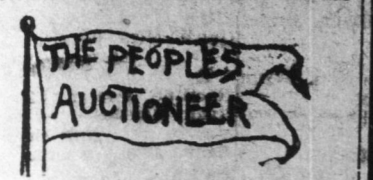

## The Evening Chit-Chat

The i a d y across the aisle from us had on a summer hat and an unusually heavy winter ulster. Said my companion: "Well, if I were going to have one of those ridiculous heavy winter coats, I certainly wouldn't wear my summer hat with it."

Wouldn't she? I wonder. Suppose, for instance, that her one summer suit got caught in a big shower and positively ruined, and she had to buy her winter coat early, but simply couldn't afford a hat. Now just what would she do in a case like that?

Why take it for granted that the lady across the aisle liked the peculiar combination of a winter-coat and summer hat? Why not reckon that she was the victim of compelling circumstances, under which we would probably have done the same thing ourselves?

How often we all say loftily, "I wouldn't do this or that." How do we know we wouldn't under the same circumstances? We don't.

It seems to me that one of the big lessons of life is to realize what a difference it makes what side of the fence we are on, and not try to say what we would or wouldn't do under circumstances of which we know nothing.

It is often amusing to see people suddenly transplanted into the position of others, whom they have previously criticized, and to see how very much the same they act themselves, and what a different point of view they get.

Some friends of mine who used to own a horse and drive a good deal, have recently purchased an automobile. When they owned the horse, they could not say anything too strong against their natural enemies, the automobilists.

"This speeding is outrageous. There ought to be a jail sentence instead of a fine." Automobiles ought not to be allowed to go more than ten or fifteen miles an hour." The way some of these chauffeurs try to see just how close they can come to your carriage wheels is abominable." "It makes me

disgusted the way the automobilists keep on tooting when you are already giving them three-quarters of the road"—these were a few of their strictures.

I was out with them the other day, and don't think we went as slowly as ten miles an hour, even in the city streets. Furthermore, they came so close to the wheels of one carriage that my heart came up in my mouth. Once we passed a carriage which was giving us at least three-quarters of the road, tooting vigorously. A bit timorous lest he should suspect sarcasm, I ventured to ask why he tooted when the team was giving him ample room. "Oh, it isn't to make them give me any more room," he explained loftily; "simply to let them know I am coming so they won't swerve out into the road or start to turn round. You know so many of these drivers are absolutely reckless that way they expect us to take all the care."

I needn't have feared his suspecting sarcasm.

One of the finest men I know is a baker. Although he abides by it perfectly, he does not approve of the law requiring that every loaf of bread shall be wrapped in paraffine paper. He says it is a foolish law, because the bread is contaminated quite as much while wrapping as it would be if it were left unwrapped. He thinks the people who agitated that law were either short-sighted or self-interested.

Now, this man is a thoroughly sincere, splendidly honest man, and yet I can't help wondering if he were not a baker, if he might not see things differently.

What a difference it does make what side of the fence we are on!

It is simply impossible that I shouldn't help but enter into the judgments of the best and most just of men.

But I do think we can remember not to say, "I wouldn't," of anything.



Then he took upon himself to give Madagascar a navy, and with a large sum of money came to England to buy the first warship. He established himself in Jermyn Street in great state, but something went wrong with regard to that cruiser, for she never materialised, and the ungrateful Malaysians would have nothing to do with their Commander-in-Chief.

But he was not in the least discouraged, and we next hear of him in South Africa, recruiting irregulars to fight against the Dutch Republics.

There were plenty of soldier-brokers in South Africa during the war, and of them all none was more popular than Colonel Bethune, better known as "Father" Bethune. Colonel Bethune began life in the Navy, then left it and became an officer in the 16th Lancers, and afterwards exchanged into the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders.

Men rolled up by the hundred to join his Irregular Horse, and he had such a choice that his regiment was one of the finest of all the fighting corps.

It was during the same war that Mr. James Malcolm, a gentleman residing in Great Russell Street, approached the War Office, offering to provide a selected regiment of sharpshooters, a thousand strong, the same to serve as auxiliaries without costing the country a penny.

There are soldier-brokers in every country, but the best are British. Next time we have the ill-luck to fall out with another Power, they will be in their element.—P.W.

PEKIN, Nov. 19.  
The conditions of China are still chaotic. When Yuan Shi Kai had accepted the Premiership and nominated his cabinet, it was still thought he may bring around the provinces, his views being mainly a nominal monarchy and a constitution; but the revolutionary movement seems too strong for him and the idea of a Republic seems to grow. Yuan works with even more than Chinese caution while he watches actual events and places where things are being done, and the next step from the Premiership may be provisional leadership of the Republic.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
BERLIN, Nov. 19.  
The Secretary of Foreign Affairs has communicated to the Reichstag additional provisions of the agreement reached recently between France and Germany over the Moroccan trouble. France, the communication says, has waived the right to purchase Spanish Guinea, if Germany wishes to acquire the Colony from Spain, and that Germany will not take part in any of the special agreements between France and Spain, which these two countries may arrange on the subject of Morocco. A despatch from Madrid from Premier Castelar denies that Spain was about to sell Guinea to Germany or any other power, and said that Spain was willing to use great moderation in negotiations with France about Spanish vested rights and interests in Morocco. A despatch from Paris, however, declares that Germany had been negotiating with Spain for the purchase of the Colony.

### Watchman's Leg Was Broken.

David Carey, the night watchman at Browning's bakery, had his leg broken yesterday evening while on duty there. He was also injured internally and is now in hospital. Owing to the heavy overflow of the water in the river the wheel was set revolving and the machinery began to move. The watchman ran to throw off a belt. It came off with a sudden jerk and hitting him on the leg broke it above the knee. He was also cut about the face and his hip was bruised. Being alone, Carey had a hard struggle to get out of the building. He limped and crawled to the house of Mrs. Stafford, where he asked for help. Dr. Tait was called up and coming to the house bandaged the wound and ordered the man to the hospital. He was taken there in the ambulance.

## Sidewalk Sketches.

**BENJAMIN FRANKLIN.**



Benjamin Franklin, who put the city of Boston on the map in 1706 by thoughtfully choosing it as a birthplace, was a one of America's foremost literati. His father was the author of the tall candle and a family of seventeen children, of whom Benjamin happened in as No. 15, the only instance of willful tardiness charged up against him. Benjamin learned to set type in Philadelphia, and while there invented the italic thin space, which has been handed down from generation to generation, like a predisposition to the quinsy. Later he became an editor and took cordwood and aged fowls on subscription. He refused the postoffice at Philadelphia which caused him to be looked upon with suspicion, but later was made postmaster general and invented the general delivery clerk with a receding forehead. This is the only grudge posterity has against Benjamin. Benjamin was a fluent writer, and as he was of a very generous nature his autograph was much in demand on promissory notes negotiated by admiring relatives. His time was fully employed. He would go out and invent a few things in the daytime and then write for the papers at night. After inventing the electric belt with the aid of a kite and a ten-penny nail, Benjamin signed the Declaration of Independence in a loud tone and emitted a few epigrams for his Almanac, which was translated into several different languages on a hand press. It is said that Benjamin was the only statesman in our history who could get shaved, have his shoes shined, dictate to a stenographer and direct a telephone conversation about the next caucus, all at one and the same time, without getting his wires crossed or inhaling a mouthful of lather. While not what you might call a society man, he was one of the patrons of the Boston tea party and always had his clothes made to order.

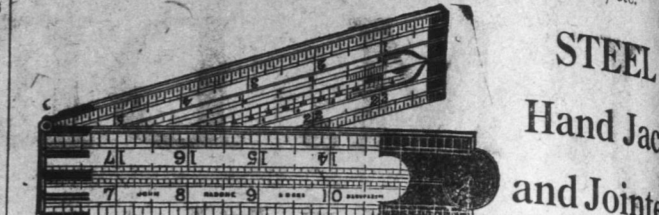

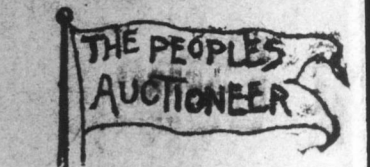
