



The two doctors concluded that n fficient work, such as is demanded in vilization, can be done in such scatered districts without a hospital, and cither of them would remain in the country under any conditions without having a proper hospital to enable them to give such service.

Conclusions:-First-Plenty of natients are grateul to have the opportunity of getting first class hospital service and are willing and able to pay small fees, and board. This, after six months of winter work only-when there are no steamers running most of the time. and when the winter was excentionally severe. 




