently rewarded for the act out of the Police Award Fund. Head Const. Peat received \$10, and a first class favourable record; Const. Power, who actually captured the man was given \$5, and Const. Alex. Tucker received \$5. The fund is made up of amounts received from members of the force as fines for breach of discipline, etc., but so good is the morale of the force that the fund has now reached a very low status a matter upon which Inspector General Sullivan is to be congratulated.

The Western Fishery.

Up to the time the Prospero left there the fleet fishing off Rose Blanche did nothing extra as the weather all along has been very stormy. Capt. Fitzpatrick says that codfish is very plentiful on the grounds, and as the weather has been fine since Wednesday last, good work must have been done. All hands are well supplied with herring bait which is plentiful in Fortune Bay especially at Miller's Passage, St. Breton and Long Hr. This is the beginning of the big schools of spring herring which annually strike the shore about the 15th March. Ten days ago the banker Grace Tibbo was reported with 200 qts. fish. Several vessels have no fish but there is plenty of time to secure good trips within the next 30 days. Tuesday last the shore boats had from 50 to 75 qts.

Death of Mr. Maidment

Word was received from Trinity this morning of the death of Mr. E.H. Maidment, the well-known shoe-maker of that place, which occurred suddenly yesterday afternoon. Mr. Maidment for the past few years had not been enjoying good health but no one anticipated that his end was so near. He was well and favourably known both in the city and the district of Trinity, and the news of his death will be received with deep regret by all who knew him. A widow, three daughters and four sons, are left to mourn the loss of a kind husband and father. In the expression of sympathy to the bereaved family the Telegram sincerely joins.

Schooner Seen Caught in the Ice

Supposed to be Missing Vessel Ella M. Goodwin of Gloucester.

Curling, Nfld., March 6.—A fishing vessel, now thought to have been the missing schooner Ella M. Goodwin, was sighted in the ice off Bay of Islands several days ago after the Gloucester fishing fleet sailed for home, January 21 last. At that time the ice-bound craft was believed to be either the Aloha or the Bohemia, but as both of these vessels have reached port and the Goodwin is the only missing craft, the vessel is now believed by Newfoundland fishermen to have been the Goodwin. The ice in which the vessel was imprisoned was taken off the shore on the night of February 6, before a short northeast breeze. The Gulf of St. Lawrence is blocked with the heaviest kind of ice, and if the Goodwin is in its grip she will probably not be free before the middle of April. There are plenty of provisions on board and the cargo of fresh herring will afford the crew a constant, if somewhat tedious, food supply.

The schooner is commanded by Capt. Jas. D. Goodwin, a native of Publico, and the first mate is Capt. Louis Devine, a native of Barrington, N.S. The others on board when she left Gloucester, November 6, were John L. Nicholson, cook, a native of Publico; Thos. Prior, of Bremen, Me.; Albert Blair, Lunenburg, N.S.; Oscar Larkin, Publico; Nat. Quinlan, Cape Island, N.S.; Alexander Tarr, Liverpool, N.S.; Joseph Bree and Jos. Reed, Newfoundlanders.—Quebec Chronicle, March 7th, 1911.

Pantchenko admitted that he made a business of killing for hire, his rivals in love, insistent creditors, and in fact any undesirable person whose enemy was prepared to pay liberally for his sudden taking off. The poison doctor, according to the police, has admitted forty deaths, his fee running as high as \$250,000 for a single assassination. His usual method was to inoculate the patient with cholera bacilli, after he had been called to the bedside in his professional capacity.

The decision has been reached that the ceremonial in India must not be treated as a re-crowning of the King, who will have already been consecrated at Westminster, but as a separate crowning as Emperor of India.



At R. C. Cathedral.

His Grace Archbishop Howley, who returned from Canada by the S. S. Rosalind, last Saturday evening, occupied the pulpit at the Cathedral last night.

His Grace who, by the way, is looking well after his trip, preached an instructive sermon on the Lenten season. The gospel read at all the Masses yesterday, St. Matt. 17 chap. 1st to 5th verse inclusive, relating to the Transfiguration of our Divine Lord on Mount Thabor. His Grace explained why the Church has selected the 17th chap. of St. Matt. for the liturgy of the second Sunday of Lent. The explanation will be found in verse 21 wherein Our Divine Lord said: "This kind goeth not out but by prayer and fasting." The fast was not so vigorous now as in the early days of Christianity. The Church was a benign Mother and regulated the Lenten fast to suit the weakness of men, as in the early days of the Church conditions were different, and the people living in cold climates, and sickness been prevalent in the cold winter season were circumstances that the Church took into consideration and as a result the fasting regulations were mitigated.

His Grace exhorted the congregation to compensate for this as much as possible by giving alms, attending the Church services and having daily evening prayers in the homes, and above all by preparing for a worthy reception of the Sacraments of Penance and Holy Eucharist before the Lenten season expired.

The Fast Suspended.

Yesterday it was announced at the Masses in St. Patrick's Church and the R. C. Cathedral that by a special indulgent of the Holy See the use of flesh would be permitted on Friday, St. Patrick's Day. Owing to the severity of the weather and the sickness prevailing in the city, by a special dispensation of His Grace the Archbishop the Lenten fast for the rest of the season has been remitted, though of course those who wish to fast can do so and obtain the spiritual benefits which such self denial must bring. The faithful were exhorted to perform the acts of devotion which are inseparable from the Lenten season.

Smallpox at Western Bay.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Mr. Editor,—Will you kindly allow me a little space in your paper in relation to the smallpox at Western Bay. The exaggerated reports that are circulated by the press are detrimental to the interests of our people that have to go away to seek bread for their families. Western Bay is divided into five sections—Bradley's Cove has a population of less than 200 and has had no case and no house quarantined; South Side with upwards of 400 people has had no case and no house quarantined; Newtown, 240 people, no case; Inveread, 200 people and a solitary case of a child; North Side, sparsely populated for more than a mile, with say 350 people and eight houses infected, all doing well; Ochoe Pit Cove, 254 people, about three miles from Western Bay proper, has eight infected houses, more or less, and all mostly convalescent.

Nor, sir, if British law is the law for the Colonies, where they do not legislate otherwise, why should we not have the British law of compulsory vaccination enforced throughout our Colony? Is not the Government the natural custodian of the people's health and of the people's revenue?

In Great Britain all children are vaccinated within four months from their birth. Are we not pursuing "a penny wise and pound foolish" policy? When smallpox makes its appearance in a community a doctor is sent around. We are told, at a cost of \$10.00 per day. He vaccinates some and others refuse to have his gratuitous services. Now if we had a compulsory law, an average parish would only cost from \$10 to \$20 per year, i.e. at 50 cents per capita, and in a few years everybody would have passed through the process, say, before the age of six months owing to our severe climate. Does the Government or the health authorities want more warnings? Last year it visited Freshwater, Salmon Cove, Broad Cove and Adam's Cove. It was stamped out of those places at tremendous cost to the Government and loss to the people. The physicians, the constables and those who attended flagged houses are not going to complain, but it is a different matter when churches have to close, and the schools shut up at a time of the year when the older scholars can attend, and to be handicapped in the forthcoming elections.

And when it comes we are told the prevention is vaccination, and that it has practically stamped it out of Britain and the European countries. From an economic standpoint the country and people would benefit. The children are not such great sufferers, while some of our grown-up people are laid up for two and three months, either from their physical condition, or the nature of the vaccine or other causes.

This matter, taken from every standpoint of common sense, merits the consideration of the House of Assembly now in session, and they are in duty bound, we think, to make some provision and a strong pronouncement on the question of compulsory vaccination, and to strengthen the hands of the Boards of Health, the physicians and all interested, in the physical well-being of every community throughout our Island Home.

At St. Thomas's.

Rev. G. R. Godden, M.A., senior curate, preached at the morning service in St. Thomas's Church yesterday on the words from Heb. 3: 12: "Who was faithful to him that appointed him." Gamblers Were Being Cheated.

Police Find Devices Were Arranged So Players Could Not Win.
New York, Feb. 25.—What William J. Flynn, Second Deputy Police Commissioner, described last night as the most complete dishonest gambling equipment that has ever fallen into the hands of the police was seized yesterday in a raid in West Forty-fifth street, between Broadway and Sixth avenue.

The raid was made in the course of Captain Flynn's crusade against professional gamblers and was led by him in person. Sixty men who were in the place when the police entered gave way to loud expressions of rage and disgust when the roulette tables and other devices were disconnected from electric wires by which it had been possible for dealers to control them.

The examination of the roulette tables showed that many of the metal frets separating the numbers on the wheels were of lead instead of steel and that the ball grooves were equipped with needle points which dealers could project into the grooves by pressing buttons under the tables. It was evident that the needles had been used to deflect the roulette balls out of their grooves. According to the police lead frets instead of steel ones are common on "crooked" gambling wheels. A ball striking a series of lead frets "falls dead," instead of bouncing from number to number.

Several Faro boxes seized in the raid were "stacked" with cards so fixed that they would come out in favor of the establishment. Few of the men who were in the house when the police entered attempted to escape. Most of them declared they had lost all the money they had brought there and they showed profound interest as the policemen, with crowbars, pulled apart the gaming tables and uncovered the wires and other devices with which play had been governed.

A Princely Gift to Dr. Grenfell.

The following is taken from Forest and Stream, New York:—

Schooner for Dr. Grenfell.
The contract for the new vessel for the use of Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell, in connection with the work of the Labrador Mission to Deep Sea Fishermen, has recently been placed by Bowers & Mower, naval architects, of Philadelphia, Pa., with A. C. Brown & Sons, of Tottenville, Staten Island, N.Y. The vessel will be named the George B. Cluett, as she is a gift to the Mission by Mr. Cluett, who is a life member of the Grenfell Association of America. In a recently published letter Dr. Grenfell expressed the need of a new schooner to assist in carrying on the work of the Mission, and a ready response was received from Mr. Cluett, who offered to give a vessel which should in every detail meet Dr. Grenfell's requirements.


The order for the design of the new vessel was placed with Bowers & Mower, and plans were drawn for a three-masted auxiliary working schooner, 135 feet over all, 115 feet on the waterline, 25 feet moulded breadth and 12 feet moulded depth. While designed to have large cargo carrying capacity, the lines of the hull have been drawn to make a vessel that will be unusually fast under sail, and very easily driven by her auxiliary power. She combines the elements of a working schooner with those of the modern fisherman, and at the same time has the graceful sheer and well proportioned overhangs of a sea-going yacht. She will be heavily constructed in accordance with the rules of the American Bureau of Shipping, and will be built with selected white oak frame and planking and with selected long leaf yellow pine, where oak is not used. Every detail of her construction has been carefully worked out by her designers to stand the hard service, which the vessel must meet, and she will be built under the close personal supervision of the architects. Special provision is made for strength in case of her being stranded on any of the dangerous, uncharted reefs of the Labrador coast where she will be used, and provision is also made to prevent any damage by the ice, which she will encounter in the northern latitudes.

She will be rigged as a three-masted fore-and-aft schooner with Oregon pine masts, and will have a moderate sail spread. The officers' and owner's quarters are aft under a raised poop deck and trunk cabin, and will consist of a saloon, mess-room, pantry, bath room and six staterooms. The galley and forecabin are in the house on deck where she will carry a crew of captain, mate, three men and cook. The auxiliary power will be a 75 horsepower Wolverine kerosene engine, which will drive the vessel at a speed of six miles per hour. She will also have a donkey oil engine on deck for hoisting anchors, sails and handling cargo. She will be launched early in June, and will be delivered to the owners complete and ready for sea on July 1st of this year.

This vessel is the largest gift that has been given to the Mission by an individual at one time, and she will be most valuable to the Mission in carrying on its own work, and will also be a source of revenue to the Mission, as she will be chartered for scientific and sporting expeditions "down North" whenever opportunity offers, and when not otherwise employed, she will be chartered to trade out to the West Indies.

Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell is an Englishman, an Oxford graduate. He first became interested in the work of the Royal National Mission to Deep Sea Fishermen among the fishermen of the North Sea. The work was medical as well as religious missionary work, and did much to better the condition of the men of the North Sea fishing fleets. In 1892 he was sent by the Mission to Labrador to investigate conditions there among the fishermen in the hospital ship Albert, a ketch of about one hundred and fifty tons. After a season among the fishermen she returned to England, and in the following spring came back to Labrador, carrying equipment for two small hospitals.

From the beginning the work has grown until now the Society has four well equipped hospitals at different points along the coast, co-operative stores have been started, schools established, saw mills built to give employment during the winter, and the people taught to take care of themselves. An inestimable amount of medical work has been done among the sick, the poor have been clothed, and the starving fed. While the entire work is built upon a foundation of the truest Christianity, it is interesting to know that no man has ever been engaged by the Deep Sea Mission in the capacity of priest or clergyman. Dr. Grenfell himself is a man of indomitable courage and determination. He is master of his hospital ship Strathcona simply because he could not get a man who would drive her as hard in all weather as he would have her driven, and the



worst gales will not stop him when he decides to go. In winter when the coast is impassable, he travels by sledge with a team of dogs, and the hardest journey on skis mean nothing to him. A skilled surgeon, a good executive, a man of the greatest personal charm and devoting his life to a splendid work, Dr. Grenfell is indeed a man who is doing much in the cause of humanity.



New Agricultural Policy

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—Now that the Agricultural Policy of the present Government is being put before us in the House and Government press, and large increases made in the vote, it might be in order to hear from the Societies that have been formed throughout the Island during the past year. Surely voluminous reports have been made to the Minister of Agriculture as to the doings and expenditures of those Societies, and I would very humbly suggest to the Hon. Minister that those reports be published in pamphlet form with itemized expenditures and distributed among the electors. The printing of those pamphlets would give some of the party newspapers another "sop," while the reading would afford amusement and chagrin, if not information, to those electors whose taxes have furnished the funds.

If the doings of the Society in this District be any criterion for those around the Island and the results as commensurate, then the great North-West will have to look to its laurels or be prepared to take second place. The Morris Government will also have such a valuable and unique asset in the persons of our Agricultural Lecturers and Experts, Messrs. Seymour, Downey and Devereaux, that its next loan will be floated in New York, Chicago or Ottawa upon very advantageous terms.

I cannot give the amounts accurately that was distributed among the heifers of the Government by our Society, but to begin with, the distribution of a few sacks of seed potatoes and a few jackets of small seed by the Boss of this class must have made up a big percentage on the cost. The keep of the two "poor" specimens of horse flesh called Sable Island ponies, was also a charge upon the funds of the Society at no mean rate, while a brother-in-law of this heeler was sent to St. John's to come back with two such bulls (?) as would do credit to Barnum's show.

The prizes given for a few specimens of cabbages, fresh butter and flowers will no doubt be a wonderful incentive to all the producers of those articles in this District for the next Exhibition, and it will be well if our churches are not commanded to furnish space for this year's Exhibition. One branch of the civil service, alone will be making an extensive show while the officials of the Society will be giving more attention to specialties. The raising of stock, live stock, is evidently not a feature of this Society except it be the raising of cavalry horses for the British Government or pacers for the turf from those Sable Islanders. There were three pigs given to as many Morris men and they became decent specimens only to be devoured by their greedy keepers.

There is now to be a distribution of

time for Agricultural (?) purposes and to kill potato canker. Which District produces the Morris heeler who has time to sell? There are parties everywhere which would be improved by an abundant appreciation of "whitewash" even in this District.

While so many of our Labrador fishermen have been driven to the Sydney, Springhill and different parts of the United States and elsewhere to keep their families from starving, and while so many of our people are keenly feeling the pinch of want, it would be better if the Government provided labour of some kind in the District where our people could be employed and so obtain something to tide them over this exceptional, acute time of need.

This vast amount of money which is being wasted and divided among a horde of lusty heeler is a crying disgrace which every right thinking taxpayer should protest against.

The payment of (\$150.00) one hundred and fifty dollars per month to each of those three members of the House of Assembly under the name of agriculture is such a flagrant piece of political jobbery as can find no parallel. A poor fisherman is amply provided for when old and infirm, so the Morris party say, at (\$50.00) Fifty dollars per year, but Messrs. Seymour, Downey and Devereaux for giving a few minutes talk on growing cabbage and potatoes are we are told giving good value to the country at \$150.00 each per month. Is it not a wonder that Mr. Downey left such a profitable business as the cold storage on the West Coast to give his services to the country in the cause of Agriculture for \$150.00 per month? But then Mr. Downey is a patriot and is trying to save the country from what?
