





### Sir Robert Bond Refutes Charges in the Chronicle.

INTERVIEW AS TO HIS CON-  
 NECTION WITH THE WORKINGTON  
 MINES.

It will be remembered that last week we drew the attention of the Governor and the public to the remarkable conflict between a statement made in the House of Assembly last session by the Prime Minister, Sir Edward Morris, and a statement filed in the Registry of Companies about the shares and shareholders in the St. George's Lumber Co.

In the House of Assembly Sir Edward Morris stated that he had not and never had any interest in any timber property in Newfoundland, a document filed by the Secretary of the Company just mentioned contained a statement showing that Sir Edward Morris's holding in that company was \$40,000 stock.

We gave our authority for the two statements. We quoted from the official reports of the debates in the House of Assembly, and indeed we heard the Premier make the statement that he had not and never had any interest in the timber wealth of the Island; and the other statement was based on a copy of the document filed in the Registry of Companies, certified as a correct copy by Mr. Adams, Registrar of Companies.

It will be seen that we had taken care to verify the matter before calling attention to the remarkable discrepancy. For it was remarkable, because Sir Edward made it in the House of Assembly, from his place as

leader of the Government, and it must be remembered as Prime Minister he is chief adviser to the Governor, and he also occupies the rank of Privy Councillor. On the other hand, the document in the Registry of Companies is official and filed in accordance with statutory requirements.

We drew the attention of the Governor and our readers to the conflicting nature of the two statements, and suggested that the Governor consider the advisability of inviting an explanation of the conflict from Sir Edward Morris.

The next remarkable incident was the way the Evening Chronicle treated the matter. The editor made no attempt to reconcile the conflicting statements, but treated the record of the Registry of Companies as correct, ignored absolutely the need of an explanation of why Sir Edward declared he had never had an interest in timber property, if the Registry record is correct; or how the record came in the Registry if Sir Edward's statement is correct.

The way the editor treated it on the 13th inst. was to state that Sir Robert Bond held shares in the Workington Mine during the time he was Premier, and two days later he asserted that Sir Robert Bond was a director of the Workington Mines whilst he was Premier.

The reference to Sir Robert Bond was of course only a red herring. What Sir Robert had or had not in any way helped to reconcile the discrepancy to which we had directed attention. Sir Robert had made no statement in the House of Assembly Mine, which was in conflict with a record in the public office. Even if he had done so, it would have been no answer for Sir Edward. It would have shown only that both were in a similar box.

INTERVIEW WITH SIR ROBERT BOND.

Yesterday Sir Robert came to town and we drew his attention to the two articles in the Chronicle, and asked him for the facts of the case.

Sir Robert said: "I was NEVER A DIRECTOR of the Workington Mine, or as it was more properly called The

Newfoundland Iron Ore Co. My interest in that property can be very briefly set forth. In the year 1897 certain English capitalists obtained a lease of the property at and near Lower Island Cove, known locally as the Workington Mine, from Robert S. Slesator, John Winsor, Alexander Shiran and Joseph Pippy and others, and work was commenced. In the year 1898, not being satisfied with the conduct of the management by a Mr. Moore, the Company determined to appoint a Board of Advice, as they were desirous of having some one in Newfoundland apart from the manager to whom they could refer in case of necessity and for the protection of the English shareholders. My friend, Sir John Randles, of Workington, England, a director in this mining venture, wrote and inquired if I would become one of two members of an Advisory Board to be appointed. After some consideration and inquiry as to the Company, I consented and purchased shares in London to qualify for the position. I never had any founder shares. This was years before I became Premier, and at the time I was not a member of the Government. Sir James Winter was Premier at that period. I entered upon my duties in the year 1898. The Company closed down all work in December, 1899, and practically abandoned the mine. The last meeting of the Advisory Board took place on the 13th December, 1899, and the resignation of the Advisory Board (consisting of Mr. J. Browning and myself) was sent in acknowledged from London before I was called in by the Governor and asked to form a Government. As my interest in the conduct of the Workington Mines commenced in 1898, after Sir James Winter had taken office in 1898; and ceased in 1899 before I succeeded Sir James Winter as Premier in March 1900, the charges in the Evening Chronicle are false. I was never interested in the conduct of the Workington Mines while I was either Premier or whilst I was a servant of the Crown."

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

**Pilley's Island Hospital.**

Editor Evening Telegram.

In 1910 the people of Pilley's Island sent me a largely signed petition by the hand of a deputation asking me to try and arrange for a doctor at Pilley's Island, in Green Bay—as it was too expensive to go to St. John's or St. Anthony for treatment, and often too far for sick people. Moreover, there was no doctor within thirty miles in either direction. The Council of the Mission did not at that time see its way to increase its liabilities; but in the Spring Dr. Harrison Webster and Dr. Hugh Greely, who were just finishing their staff appointments at the Mass. General Hospital, volunteered to give eighteen months free service to see if a hospital could be started and eventually supported by the people with the aid of a small Government grant. Their generous offer was accepted, a building secured, and work begun at once by Dr. Greely. Two trained nurses, one a volunteer, the other on part pay, also offered their services. Furniture, medical and surgical outfit, and some funds for alteration and outfit were contributed by personal friends of the doctors and by the Mission. The alterations necessary for an experimental cottage hospital were made largely by the doctors themselves. Male and female wards with five beds in each, two single isolation wards, a dispensary, outpatient examination room, operating room, nurses' room, kitchen, etc., were outfitted and a house for the doctor secured.

As the general opinion in Newfoundland was that it could not be supported locally, only such permanent fixtures were undertaken as were absolutely necessary.

**(1) Need for Hospital:**  
The need for hospital treatment was clearly shown by such cases as the following:—

**(2) Medical:**  
Dr. Greely was called to visit a young man, at Point Leamington, with pneumonia. At the mileage rate of fifty cents a mile it cost \$30, which was paid by Mr. Harry Crowe. It was necessary for the doctor to row four hours, and it took a whole day to get there. The case occupied him two days altogether, a motor boat bringing him back; and he was then only able to stay with the lad part of one day, and one night. The patient improved but died three days after the doctor left. A day or so later the brother developed pneumonia, the family hurried him right to the hospital in a schooner; there he did excellently, the crisis occurred on the fourth day, and the boy is now here convalescent.

**(3) Surgical:**  
A patient in an enlightened family was seized with an acute attack of appendicitis, and sent at once to hospital. He was operated upon immediately and got well. Another man with exactly the same trouble neglected the symptoms, and only as a very last resource, sent for Dr. Webster, the surgeon. He was operated upon, but owing entirely to his long delay, he died a few days after.

The two doctors concluded that no efficient work, such as is demanded in civilization, can be done in such scattered districts without a hospital, and neither of them would remain in the country under any conditions without having a proper hospital to enable them to give such service.

**Conclusions:—**

First—Plenty of patients are grateful to have the opportunity of getting first class hospital service and are willing and able to pay small fees, and board. This, after six months of winter work only—when there are no steamers running most of the time, and when the winter was exceptionally severe. Over fifty patients had been admitted, forty five for operation. During the summer months the hospital of ten beds would probably be full all the time. Moreover, this year, the reputation of the older hospital at St. Anthony caused some to wait to go there. Some gave us their reason for waiting that they would at St. Anthony get the treatment and care free. This will be discouraged by small fees being charged there and while no one will be refused, magistrates or justices certificates of inability to contribute at all can be required of free patients. Both doctors considered this a very desirable point to push if possible so that eventually they might be able to carry their own responsibility.

**Revenue.**

Second—The possible sources were:—Family annual fees on the books. Patients fees not on the books. Operations, and board at Hospital, Government subsidy, General subscriptions. The largest returns came from visiting patients not on the books and then from the book fees. Both doctors and the medical profession generally, regard annual family fees a undesirable, both from the point of view of the doctor and patient, as they always tend to inferior work. It would be actually cheaper as well as better for the patients to pay simply for what they received.

They consider that the best plan would be to have regular fixed charges for operations, board, visits, mileage and drugs which all patients should pay, except those who held orders from the magistrate or poor relief officer; that all charges of every kind be considered hospital assets, and be accounted for on the books. The Government subsidy should be proportional to the amount of work done, but should be sufficient to enable the hospital to exist. Outside subscriptions would always be desirable, and can always be solicited, as they are in every other country—without any reflection on the people, or any fear of pauperization.

**Management.**

If the new International Committee of the Labrador Medical Mission which has already organized for such work, with a full representation of leading men in Newfoundland, were willing to undertake the control of, and responsibility for the hospital, they believe that that or the management of some similar efficient body would be more economical and probably as acceptable as if it were managed entirely by the Government.

If all ten beds in the hospital were full all the year, that would not meet expenses, anyhow without outside practice at the present rates. It might be necessary to close the hospital and limit the work and expense to one surgeon, whose outpractice in winter would help to maintain it the other six months. Seeing the difficulties of transport in winter, this might be an alternative consideration.

It must be remembered that (1) this twelve months the outfit has been contributed. (2) the surgeon and physician received no salaries. (3) the nursing and housekeeping was also free, except for one nurse who was partially paid.

**Charges.**

Charges were fixed this year at \$3 per week for board, \$5 per week for board and treatment. Surgical operations extra in proportion to everty and danger. Expenses for six months:

The women and children found refuge in the British Consulate. There is quiet to-day; all the stores are closed and a strong Chinese guard is posted at the city gates.

CHICAGO, June 20.—Roosevelt and his campaign manager, Senator Dixon, conferred this afternoon after the adjournment of the convention. When they concluded their discussion Dixon announced the conclusion rendered. "We will not recognize the legality of the so called Republican Convention until it purges itself of the seventy-eight stolen delegates enumerated in Governor Hadley's motion of yesterday. The nomination for President has already been made. The American people have named Roosevelt and elected for him a majority of more than 100 delegates to this convention as the regular convention of the Republican Party. If the convention does not unseat these seventy-eight delegates the question asked is, what will happen? That will be decided later. We will await developments on this before taking any further action," said Senator Dixon.

Conflicting reports from the Roosevelt headquarters to the effect that Roosevelt had released his delegates from all obligations to vote for him. Davis, of the Roosevelt headquarters, however, said he was authorized by the Colonel to say the statement as to the release of the delegates, was absolutely false.

Exactly four minutes was the duration of the opening session of the third day of the Republican convention. An immense crowd of nearly 4,000 people who had fought their way into the hall, after an hour or more in line, had to go out again. The only business done was the offering of prayer, and a motion of Watson to be in recess until 4 p.m. The reason for recess was the fact that the credential committee at work on contests affecting the personnel of the convention had only fairly begun its work.

**Galileo.**



On the 21st of June, 1632, the Italian astronomer Galileo was made a martyr to the truth and obliged to back up some distance on the proposition that the earth do move. Galileo lived at a time when everybody who possessed a few cubic feet of brain expansion believed that the earth was as flat as a checker board. They also entertained the

notion that if a man were to walk due north for some time he would be liable to step off the rim and fall in a perpendicular direction for several feet. This incensed every college professor in the country who had been teaching the flat-top theory, and Galileo was arrested while engaged in a naming a new hatching of stars and given his choice between recanting or having all of his bones that were within reach broken on the wheel. Galileo was then past

seventy years of age, feeble in body and weakened in spirit, and he decided to recant, but history relates that as he rose to his feet after taking the vow with his fingers crossed, he murmured the immortal and inspiring words, "It do move!"

## Roosevelt Still Talking.

**Will Run as Independent.**  
Special to Evening Telegram.  
CHICAGO, To-day.  
Roosevelt last night indicated that under certain conditions he might withdraw from the Republican party and take the lead in the formation of a new party. "If people want a progressive party, I'll be in it," he said. Some of the Colonel's supporters urged his associates to precipitate a crisis in the Republican National Convention at the earliest opportunity to-day. More conservative counsels prevailed and determined there should be no bolt from the regular convention. It was the plan of the Roosevelt delegates to-night to make their last stand on the report of credentials committee. If 73 delegates claimed by them to be fraudulent are seated, Roosevelt forces will remain in the convention until the end but will not vote. It is their plan then to proceed to the nomination of the Colonel in the Coliseum and claim regularly for him. Roosevelt has not definitely committed himself to the latter part of this plan. He is considering the advisability of delaying action for several weeks, then to summon an entirely new convention, this not to be held until after the democrats have acted in Baltimore. He said emphatically, however, that he would make an independent fight for the Presidency, if convinced there was a popular demand for him. "I shall have to see if there is a popular demand for me to run," he said.

## Steamer Smashes Locks

**Three Children Drowned.**

The re-organization of China has been made possible by the complete understanding reached yesterday by bankers, representing six powers, Britain, States, Germany, France, Russia and Japan to loan China three hundred million dollars. Russia joined the five powers, acquiescing in the agreements. Russia and Japan tried to exact an agreement that the loan should not be applied in any way likely to compromise their interests. The four other powers refused to agree to this. It is understood the final agreement is restricted to the financing of China, all political questions as such being left to powers.

**Raised Bats to Kill Mosquitos.**

Near San Antonio, Tex., a unique scheme is being tried for getting rid of mosquitos and incidentally the malaria that they carry, and at the same time making the process pay for itself. It is well known that bats are great enemies of mosquitos, and so the idea is to encourage the bats. For this purpose roosting houses for them have been built. These houses have sides made of slats, with spaces between, so the bats can easily go in and out, while the inside will be kept nearly dark. Numerous roosts are provided and there are sleeping accommodations for 2,000,000 bats in each house—though the guests do not number quite that many yet. The bats sleep on the roosts all day and at night they fly out and feed on the mosquitos. At least, that is what they are expected to do. Rats are the great natural enemy of bats, and so the posts on which the bat houses are built are protected by metal shields to keep the rats from gaining an entrance. It is believed that with a good safe place to stay in the bats will rapidly increase in numbers. The money end of the scheme is in the guano which it is believed will accumulate in the rookeries in marketable quantities.—The Pathfinder.

**Scotland Yard Chambers of Horrors.**

Into one room in Scotland Yard, which is only unlocked on certain afternoons, no stranger may go without special permission. It is the Chamber of Horrors. Here one may see Devereux's trunk and Crippen's spade, the false arm of Charles Peace, and his burgling tools and collapsible ladder.

**Tourist Traffic.**


Twelve round-trippers came by the S. S. Florizel, some of whom will spend a few weeks in the city.
