### Sir Evelyn Wood's Accident

Horse Killed in the Hunting Field. Field-Marshal Sir Evelyn Wood, V.C. who is within a few days of his 75th birthday, had a narrow escape in the nunting field recently.

While hunting with the Essex foxounds in the neighborhood of Aythorp Roding, his horse jumped short at a fence and was staked. It is rare that a horse thus impaled, will recover, and in this case the injury was so severe that there was no hope

of saving the animal. Of all the accidents in the hunting field none is so calculated to upset he nerves of a rider, but Sir Evelyn kept his seat in spite of his years. Sir Evelyn was compelled to borrow a gun from a neighboring farm and shoot his horse. After doing so

he returned home. Sir E. Wood served in the Crime with the Naval Brigade and in India in 1858 with the 17th Lancers, and in both campaigns was mentioned in depatches. In the following year he was granted the Victoria Cross. He lso fought in the Ashanti, Kaffir, Zulu and Transvaal Wars.





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
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
