



A report issued last Wednesday, says: "The allies are now methodically maintaining their shell fire for days at a time without infantry attacks, 'dropping projectiles upon the charred front in every fifty yard square, and repeating the process-a deadly automatic unceasing pounding. The heavy calibred guns send their storms of shells upon encampments of first reserves behind the lines, and upon bridges and provi-
